

KEY POINTS

BALANCE ON GOODS AND SERVICES

- The trend estimate of the *balance on goods and services* was a surplus of \$2,073m in November 2008, an increase of \$355m on a revised surplus in October 2008.
- In seasonally adjusted terms, the balance on goods and services was a surplus of \$1,448m in November 2008, a decrease of \$1,512m on a revised surplus in October 2008.
- The decrease in the seasonally adjusted surplus was primarily due to the strong fall in *goods and services credits*, mainly in *non-rural and other goods*.

CREDITS (EXPORTS OF GOODS & SERVICES)

- Seasonally adjusted, goods and services credits fell \$1,002m (4%) to \$26,932m.
 Non-rural goods fell \$787m (4%), other goods fell \$190m (11%) and rural goods fell \$38m (1%). Services credits rose \$13m.
- The fall in *non-rural goods* was largely driven by the metal ores and minerals component, which fell \$654m (13%).

DEBITS (IMPORTS OF GOODS & SERVICES)

- Seasonally adjusted, goods and services debits rose \$510m (2%) to \$25,484m. Other goods rose \$728m (67%) and consumption goods rose \$124m (2%) while intermediate and other merchandise goods fell \$393m (4%). Services debits rose \$56m (1%).
- The fall in *intermediate and other merchandise goods* was driven by the *fuels and lubricants* component, which fell \$791m (24%).

REVISIONS

Revisions were made to the previous seven months to incorporate the latest available merchandise trade data, and the previous 16 months to incorporate the latest available survey and administrative data relating to international trade in services. In original terms, these revisions have:

- increased the October 2008 surplus by \$133m.
- increased the deficit on goods and services for 2007-08 by \$335m, with:
 - goods and services credits increasing by \$110m.
 - goods and services debits increasing by \$445m, primarily due to services debits where revisions have been applied back to July 2007 due to the latest available data replacing estimated data.

INFORMATION PAPER

An information paper *Changes to International Trade in Goods Industry Statistics, July 2009* (cat. no. 5368.0.55.011) was released on 18 December 2008 and is accessible from the ABS web site <www.abs.gov.au>. The paper briefly advises the timing and implications of the introduction of Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification 2006 (ANZSIC06) in International Trade time series. The paper also describes arrangements for electronically accessing ANZSIC06 and related correspondences.

ANALYSIS AND COMMENTS

BALANCE ON GOODS AND SERVICES

The trend estimate of the balance on goods and services for November 2008 was a surplus of \$2,073m, an increase of \$355m (21%) on the revised surplus in October 2008.

In seasonally adjusted terms, the balance on goods and services in November 2008 was a surplus of \$1,448m, a decrease of \$1,512m (51%) on the revised surplus in October 2008.


EXPORTS OF GOODS AND SERVICES

The trend estimate of goods and services credits rose \$677m (3%) between October and November to \$27,339m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, goods and services credits fell \$1,002m (4%) to \$26,932m. Non-rural goods fell \$787m (4%), other goods fell \$190m (11%) and rural goods fell \$38m (1%). Services credits rose \$13m.

Exports of goods

GOODS CREDITS

RURAL GOODS

In trend terms, exports of rural goods rose \$55m (2%) to \$2,463m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, exports of rural goods fell \$38m (1%) to \$2,505m.

The main components contributing to the fall in the seasonally adjusted estimates were:

- meat and meat preparations, down \$50m (7%)
- cereal grains and cereal preparations, down \$41m (8%).

Partly offsetting these decreases was the other rural component, up \$74m (7%).

In original terms, exports of rural goods fell \$125m (5%) to \$2,555m.

NON-RURAL GOODS

In trend terms, exports of non-rural goods rose \$553m (3%) to \$18,549m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, exports of non-rural goods fell \$787m (4%) to \$18,172m.

The main components contributing to the fall in seasonally adjusted estimates were:

- metal ores and minerals, down \$654m (13%)
- transport equipment, down \$128m (21%)
- coal, coke and briquettes, down \$110m (2%).

Exports of goods continued

NON-RURAL GOODS continued

Partly offsetting these decreases was the machinery component, up \$73m (9%).

In original terms, non-agglomerated iron ore decreased \$942m (26%) with volumes down 24% and prices down 3%. Metallurgical coal decreased \$410m (9%) with volumes down 15% and prices up 8%.

In original terms, exports of non-rural goods fell \$1,830m (9%) to \$18,089m.

OTHER GOODS

In trend terms, exports of other goods rose \$74m (4%) to \$1,720m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, other goods fell \$190m (11%) to \$1,611m.


The main components contributing to the fall in seasonally adjusted estimates were:

- non-monetary gold, down \$142m (9%)
- goods for processing, down \$48m (48%).

In original terms, exports of other goods fell \$196m (11%) to \$1,613m.

Exports of services

SERVICES CREDITS



In trend terms, services credits fell \$5m to \$4,607m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, services credits rose \$13m to \$4,644m.

Components contributing to the rise in the seasonally adjusted estimates were:

- other services, up \$9m (1%)
- transportation services, up \$5m (1%).

In seasonally adjusted terms, tourism related services credits rose \$2m to \$2,819m.


IMPORTS OF GOODS AND SERVICES

The trend estimate of goods and services debits rose 322m (1%) between October and November to 25,266m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, goods and services debits rose \$510m (2%) to \$25,484m. Other goods rose \$728m (67%) and consumption goods rose \$124m (2%), while intermediate and other merchandise goods fell \$393m (4%). Services debits rose \$56m (1%).

Imports of goods

GOODS DEBITS



CONSUMPTION GOODS

In trend terms, imports of consumption goods rose \$46m (1%) to \$5,257m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, imports of consumption goods rose 124m (2%) to 5.370m.

The main components contributing to the rise in the seasonally adjusted estimates were:

- consumption goods n.e.s., up \$95m (6%)
- textiles, clothing and footwear, up \$36m (5%).

Partly offsetting these increases was the non-industrial transport equipment component, down \$31m (2%).

In original terms, imports of consumption goods fell \$341m (6%) to \$5,793m.

CAPITAL GOODS

In trend terms, imports of capital goods rose \$38m (1%) to \$4,412m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, imports of capital goods fell \$5m to \$4,338m.

The main components contributing to the fall in the seasonally adjusted estimates were:

- ADP equipment, down \$72m (9%)
- industrial transport equipment n.e.s., down \$39m (6%).

Offsetting these decreases were:

- civil aircraft, up \$80m (43%)
- machinery and industrial equipment, up \$49m (3%).

In original terms, imports of capital goods fell \$58m (1%) to \$4,588m.

INTERMEDIATE AND OTHER MERCHANDISE GOODS

In trend terms, imports of intermediate and other merchandise goods rose \$108m (1%) to \$9,528m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, imports of intermediate and other merchandise goods fell \$393m (4%) to \$9,299m.

The main component contributing to the fall in the seasonally adjusted estimates was fuels and lubricants, down \$791m (24%).

Partly offsetting this decrease were:

processed industrial supplies n.e.s., up \$171m (8%)

Imports of goods continued

INTERMEDIATE AND OTHER MERCHANDISE GOODS continued

- other parts for capital goods, up \$127m (11%)
- primary industrial supplies n.e.s., up \$72m (40%)
- organic and inorganic chemicals, up \$51m (10%).

In original terms, crude petroleum decreased \$411m (26%) with volumes down 21% and prices down 6%. Refined petroleum oils decreased \$447m (27%) with volumes down 21% and prices down 7%. Contributing to the decrease in refined petroleum oils were:

- gasoline, down \$463m (73%) with volumes down 69% and prices down 13%
- jet fuel, down \$83m (57%) with volumes down 48% and prices down 17%.

Partly offsetting these decreases was diesel, up \$115m (17%), with volumes up 22% and prices down 4%.

In original terms, imports of intermediate and other merchandise goods fell \$1,082m (11%) to \$9,183m.


OTHER GOODS

In trend terms, imports of other goods rose \$104m (8%) to \$1,446m.

In both original terms and seasonally adjusted terms, other goods debits rose \$728m (67%) to \$1,813m. The main components contributing to this increase were non-monetary gold, up \$565m (67%) and goods for processing, up \$156m.

Imports of services

SERVICES DEBITS



In trend terms, services debits rose \$27m (1%) to \$4,624m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, services debits rose \$56m (1%) to \$4,664m.

All components contributed to the rise in the seasonally adjusted estimates with:

- transportation services, up \$36m (2%), driven by freight transportation services, up \$31m (3%)
- other services, up \$18m (1%).

In seasonally adjusted terms, tourism related services debits rose \$7m to \$2,137m.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

INTRODUCTION

- **1** This publication presents preliminary estimates of Australia's international trade in goods and services on a balance of payments basis and merchandise import and export statistics on a recorded trade basis.
- **2** Merchandise trade statistics on a recorded trade basis are compiled from information submitted by exporters and importers or their agents to the Australian Customs Service (ACS). Adjustments for coverage, timing and valuation are made to recorded trade data to convert them to a balance of payments basis. The main source for services data is the quarterly Survey of International Trade in Services.
- **3** More comprehensive quarterly estimates of Australia's trade in goods and services, together with comprehensive details of Australia's balance of payments are included in the quarterly publication, *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position*, *Australia* (cat. no. 5302.0). Detailed monthly statistics on merchandise trade are available on Time Series Spreadsheets or by subscription to tailored services.

CONCEPTS, SOURCES AND METHODS

- **4** The conceptual framework used in compiling Australia's merchandise trade statistics can be found in *International Merchandise Trade*, *Australia: Concepts*, *Sources and Methods*, *2001* (cat. no. 5489.0).
- 5 The conceptual framework used in compiling Australia's balance of payments statistics is based on the Fifth Edition of the International Monetary Fund's *Balance of Payments Manual* (BPM5,1993). Descriptions of the underlying concepts and structure of the balance of payments and the sources, methods and terms used in compiling the estimates are presented in *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia: Concepts, Sources and Methods, 1998* (cat. no. 5331.0). To bring merchandise trade statistics on a recorded trade basis to a balance of payments basis, timing adjustments are made to ensure that the transaction is recorded in the period in which ownership changed, rather than in the period in which the transaction was recorded by ACS. Adjustments are also made to account for the change of ownership of goods not included in merchandise trade statistics. Chapter 6 of cat. no. 5331.0 provides more detail on the relationship between statistics on international merchandise trade on a recorded trade basis and on a balance of payments basis.
- **6** Both of the Concepts, Sources and Methods publications are available to download for free from the ABS website. Select *Methods, Classifications, Concepts & Standards*, then choose *ABS concepts, classifications and statistical standards* and then the catalogue numbers as above.

SEASONAL ADJUSTMENT

- 7 The estimates of international trade in goods and services on a balance of payments basis are seasonally adjusted, however the merchandise exports and imports statistics on a recorded trade basis are not. Monthly original estimates are volatile, being subject to calendar-related and large irregular influences. Seasonally adjusted estimates are derived by estimating and removing from the original series systematic calendar related effects, such as seasonal, trading day, length of month and moving holiday influences. Seasonal adjustment does not aim to remove the irregular or non-seasonal influences which may be present in any particular month. These irregular influences may reflect both random economic events and difficulties of statistical recording.
- **8** The seasonally adjusted statistics in this publication use the concurrent seasonal adjustment technique and Autoregressive Integrated Moving Average (ARIMA) Modelling to estimate factors for the current and previous months. Under concurrent seasonal adjustment, the estimates of seasonal factors are fine tuned as new original estimates become available each period. The seasonally adjusted estimates are subject to revisions at each reference month as the estimates of seasonal factors are improved. For more information on seasonal adjustment methods, see *Information Paper: An Introductory Course on Time Series Analysis, Jan 2005* (cat. no. 1346.0.55.001), *Time Series Analysis*

ARIMA MODELLING

9 ARIMA modelling relies on the characteristics of the series being analysed to project future period data. ARIMA modelling is used on a case-by-case basis where it results in reduced revisions to seasonally adjusted series when subsequent data become available. The projected values are temporary, intermediate values, that are only used internally to improve the estimation of the seasonal factors. The projected data do not affect the original estimates and are discarded at the end of the seasonal adjustment process. The ARIMA model is assessed as part of the annual reanalysis and, following the 2008 annual re-analysis, 41 of the 42 directly seasonally adjusted trade in goods and services time series use an ARIMA model. For more information on the details of ARIMA modelling see *Feature article: Use of ARIMA modelling to reduce revisions* in the October 2004 issue of *Australian Economic Indicators* (cat. no. 1350.0).

TREND ESTIMATES

10 The month-to-month movements of the seasonally adjusted estimates may not be reliable indicators of trend behaviour because they include irregular or non-seasonal movements. Trend estimates are derived by applying a 13-term Henderson moving average to the seasonally adjusted series. The use of a 13-term Henderson average can result in revisions to the estimates for the most recent six months as additional observations become available. Revisions can also occur because of changes in the original data and as a result of the re-estimation of the seasonal factors. SIGN CONVENTION

11 In keeping with balance of payments conventions, where statistics are on a balance of payments basis, credit entries (exports) are shown without sign and debit items (imports) are shown as negative entries. For statistics on a recorded trade basis, both imports and exports are shown without sign. The calculation of percentage changes on balance of payments debit items are made without regard to sign. References to balance of payments debit items in Key Figures, Key Points, and Analysis and Comments are also made without regard to sign.

COMMODITY BREAKDOWNS
OF GOODS

- **12** For details of the classifications used to present goods exports (credits) and imports (debits) on a balance of payments basis, see tables 6.6 and 6.7, respectively, in *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia: Concepts, Sources and Methods, 1998* (cat. no. 5331.0).
- **13** The correspondences used to compile statistics on a Balance of Payments basis were updated in the July 2008 issue with estimates for all time periods recompiled on the basis of the revised correspondences to maintain consistency in the time series.
- **14** The recorded trade statistics shown in tables 12 and 13 are classified by the Standard International Trade Classification (SITC). Imports and exports of goods at a more detailed level are available from the Time Series spreadsheets. All data from July 2005 are presented according to SITC Rev 4 and data prior to July 2005 are presented according to SITC Rev 3. For details refer to the July 2008 issue of this publication.

16 Monthly indicators for many of the services components that are only surveyed quarterly are not available. In particular, the Freight and Other transportation components of Total services credits are not available for publication on a monthly basis. The estimates for these items shown in table 9 are therefore derived by dividing the quarterly estimate by three. Where quarterly survey data are not available, freight debits are derived directly from imports data for the reference month as a difference between total merchandise cost, insurance and freight (CIF) and free on board (FOB), adjusted to reflect timing and processing adjustments. For freight credits and other transportation credits and debits, estimates are derived by extrapolating the last month's data by an average of movements for the same month over the three previous years.

CONFIDENTIALITY OF MERCHANDISE TRADE STATISTICS 17 The release of statistics for certain merchandise trade commodities is restricted in order to prevent the identification of the activities of an individual business, where this is requested by the business concerned. These restrictions do not affect the total value of exports and imports, but they can affect statistics at the country, state and commodity levels. Imports data that have the confidentiality restrictions 'No commodity details' or 'No value details' are aggregated into a single confidential commodity code. For data prior to September 2008, these data are added back into the appropriate state total and country total (i.e. these totals show the correct level of trade). From September 2008 these confidential data are not added back. Instead the confidential data are published as 'No country details' in the country totals and 'State not available for publication' in the state totals. Therefore, country and state totals from September 2008 may not represent the actual amount of trade in each country/state but only the trade in commodities without a 'No commodity details' or 'No value details' restriction. For information on the confidentiality restrictions applied to the merchandise trade statistics in this publication, refer to the current International merchandise trade: Confidential Commodities List (CCL) (cat. no. 5372.0.55.001) which can be accessed from ABS web site.

TOURISM RELATED SERVICES

- **18** The tourism related services memorandum items provide timely indicators of the movements in tourism related activities, not an absolute measure of the level of these activities. These series are not compiled on a balance of payments conceptual basis. However, they do provide a reasonable approximation of world tourism related activities.
- **19** The memorandum items have been derived by re-aggregating relevant components of the international trade in services series of the balance of payments accounts. The tourism related indicator has been derived by combining total travel services (business, education-related and other personal travel) and passenger transportation services (which includes agency fees and commission receipts for air transport).

SERVICES BY STATE AND BY PARTNER COUNTRY

- **20** Annual services data by state and by partner country are released twice yearly. Calendar year data are usually released with the March issue of this publication and financial year data are released with the September issue. Refer to Time series data for details.
- **21** Services credits are classified by the state of provision, while services debits are classified by the state of consumption. The state allocations for transportation, travel and communication services are based on a number of indicators including merchandise trade statistics by state, overseas passenger arrivals and departures by state of clearance and data provided by the Department of Education, Science and Training. The allocation for other services (about 25% of all trade in services) is primarily based on the location of the business reporting the information, which serves as a proxy for the state of provision/consumption of that service. The data should be used with care but are considered suitable for analysis over time.

22 A comprehensive explanation of the data sources used and the methodology applied in the compilation of partner country statistics is provided in Chapter 17 of *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia - Concepts, Sources and Methods* (cat. no. 5331.0). Approximately 7% of total services credits and 5% of total services debits for both 2006–07 and 2007-08 are either confidential, or unable to be allocated to individual countries.

27 The tables in this publication are presented on two bases. Tables 1–11 contain estimates of Australia's international trade in goods and services which have been adjusted for coverage, valuation and timing to a balance of payments basis. Tables 12–15 contain estimates of merchandise exports and imports based on Australian Customs Service records. Paragraph 5 of the Explanatory Notes provides an explanation of the difference between these bases.

28 Where figures have been rounded, discrepancies may occur between sums of the component items and totals. Percentage movements are calculated from data at the level of precision presented in this publication (i.e. \$m) except for international merchandise trade tables.
