#### **PREFACE**

This publication presents a range of statistics relating to child care arrangements made by persons responsible for children under twelve years of age. The statistics were derived from a survey conducted throughout Australia in November 1984 to obtain information on, amongst other things:

- who used the child care services, and why
- what types of arrangements were being made
- whether more formal child care services were required
- reasons for not using formal child care services

In preparation for the development of this survey, discussions were held with users to ascertain their requirements. As a consequence to these discussions, data relating to the family on met, partially met and unmet needs for formal child care were collected.

The data presented in this publication have been organised into sections dealing with:

Summary of findings

Family units responsible for children under 12 years of age

Family units who used formal and/or informal child care

Family units who used husband care

Family units who required formal child care

Family units who used formal child care and did not require additional formal child care

Family units who did not use formal child care and did not require it

Persons responsible for children under 12 years of age

Children under 12 years of age

The information in this publication represents a range of data available in these areas and is presented in descriptive, graphical and tabular form.

More detailed information will be made available from a wide range of statistical tables not suitable for routine publication. Arrangements are also being made for the release of a unit record data tape. ### EXPLANATORY NOTES

#### Introduction

A survey was conducted throughout Australia in November 1984 to obtain information on child care arrangements made by persons responsible for children under twelve years of age. The survey collected details on the social and economic characteristics of family units (e.g. marital status, labour force status, income, etc.), patterns of usage of child care, cost and main reason for using formal and informal child care, the level of met, partially met or unmet demand for child care services and the amount of care by the husband of the person responsible. Details of child care arrangements were collected for each child in the survey.

2. Some results were published in Child Care Arrangements, Australia, November 1984 (Preliminary) (4401.0) on 21 August 1985. These results included preliminary estimates of child care arrangments made by the person responsible for each child under the age of twelve and covered topics such as cost, hours, frequency of use and main reason for using formal and informal child care.

#### Scope and coverage

- 3. The survey was conducted as part of the regular population survey which is based on a multi-stage area sample of private dwellings (about 33,000 houses, flats) and non-private dwellings (hotels, motels) and covers about two-thirds of one per cent of the population of Australia. Certain groups of persons are excluded from the survey such as:
  - (a) occupants of non-private dwellings (e.g. hospitals, hotels, jails);
  - (b) diplomatic personnel of overseas governments;
  - (c) persons from overseas touring or holidaying in Australia;
  - (d) members of non-Australian defence forces (and their dependants) stationed in Australia;
  - (e) members of the permanent Australian defence forces.

#### Survey method

4. The information about child care arrangements was obtained through interviews with the person responsible for the children under twelve years of age (see paragraph 5). If the person responsible for children under twelve years of age was not available for interview, another responsible adult answered on his or her behalf. Interviews were carried out over a period of two weeks commencing 12 November 1984.

#### **Definitions**

5. The person responsible for children under twelve years of age was taken to be the mother if she were a usual resident of the selected private dwelling. If the mother was

not normally resident at that private dwelling or was not available for interview then the information was sought from the person mainly responsible for the children under twelve years of age.

- 6. Child care relates to all arrangements made for the care of children under twelve years of age for Monday to Sunday of the week prior to interview.
- 7. Categories of child care. Child care has been classified to three broad categories, i.e. Formal, Informal and Other.
- 8. Arrangements of child care have been classified within the categories Formal, Informal and Other as follows:
  - (a) Formal child care includes any care arrangements made for the care of children (when the children were not in the care of the person responsible) at a pre-school, a child care centre (such as a creche, playgroup, kindergarten or occasional care centre), or through a family day care scheme.
  - (b) Informal child care includes any care arrangements (when the children were not in the care of the person responsible) where the children were cared for by other children resident at the selected private dwelling, or relatives or non-relatives both resident at the dwelling or elsewhere.
  - (c) Other includes any care arrangements where the person responsible was always able to look after the child, or in the case of the family tables, all of the children, in the week prior to interview. Also included in this category are arrangements where the children were not in the care of the person responsible and spent time at scouts, music lessons, sporting activities, hospital, etc. or where the children looked after themselves.

It will be readily appreciated that a child or family unit may have used only one arrangement of child care in the week prior to interview or may have used a combination of arrangements. Rather than merely measure the arrangements most often used, this survey attempts to measure the various combinations of arrangements. In order to do this, several supplementary classifications (called Combinations of Categories, Combinations of Child Care and Types of Child Care) have been used in this publication. These classifications are described in paragraphs 9, 10 and 11 following.

9. Combinations of categories. This classification is aimed at the category level and indicates the combinations of categories of child care used. Family units and children are classified in a mutually exclusive way thereby enabling a count of total family units or children in the survey. The

classification does not take into account combinations of arrangements within categories. The classification is as follows:

Formal child care only
Informal child care only
Other only
Formal and informal child care
Formal child care and other
Informal child care and other
Formal and informal child care and other
Total family units/children

In Sections 4 and 5 of this publication, some elements of this classification do not appear because the populations in those sections relate only to those family units who used/did not use formal child care.

10. Combinations of child care. This classification measures the combinations of child care arrangements used within each of the three broad categories on the basis of whether there was only one arrangement used or a combination of two or more. Family units and children are classified in a mutually exclusive way within each category only. This enables children or family units to be totalled at the category level and also indicates the extent to which two or more arrangements of child care within the category have been used. The classification does not take into account combinations of arrangements across categories of child care. The classification is as follows:

Formal child care—
Pre-school
Child care centre
Family day care
Not able to be classified
Two or more arrangements of formal child care

Total family units/children who used formal child care

Total family units/children who used formal and no informal child care

Informal child care—
Children resident in the dwelling
Relatives resident in the dwelling
Relatives not resident in the dwelling
Non-relatives resident in the dwelling
Non-relatives not resident in the dwelling
Two or more arrangements of informal child
care

Total family units/children who used informal child care

Total family units/children who used informal and no formal child care

Other arrangements—
Children look after themselves
Scouts, music lessons, hospital, etc.
Children look after themselves and scouts, music lessons, hospital, etc.
Person responsible always able to look after children in the week prior to interview

Total family units/children who used other arrangements

Total family units/children who used other arrangements only (i.e. no formal or informal child care)

In Section 2 and Tables 54 and 55 in Section 8 of this publication, some elements of this classification do not appear because the populations specified relate only to those family units and children who used formal and/or informal child care.

11. Types of child care. This classification measures every individual arrangement of formal and informal child care used by family units or children The classification does not take into account combinations of child care arrangements either within or across categories of child care. A family unit or child may therefore occur more than once in the classification. For this reason, totals are not shown in tables using this classification. The classification is as follows:

Formal child care—
Pre-school
Child care centre
Family day care
Not able to be classified

Informal child care—
Children resident in the dwelling
Relatives resident in the dwelling
Relatives not resident in the dwelling
Non-relatives resident in the dwelling
Non-relatives not resident in the dwelling

The only variation on this classification occurs in Tables 11 and 53 where data on types of informal child care are excluded as cost of informal child care was not collected for each type of informal child care.

- 12. A family for the purposes of this survey is defined as a unit containing children under twelve years of age and a person responsible for those children (together with that person's spouse and older children resident in the dwelling, if any).
- 13. Children for the purposes of this survey, refer to children less than twelve years of age in a one parent or two parent family unit.

- 14. Dependent children for the purposes of this survey, refer to all children under 15 years of age or aged 15 to 20 years and studying full-time at a school or in post-secondary education (in a one parent or two parent family unit where there was a child under 12 years of age).
- 15. Spouse refers to the spouse of the person responsible for children under twelve years of age in a two parent family unit (includes de facto where stated).
- 16. Husband refers to the male spouse of the person responsible for children under twelve years of age in a two parent family unit (includes de facto where stated).
- 17. Family type refers to one parent or two parent families.
- 18. Parents for the purposes of this survey are defined as the person responsible for the children under twelve years of age, and that person's spouse, if any.
- 19. Husband care refers to care arrangements where children were cared for by the male spouse in a two parent family unit when none of the children were in the care of the person responsible. For future child care surveys it is planned to refine this concept.
- 20. Cost of child care is money paid by parents for formal or informal child care on a weekly basis or converted to a weekly equivalent and includes donations if they are considered to be a cost by the person responsible.
- 21. Use of formal child care relates to the use of any formal child care service (i.e. pre-school, child care centre or family day care) by any child in the family unit in the week prior to interview.
- 22. Requirement for formal child care is based on the response to the question as to whether the person responsible would have used any formal child care service (i.e. pre-school, child care centre or family day care) or where formal child care was already used, any additional formal child care in the week prior to interview.
- 23. Availability of formal child care is based on the perception of the person responsible as to whether any formal child care service was available for their use. No measure has been obtained of the situation where a particular service (such as a pre-school), was available, but a different service (such as family day care), was required.
- 24. Parents income group refers to the range applicable to the combined gross weekly income of the person responsible for the children under twelve years of age, and that person's spouse, if any.

- 25. Definitions of labour force categories used in this publication are the same as those used in the labour force survey. More details can be found in the publication *The Labour Force*, *Australia* (6203.0). For the purposes of this survey, labour force details relate to the person responsible for the children under twelve years of age, and that person's spouse, if any.
  - (a) Employed persons comprise all those aged 15 years and over who, during the survey week:
    - (i) had a job as an employee working for a wage or salary, or had their own business or farm with or without employees;

or

- (ii) worked without pay in a family business.
- (b) Unemployed persons are those aged 15 years and over who were not employed during the survey week but who reported they were actively looking for a job.
- (c) Persons not in the labour force are those aged 15 years and over who, during the survey week, were not in the categories 'employed' or 'unemployed', as defined above. They include persons who were keeping house (unpaid), attending an educational institution, retired, etc.
- 26. Full-time employees are those employees who usually work 35 hours or more a week, and those who usually work part-time, but worked for 35 hours or more during the survey week.
- 27. Part-time employees are those employees who usually work less than 35 hours a week and did so during the survey week.
- 28. Parents labour force status consists of four categories:
  - (a) All parents employed full-time;
  - (b) All parents employed, at least one part-time;
  - (c) One parent employed, the other not;
  - (d) All parents not employed.

Categories (a), (b) and (d) may include one parent families.

- 29. Parents country of birth consists of four categories:
  - (a) All parents Australian born;
  - (b) All parents born in a mainly English speaking (M.E.S.) country;

- (c) One parent born in a mainly English speaking (M.E.S.) country, the other not;
- (d) No parents born in a mainly English speaking (M.E.S.) country.

Mainly English speaking countries have been defined as: New Zealand, United Kingdom/Ireland, Canada, United States of America, the Republic of South Africa, and Australia (for two parent families where one parent was born in Australia and one parent was born in, for example, New Zealand).

Categories (a), (b) and (d) may include one parent families.

### Interpretation of results

- 30. Formal child care
  - (a) Names and addresses of the child care services used were supplied by the person responsible for children under twelve years of age and coded to type of formal child care from a list compiled in each State.
  - (b) A child or children in the family unit may have more than one arrangement of the same type of formal child care, e.g. a child using two child care centres. These arrangements have been combined and the details aggregated in this publication for the child care type.

### 31. Informal child care

- (a) Informal child care was coded according to the response by the person responsible for the children under twelve years of age.
- (b) No attempt was made to collect individual information where there was more than one care giver within a type of informal child care, i.e. if the child was looked after by more than one relative at different times in the week prior to interview, the data collected were the total care by those relatives.

#### 32. Other

- (a) Other arrangements were coded according to the response by the person responsible for the children under twelve years of age.
- (b) As arrangements such as scouts, music lessons, etc. would not always have been considered as a form of child care by the person responsible for the children under twelve years of age, the response to this type was significantly understated. It is also very likely that the count of

- children who looked after themselves was understated because some respondents may have been reluctant to tell an interviewer that they left their children on their own.
- (c) A child or children in the family unit shown in the tables as being looked after only by the person responsible in the week prior to interview may also have been cared for by that person's spouse. Details of husband care (see paragraph 19 above) are shown in Section 3 and are available for the family unit only, i.e. not for individual children within the family.
- 33. The carer's place of residence is not intended to indicate where the child care took place e.g. care by a relative resident in the dwelling may have taken place at another person's residence.

# Comparison of results with the June 1980 Child Care Survey

- 34. The following points should be noted when comparing results of this survey with those of the June 1980 Child Care Survey:
  - (a) Changes in population size and composition have occurred between 1980 and 1984 and should be taken into account when comparing estimates from the two surveys.
  - (b) The methodology used in the 1984 survey differed from that of the 1980 survey. In the 1980 survey, persons responsible for the children were asked, for children not at school, details of child care arrangements for the eldest three children individually but not in respect of any other children not at school. Cost information was obtained in respect of all children not at school, collectively. For children at school, persons responsible for the children were asked for details of child care arrangements collectively. This means the number of hours of care is the sum of the number of hours all children at school spent in each particular care type and similarly, cost information was obtained in respect of all children at school. The approach used to collect the information was to ascertain whether the person responsible for the children was involved in a range of activities away from the home and to record the child care arrangements used while involved in those activities.

In the 1984 survey, persons responsible for the children were asked, for each child individually, details of child care arrangements. Activities away from the home were not established.

(c) The reference period for the 1984 survey differed from that of the 1980 survey. For the 1980

survey, interviews were carried out over a period of two weeks commencing 9 June 1980 and arrangements of child care relate to Monday to Friday of the week prior to the interview.

For the 1984 survey, interviews were carried out over a two week period commencing 12 November 1984 and arrangements of child care relate to Monday to Sunday of the week prior to interview.

Caution should be exercised when comparing the results from the two surveys as, apart from the inclusion of weekend care in the 1984 survey, the change in the reference period has effects on the number of children attending school, particularly new entrants. The size of this effect varies between the States and Territories due to their differing school enrolment procedures.

(d) Sampling factors — since all estimates were based on interviews with samples of the Australian population, results are subject to sampling variability (see Appendix A for further details) and any assessment or comparison of results should take this into account.

### Reliability of the estimates

35. Since the estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they may differ from the figures than would

have been produced if the information had been obtained from occupants of all dwellings. More information on this topic is given in the Technical Note (see Appendix A).


### SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

This publication presents data on the use of child care arrangements by one parent and two parent family unit responsible for children under twelve years of age, and for the children within those family units. The following diagram and commentary illustrate some of the findings of the survey and are also intended to give an insight into the composition of population groups used throughout this publication.

#### Family units

Child care arrangements have been classified to three broad categories viz. Formal, Informal and Other. There were 1,659,800 family units responsible for children under twelve years of age of which 317,800 used formal child care 581,100 used informal child care and 912,500 used other arrangements. Diagram 1 gives details of the combinations of child care used by family units within each of these three categories.




Diagram 2 looks at the relationship between types of formal and informal child care and combinations of formal and informal child care.





Diagram 4 looks at the age composition of family units in terms of whether they used other arrangements only i.e. did not use formal or informal child care (52.9 per cent of all family units) as against those who used some arrangement of formal and or informal child care.

The most frequently encountered family unit responsible for children under 12 years of age was composed of one or more children 6-11 years and no other children under 12 years of age (650,500 or 39.2 per cent). 456,000 (or 70.1 per cent) of these used "other arrangements" only.

86.200 (71.1 per cent) of the 121.300 family units with the composition of one or more children in the 3-5 year age group and no other children under 12 years of age used some arrangement of formal and, or informal child care. This was the highest proportional use of any formal and or informal child care of any family unit depicted in the diagram. Indeed, all family units with one or more children in the 3-5 year age group were more likely than others to use some arrangement of formal and, or informal child care.

A number of family units used husband care in conjunction with formal, informal or other arrangements. Diagram 5 illustrates the percentage of family units who used husband care and Diagram 6 looks at, for each combination of the categories of child care, the percentage of family units who additionally used husband care.








Diagram 7 looks at the estimated number of family units who used formal and/or informal child care in terms of the parents weekly income and cost of child care for the week prior to interview.

Diagram 7 highlights that the majority of family units who used formal child care paid between \$1-\$14 per week while for family units who used informal child care, most reported no cost. The diagrams for both formal and informal child care show a trend for families who earn more to pay more for the care.

Diagram 8 looks at the use of, requirements for, and availability of formal child care as a percentage of the estimated 1,659,800 family units responsible for children under twelve years of age. It should be noted that requirement for formal child care is subjective and should be viewed in the context of the reasons why/why not formal child care was required. These details are available in Sections 4, 5 and 6.





Diagram 9 below examines the labour force status of persons responsible for children under twelve years of age and the broad age composition of children in the family.


As can be seen from Diagram 9, the majority of the 969,600 persons not employed were responsible for children under six years of age (675,800 or 69.7 per cent).

For employed persons, there was a tendency to work part-time if responsible for children under six years of age and full-time where responsible for older children only (51.6 per cent and 63.3 per cent respectively).

### Children under 12 years of age

There were an estimated 2,897,400 children under twelve years of age of which 358,900 used formal child care, 864,900 used informal child care and and 1,801,300 used other arrangements. An estimated 1,300,800 (or 44.9 per cent) children were not attending school and 1,596,500 (or 55.1 per cent) children were attending school. Diagram 10 below gives details of the combinations of child care used by these children for the three categories Formal, Informal and Other.

As can be seen from Diagram 10, the majority of children using formal child care were not attending school and over half (206,400 or 57.5 per cent) used a pre-school. A number of children who used two or more arrangements of formal child care would also have used a pre-school.

In contrast, for children who used informal child care, the child's school attendance does not appear to influence whether or not they used the care, with the exception of care by other children resident in the dwelling where 56,400 (or 89.8 per cent) were attending school.


Virtually all children who used other arrangements were always being cared for by the person responsible (1,710,000 or 94.9 per cent) with 1,088,700 (or 60.4 per cent) of these children attending school.

Diagram 11 below looks at the main reason the person responsible for the children under twelve years of age used formal and/or informal child care.

MAIN REASON PERSON RESPONSIBLE USED CHILD CARE, NOVEMBER 1984


CHILDREN WHO USED FORMAL CHILD CARE (358,900)

The main reason the person responsible used formal child care was prepare child for school (125,400 or 34.9 per cent), followed by good for child (98,500 or 27.4 per cent) and work (92,500 or 25.8 per cent). The large number of children that fall into the 'child benefits' reasons would be largely due to the proportion of children using pre-schools versus other types of formal child care.

In contrast, the main reason the person responsible used informal child care was work (347,100 or 40.1 per cent), followed by social outings (162,200 or 18.8 per cent).

#### APPENDIX A

#### TECHNICAL NOTE


#### **Estimation procedure**

The estimates are derived from the population survey by use of a complex ratio estimation procedure, which ensures that the survey estimates conform to an independently estimated distribution of the population by age and sex, rather than to the age and sex within the sample itself.

#### Reliability of estimates

- Since the estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings they are subject to sampling variability, that is, they may differ from figures that would have been produced if all the dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error, which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings were included in the survey. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the figure that would have been obtained if all the dwellings had been included, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors. The standard error can also be expressed as a percentage of the estimate, and this is known as the relative standard
- 3. Space does not allow for the separate indication of the standard errors of all estimates in this publication. Tables following these notes show estimated standard errors and standard error percentages for family units and persons responsible for children under twelve years of age, and numbers of children under twelve years of age. These figures will not give a precise measure of the standard error of a particular estimate but they will provide an indication of its magnitude.
- 4. An example of the calculation and the use of standard errors in relation to estimates of family units is as follows. Table 1 (page 9) shows the estimated number of family units in New South Wales who used formal child care only as 62,900. From Table A it can be seen that this estimate has a standard error of about 3,150. Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the value that

would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey would have been within the range 59,750 to 66,050 and about nineteen chances in twenty that it would have been within the range 56,600 to 69,200.



5. Percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling error. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and denominator. The formula for the relative standard error (RSE) of a percentage is given below:

RSE 
$$(x/y) = \sqrt{[RSE(x)]^2 - [RSE(y)]^2}$$

- 6. In this publication, only estimates with relative standard errors less than 30 per cent are considered sufficiently reliable for most purposes. However, estimates with relative standard errors between 30 and 50 per cent have been included and are preceded by an asterisk (e.g. \*6.4) to indicate that they are subject to high standard errors and should be used with caution. Estimates with relative standard errors greater than 50 per cent have been replaced by an asterisk (\*). Although figures for these components can in some cases be derived by subtraction, they should not be regarded as reliable.
- 7. The imprecision due to sampling variability, which is measured by the standard error, should not be confused with inaccuracies that may have occurred because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as the non-sampling error, and they may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or a sample.
