

1. INTRODUCTION

This is the second of a series of the three ABS information papers summarising the views of the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) regarding the 1996 Census output program as a basis for consultation with users.

The first in the series 1996 Census of Population and Housing: ABS Views on Census Output (ABS Cat. No. 2009.0), released in late October 1994, summarised the strategic goals and directions for the 1996 Census Output Program. This second information paper outlines the classifications to be used in Census output. The final in the series 1996 Census of Population and Housing: ABS Views on Census Products and Services (ABS Cat. No. 2011.0) will provide specific proposals for Census products and services, including prototypes of them, for consultation in the second quarter of 1995.

Details about the 1996 Census content, collection operations, confidentiality and privacy protection, processing and evaluation work to be carried out are contained in 1996 Census of Population and Housing: Nature and Content of the Census (ABS Cat. No. 2008.0)

2. AIMS OF THIS PAPER

The aims of this paper are to inform Census users of the classifications proposed to be used in the 1996 Census output and to seek their views on them.

Classifications are used to summarise the diverse range of responses to questions on the Census form to enable efficient statistical processing of the data and facilitate meaningful statistical analysis. To ensure that the data from the 1996 Census are comparable and compatible with data from other ABS collections, the 1996 Census classifications are drawn from the ABS standard classifications where possible. As a result, some of the proposed 1996 Census classifications are different from their 1991 Census counterparts. Where the changes are significant, for example in the case of adopting new classifications in the Census, the ABS will develop concordances to assist users to compare the Census data over time. An example of this is an ANZSIC/ASIC concordance which will compare the new Australian and New Zealand Standard of Industrial Classification (ANZSIC) with the Australian Standard Industrial Classification (ASIC).

Sections 3 to 6 describe changes in census classifications from 1991 to 1996. The ABS welcomes comments on them and also on the classifications themselves which are provided in Section 8 of this paper. Users are requested to provide their comments using the questionnaires provided in Appendices A, B, C and D of this paper.

The software to be used for 1996 Census tabulation has the capability to derive new variables efficiently and readily as required during tabulation. For this reason, many derived variables found on the 1991 unit record file do not need to be included in the 1996 unit record file. Section 3 lists these variables. It also provides the background for the ABS' recommendation to only output CD derived postcodes and postcodes of usual residence but not postcode of dwelling data.

Section 4 summarises major conceptual changes to Census classifications brought about by the implementation of ABS standards for this Census.

Section 5 summarises the suggested changes to 1991 Census classifications. As a number of classifications are still being developed at this stage, namely, the classification of languages, classification of religions and the Australian Standard of Classification of Occupations, the ABS would particularly like to hear users' views about the proposals. An outline of these classifications is also provided in Section 5.

Section 6 summarises the classifications which may change after analysis of the August 1994 Major Test results on the feasibility of collecting such details in the Census.

To bring the Census variables more in line with the ABS standard naming conventions, a number of mnemonics have been changed. These are summarised in Section 7.

3. NEW TOPICS AND CAPABILITY TO DERIVE VARIABLES

There are a number of changes to 1996 Census output variables. Some variables have been reviewed and brought into line with other ABS collections for increased comparability; changes are listed below.

Additional topics will be collected this Census: Number of Children Ever Born (TISP), Statistical Local Area of Usual Residence One Year Ago (SLAU1P), and Dwelling Location (DLOD).

Due to technological changes, less information will need to be stored on the Unit Record File. The software to be used for 1996 Census tabulation has the capability to derive new variables efficiently and readily as required during tabulation. For this reason, many derived variables found on the 1991 unit record file do not need to be included in the 1996 unit record file. The advantage to users of census data will be the increased flexibility of deriving variables for use in customised tabulations, using the Census Consultancy Service.

The tabulation software will be used to derive some variables which will be included in 1996 Census products. These are listed in Section 8.3.

Postcode

In the 1991 Census there were three different postcode statistics available:

- Derived postcodes, based on aggregations of collection districts (CD) to approximate postcodes
- Postcode of usual residence as reported in Question 7
- Postcode of dwelling as reported in Question 1

In the last case, it has been found that a substantial number of reported postcodes of dwellings were incorrect. This was caused by respondent reporting errors where either an incorrect postcode, a post office box postcode, or postcode of usual residence were reported. For example, in one case over fifty different postcodes were reported for one particular CD. It is therefore recommended that only CD derived postcodes and Postcode of Usual Address are made available.

4. NEW CONCEPTS

There has been a number of changes made to Census concepts, the majority of changes being made so that the Census follows ABS standards. An outline of the major changes are below.

Overseas visitors

Data for overseas visitors in Australia on census night will be restricted to Age (AGEP), Sex (SEXP) and Marital Status (MSTP). This change has meant that an Overseas visitor (code V) category has been added to all person variables except for Age, Sex and Marital Status in order to allow identification of overseas visitors when compiling tables.

This change has been proposed for a number of reasons:

- (i) Needs of users of Census data;
- Most users of Census data require overseas visitors to be excluded from tabulations, as they want to make policy and planning decisions based on the Australian population;
- Overseas visitors are considered out of scope in other ABS statistics/data collections;
 for example the Labour Force Survey and the Estimated Resident Population counts and projections;
- Most census data is released as 'enumerated'. This has meant that overseas visitors have been included in many published counts in previous censuses. Some small area data are significantly affected as a result of this practice.
- (ii) Poor data quality;
- Overseas visitor data contains high levels of non response; there are difficulties in coding qualifications, industry and occupation.

Same-sex couples

One change which impacts on a number of family related variables (Relationship in Household, Social Marital Status, Family Type and Household Type) is that, where individuals of the same sex are reported as being in a marriage-like relationship, this information is now used to identify couples and families. Same-sex couples are identified from the responses to Question 5 on the Census form. The ABS seeks to make no judgements in debates about social and moral values which have frequently been the focus of interest in this matter. What the ABS does seek to do is to provide an accurate statistical picture of the structures of society so that such debates, as well as those related to social policy and social support, are able to draw on objective evidence. Until recently the ABS has not processed information that identified persons of the same sex as being in a marriage-like relationship. One outcome of a review of ABS standards for family statistics has been the decision to change that approach.

Child(ren)/Offspring

The term 'child(ren)' will be used instead of 'offspring'.

The category 'dependent children' ('dependent offspring' in 1991) has been split into 'child under 15' and 'dependent student (15-24)'.

Dependent child(ren)

For the 1991 Census, a person (excluding visitors to the household) was considered to be a 'dependent offspring' if s/he was:

aged under 15 years (related or unrelated, excluding boarder/lodgers) or

a full-time student aged 15-24 years (related or unrelated, excluding boarder/lodgers).

For the 1996 Census, a person (excluding visitors to the household) will be considered to be a 'dependent child' if s/he was:

aged under 15 years (related or unrelated to other persons in the household) or

a family child who is a full-time student aged 15-24 years (must be a child of other persons in the household).

Summary of differences: persons aged under 15 years previously coded with a relationship of boarder/lodger will now be dependants; related persons, other than children (ic nieces/nephews, grandchildren etc), aged 15-24 years and studying full-time will not be dependants.

Foster child(ren)

For the 1991 Census, a person (excluding visitors to the household) was considered to be a 'foster child' if s/he was:

aged under 15 years (related, but not a family child (eg sister, niece, grandchild) or unrelated, excluding boarder/lodgers) or

a full-time student aged 15-24 years (related, but not a family child (eg sister, niece, grandchild) or unrelated, excluding boarder/lodgers).

For the 1996 Census it is proposed that, a person (excluding visitors to the household) will be considered to be a 'foster child' if s/he was:

aged under 15 years (related, but not a family child (eg sister, niece, grandchild) or unrelated) or

stated foster child on the Census form.

See the new Relationship in Household (RLIIP) categories, foster child, otherwise related child under 15', 'unrelated child under 15'.

Summary of differences: persons who stated they were foster children will be identified as such; full-time students aged 15-24 years (related, but not a family child (eg sister, niece, grandchild) or unrelated) will not be considered to be foster children.

5. NEW CLASSIFICATIONS AND MAJOR CHANGES TO EXISTING CLASSIFICATIONS

There are a number of proposed changes to Census classifications due to the development of new classifications and the adoption of ABS standard classifications. A summary of the new classifications and major changes in Census classifications are listed below.

Minor changes for example, the addition of bedsitters to *Number of Bedrooms (BEDD)*, are not listed in this Section, but are listed in Section 8.

Some of the above changes are still being tested in the 1996 Census Major Test, see Section 6 for details.

Family

A new ABS family classification has been developed and adopted for the 1996 Census. This classification has changed mainly because of the inclusion of same sex couples and definitional changes to children (see Section 4 for details).

Australian and New Zealand Standard of Industrial Classification (ANZSIC)

In the 1991 Census *Industry (INDP)* was coded using the Australian Standard Industrial Classification (ASIC). It will now be coded using the Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC) which has been developed for use in both countries for the production and analysis of industry statistics.

Language

The Language (LANP) classification is being restructured and updated to improve coverage and to better reflect Australia's language profile at the time of the 1996 Census. User's views are specifically being sought. If you have any comments please fill in the language specific questionnaire in Appendix B.

Religion

The Religion (RELP) classification is currently being restructured and updated to improve coverage and to better reflect the religious affiliations in Australia today and in the future. User's views are specifically being sought. If you have any comments please fill in the questionnaire in Appendix C.

Australian Standard Classification of Occupations (ASCO)

In the 1991 Census Occupation (OCCP) of employed persons were classified according to ASCO. In order to maintain the relevence of ASCO as a national standard, the ABS and Department of Employment, Education and Training (DEET) are undertaking a review of the classification. This will encompass both structure and definitional content changes. Wide spread industry and award restructuring, technological change among other things has lead to this review. For the 1996 Census the resulting second edition of ASCO will be used. Details of the current draft of the classification to unit group level have been included. Information for the more detailed occupation level can be obtained by contacting Ms. Wendy Piper on (06) 252 5757. If you have any comments please fill in the questionnaire in Appendix D.

Location of dwelling

Location of dwelling (DLOD) is a new topic for 1996. Private dwellings will be classified according to whether they are located in caravan parks or marinas, manufactured home estates, retirement villages, or elsewhere.

Issue (Number of Children Ever Born (TISP))

This is a new topic for 1996. A question on the number of children ever born was asked in almost all Australian Censuses up to and including 1986. The question was not included in the 1991 Census as it was not considered necessary to collect data on this topic every five years.

Internal migration

Statistical Local Area (SLA) of Usual Residence One Year Ago (SLAU1P) will be coded this Census (along with usual residence on census night and five years ago). In 1991, usual residence one year ago was collected only at State level.

Housing

It is proposed that rent (RNTD) and housing loan repayments (HRLD) be provided in individual dollar amounts instead of ranges.

The non-private dwelling classification is currently being reviewed. While no changes have yet been proposed, there is a possibility of change before the 1996 Census.

Birthplace

It has been proposed that the United Kingdom not be disaggregated into its constituent countries, England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland for the 1996 Census. Users are asked to comment on this proposal and provide justification for the continued disaggregation of the UK, if applicable.

Indigenous people

Persons whose origin is a mix of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander will be identified as such this Census, see ABLP. In previous Censuses only one origin reported was stored.

The *Industry Sector (GNGP)* classification now includes a category that identifies members of the indigenous population participating in the Community Development Employment Program.

Catholic Educational Institutions

It has been proposed that persons attending Catholic schools be identified separately in Type of Educational Institutions Attending (TYPP). This is subject to Census testing investigations.

Family reference person

Family reference persons were previously identified in Relationship in Household (RLHP) but now appear in the Family/Household Reference Person Indicator (RPIP) variable.

6. CLASSIFICATIONS THAT MAY BE MODIFIED BASED ON RESULTS OF THE 1996 CENSUS MAJOR TEST

The 1996 Census Test program is conducted over a period of 4 years and is designed to test comprehensiviely all aspects of question and form design, as well as collection procedures, classifications and processing systems.

Question and form design testing was conducted in July 1992, March 1993, November 1993, March 1994, and August 1994 (i.e. the Major Test). Indigenous enumeration collection procedures will be further tested in March 1995 and the final test, known as the Dress Rehearsal, will be held in August 1995 to test all aspects from collection through processing and product development.

At each stage, the results of the tests are evaluated to determine if questions are being correctly interpreted and answered. The need for different output categories can be determined by the responses received. Questions which elicit obscure or widely varied answers may be restructured, and common answers provided as tick-box options to reduce respondents' confusion.

Classifications that may change depending on Major Test results

- Dwelling Location (DLOD) the retirement village category may be dropped from this variable.
- Furnished/unfurnished (FUFD) the categories fully furnished and partly furnished may be combined.
- Housing Loan Repayments (HLRD) amounts may be collected in ranges rather than in individual dollar amounts. A proposed set of ranges has been developed for standard Census output, these are the ranges which would be used on the census form. For details of the proposed ranges see the derived variable HLRD01 in Section 8.3.
- Rent (RNTD) amounts may be collected in ranges rather than in individual dollar amounts. A proposed set of ranges has been developed for standard Census output, these are the ranges which would be used on the census form. For details of the proposed ranges see the derived variable RNTD01 in Section 8.3.
- Tenure Type (TEND) the category occupied under a life tenure scheme could be dropped from this variable.
- Type of Educational Institution Attending (TYPP) the addition of Catholic categories for schools is under review.

8. DETAILED PROPOSED CLASSIFICATIONS

Details of the proposed classifications are described below. To make the finding of classifications easier this section separates the Collection District (CD)-based geographic variables from the other classificatory variables on the unit record file as well as from the derived variables.

8.1 CD-based geographic variables

1996 Census data can be provided for two sets of geographic variables. One set of variables is based on the Collection Districts (CD) of enumeration, that is the CD in which the person/family/dwelling was counted on Census night. See the list below. The other set of geographic variables is based on a person's usual address as stated on the Census form or address of employer. Usual residence geographic variables are available at postcode, Statistical Local Arca (SLA) and higher level aggregates of SLAs. The address of employer is coded to a work destination zone. See Section 8.2 (DZNP, DZSP, POCUCP and the SLAU group of variables).

In order to assist in identifying the classification of interest, topic and mnemonic based indexes are provided. If a mnemonic has changed since last census it will appear in brackets within these indexes.


