NOTES

ABOUT THIS PUBLICATION

This publication presents information about the types of places where people work with particular focus on people who worked at home.

The statistics in this publication were compiled from the Locations of Work survey. This survey was conducted throughout Australia in November 2008 as a supplement to the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) monthly Labour Force Survey (LFS).

The survey provides information about employed people, aged 15 years and over, who were at work in either their main or second job in the reference week. Further details were collected about their locations of work and the number of locations at which they worked and the working arrangements of people who worked at home. It also presents information about the use of information technology, leave entitlements and the main reason for working at home. This information can be cross-classified by a range of demographic statistics such as age, sex, marital status and country of birth.

CHANGES IN THIS ISSUE

A number of new data items have been included in this survey. These are 'State or territory of workplace in main job', 'Region of workplace in main job', 'Location of workplace in main job', 'Occupation and Industry of second job' and 'Whether usually worked at home in main/second job'.

The data item 'Whether had children under 15 years' presented in the 2005 publication has been renamed 'Number of children in family aged under 15 years' to more accurately describe the data item.

From 2008, changes have been made to the data items 'All locations of work' and 'Main location of work': The categories 'Employer's or client's workplace', 'Own workplace' and 'Other workplace' presented in the 2005 publication have been removed as this information was not collected. The category 'Employer's or client's home' has been split into 'Employer's home' and 'Client's home'. The category 'Business premises' presented in the 2005 publication has been renamed 'Workplace'.

The November 2008 Locations of Work survey included changes to the way in which hours usually worked at home in main and/or second job were collected. As a result of this change users should exercise care when comparing hours usually worked at home in main and/or second job in this publication with previous releases. For more information see paragraph 20 of the Explanatory Notes.

NOTES ABOUT THE ESTIMATES

Sample reductions in the Labour Force survey, (see Information Paper: *Labour Force Survey Sample Design, Nov 2007 (Second edition)* (cat. no. 6269.0)), resulted in the Locations of Work survey sample being approximately one-third smaller than the sample size in November 2005.

ROUNDING

As estimates have been rounded, discrepancies may occur between sums of the component items and totals.

CONCEPTUAL FRAMEWORK


CONCEPTUAL FRAMEWORK

The following diagram illustrates the conceptual framework for the 2008 Locations of Work Survey.

In 2008, employed people who were at work in the reference week were asked about the different types of locations at which they worked, and were classified by whether or not they worked any hours at home in either main or second job during the reference week.

Those who worked more hours at their home than any other single location in their main or second job, were defined as people who 'worked only or mainly at home in main or second job'.

The Labour Force Survey (LFS) measures all employed persons, including people who were away from their job during the reference week. In November 2008 there were approximately 10.8 million employed people aged 15 years and over. The Locations of Work Survey specifically measures employed people who were at work during the reference week. In November 2008 there were approximately 10.1 million employed people which represents a 6% decrease on the LFS measure.

OVERVIEW


In November 2008, there were just over 10.1 million people at work in the reference week, an increase of 7.4% since November 2005. Of these:

- 24% worked at least some hours at home in their main or second job, of which 32% worked only or mainly at home (7.6% of all employed people at work in the reference week).
- 34% spent some time travelling for work in their main job
- 41% worked at two or more location types in their main job
- 20% usually worked at least some hours at home in their main job.

Some 576,400 people were multiple jobholders in November 2008. Over one-third (34%) of multiple jobholders usually worked at their home in their second job and 27% spent some time driving or travelling for work in this job.

ALL LOCATIONS OF WORK

EMPLOYED PERSONS AT WORK IN THE REFERENCE WEEK, All locations of work(a)—By main and second job



(a) Refers to all locations of work, therefore people may appear in more than one category.

A greater proportion of people who worked in a second job in the reference week worked at least some hours at their home (36%) compared to 23% of people working in their main job. In contrast, a greater proportion of people working in their main job worked at a workplace (90%) compared to 73% of people working in a second job.

MAIN LOCATION OF WORK

The majority of employed people (82%) at work in the reference week, mainly worked at a workplace in their main job (77% of men and 87% of women). Women were more likely than men to have mainly worked at their home (8% and 5% respectively) but were less likely than men to have mainly spent time travelling for work (2% and 9% respectively).

More than three-quarters (81%) of employed people at work in the reference week were employees (excluding owner managers of incorporated enterprises (OMIEs)). Of these employees (excluding OMIEs), 90% mainly worked at a workplace in their main job, while only 1% mainly worked at their home. In contrast, 50% of owner managers of incorporated and unincorporated enterprises mainly worked at workplaces and 27% mainly worked at their home.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS continued

MAIN LOCATION OF WORK continued

Women, who were owner managers of unincorporated enterprises, were most likely to work at their home (47%) followed by a workplace (43%). In comparison, men, who were owner managers of unincorporated enterprises, were more likely to work at a workplace (46%), compared with their home (21%).

PEOPLE WHO WORKED

ANY HOURS AT HOME IN

MAIN OR SECOND JOB

Of the employed people at work in November 2008, 2.4 million (24%) worked some hours at home in either their main or second job. Of these:

- 45% were women
- 78% were 35 years and over compared with 61% of all employed people
- 41% had children in their family aged less than 15 years compared with 35% of all employed people

The number of people who worked some hours at home as a proportion of all employed people generally increased with age. For example, 3% of those aged 15–19 worked some hours at home, 30% of those aged 35–44 worked some hours at home and 43% of those aged 65 and over worked some hours at home.

Employment characteristics

For men, who worked any hours at home in their main or second job, the most common occupation groups of their job at home were 'Professionals' and 'Managers' (both 31%), and 'Technicians and trades workers' (18%). The most common occupation groups for women, in their job at home, were 'Professionals' (39%), 'Clerical and administrative workers' (23%), and 'Managers' (20%).

The most common industries for men who worked any hours at home in their main or second job were the 'Construction' industry (16%) followed by 'Professional, scientific and technical services' (14%). For women, the most common industries were the 'Education and training' industry (24%) and the 'Professional, scientific and technical services' industry (12%).

Other characteristics of people who worked any hours at home in their main or second job include:


- 76% were full-time workers
- 34% reported that their main reason for doing some work at home was to catch up on work while a further 22% reported 'Wanted office at home/no overheads/no rent'
- 70% of people had an arrangement with their employer to work at home
- 84% of people used information technology at home in that job. Of these:
 - 91% of people who used information technology at home used both the computer and internet
 - 8% only used a computer
 - 1% only used the internet.

PEOPLE WHO WORKED ONLY OR MAINLY AT HOME IN MAIN OR SECOND JOB

There were 764,700 people who worked only or mainly at home in their main or second job in November 2008. Of these:

- 55% were women
- 83% were 35 years and over
- 39% had children in their family aged less than 15 years.

PEOPLE WHO WORKED ONLY OR MAINLY AT HOME IN MAIN OR SECOND JOB continued AGE GROUP (YEARS), Proportion of people who worked only or mainly at home and proportion of all employed people



The proportion of younger people who worked only or mainly work at home in their main or second job was less than the proportion of all employed people. In contrast, the proportion of older people who worked at home was greater than the proportion of all employed people. For example:

Of all people who worked only or mainly at home,

- 4% were aged 15–24 years,
- 29% were aged 35–44 years, and
- 17% were aged 60 years and over.

Of all employed people,

- 17% were aged 15 –24 years,
- 23% were aged 35–44 years, and
- 8% were aged 60 years and over.

PEOPLE WHO WORKED ONLY OR MAINLY AT HOME IN MAIN OR SECOND JOB, Occupation of job worked at home—By sex



For men, who worked only or mainly at home in their main or second job, the most common occupation groups of their job at home were 'Managers' (42%), followed by 'Professionals' (32%) and 'Technicians and trades workers' (9%). By comparison, the most common occupation groups for women, in their job at home, were 'Clerical and administrative workers' (37%), followed by 'Professionals' (23%) and 'Managers' (21%).


SUMMARY OF FINDINGS continued

Employment characteristics continued

Other employment characteristics of people who worked only or mainly at home in their main or second job include:

- 94% had an arrangement with their employer to work at home
- 37% reported that their main reason for working from home was 'Wanted office at home/no overheads/no rent' (37% for both men and women, followed by 'To operate a farm' (30% for men) and 'Flexible working arrangements' (16% for women)
- 31% worked 35 hours or more at home in all jobs.

SINGLE AND MULTIPLE JOBHOLDERS



(a) Multiple jobholders may have worked in either their main and/or second job during the reference week, therefore totals do not add.

There were approximately 9.5 million single jobholders at work in the reference week in November 2008. Just under one-quarter (22%) of these did at least some work at home in their job. Of these, 28% worked only or mainly at their home. Of the single jobholders who worked at home, 34% worked 49 hours or more in their job.

SINGLE AND MULTIPLE JOBHOLDERS continued

Other characteristics of the 9.5 million single jobholders include:

- 62% worked 35 hours or more of which 24% worked at least some hours at home
- 12% were owner managers of unincorporated enterprises
- 81% were employees (excluding OMIEs), of which 77% had paid leave entitlements in their job.

There were 576,400 multiple jobholders at work in the reference week in November 2008. In contrast to single jobholders, 30% of multiple jobholders did some work at home in their main job. Of these, 26% worked 49 hours or more in their main job. Of the multiple job holders who did some work at home, 30% worked only or mainly at their home in their main job.

Other characteristics of the 576,400 multiple jobholders' main job include:

- 40% worked 35 hours or more, of which 37% worked at least some hours at home
- 12% were owner managers of unincorporated enterprises
- 79% were employees (excluding OMIEs), of which 65% had paid leave entitlements.

Some 209,300 (36%) multiple jobholders did some work at home in their second job. Of these, 63% worked only or mainly at their home.

In contrast, characteristics of multiple jobholders' second job include:

- 2% worked 35 hours or more, of which 67% worked at least some hours at home
- 30% were owner managers of unincorporated enterprises
- 61% were employees (excluding OMIEs), of which 22% had paid leave entitlements.

Hours usually worked at home in main and second job^1

There were approximately 2 million people who usually worked at home in their main job (20% of all employed people) in November 2008. Of these:

- 77% usually worked less than 16 hours at home in their main job
- 11% usually worked 35 hours or more at home in their main job

The mean usual hours for employed people who usually worked at home in their main job was 13 hours (14 hours for men and 12 hours for women).

There were 195,400 multiple jobholders who usually worked at home in their second job (34% of all multiple jobholders) in November 2008. Of these:

- 86% usually worked less than 16 hours at home in their second job
- Less than 2% usually worked 35 hours or more at home in their second job.

The mean usual hours for multiple jobholders who usually worked at home in their second job was 8 hours (9 hours for men and 7 hours for women).

EXPLANATORY NOTES

INTRODUCTION

- **1** The statistics in this publication were compiled from data collected in the Locations of Work survey that was conducted throughout Australia in November 2008 as a supplement to the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) monthly Labour Force Survey (LFS). Respondents to the LFS who fell within the scope of the supplementary survey were asked further questions.
- **2** The publication *Labour Force, Australia* (cat. no. 6202.0) contains information about survey design, sample redesign, scope, coverage and population benchmarks relevant to the monthly LFS, which also apply to supplementary surveys. It also contains definitions of demographic and labour force characteristics, and information about telephone interviewing which are relevant to both the monthly LFS and supplementary surveys.

CONCEPTS, SOURCES AND METHODS

- **3** The conceptual framework used in Australia's LFS aligns closely with the standards and guidelines set out in Resolutions of the International Conference of Labour Statisticians. Descriptions of the underlying concepts and structure of Australia's labour force statistics, and the sources and methods used in compiling these estimates, are presented in *Labour Statistics: Concepts, Sources and Methods* (cat. no. 6102.0.55.001).
- **4** The scope of the LFS is restricted to people aged 15 years and over and excludes the following people:
 - members of the permanent defence forces
 - certain diplomatic personnel of overseas governments, customarily excluded from the census and estimated populations
 - overseas residents in Australia
 - members of non-Australian defence forces (and their dependants).
- **5** Students at boarding schools, patients in hospitals, residents of homes (e.g. retirement homes, homes for people with disabilities), and inmates of prisons are excluded from all supplementary surveys.
- **6** This supplementary survey was conducted in both urban and rural areas in all states and territories, but excluded people living in Indigenous communities in very remote parts of Australia.
- **7** The survey was restricted to employed people aged 15 years and over who were at work in either their main or second job in the reference week in November 2008.
- **8** The estimates in this publication relate to people covered by the survey in November 2008. In the LFS, coverage rules are applied which aim to ensure that each person is associated with only one dwelling, and hence has only one chance of selection in the survey. See *Labour Force, Australia* (cat. no. 6202.0) for more details.
- **9** Supplementary surveys are not always conducted on the full LFS sample. Since August 1994 the sample for supplementary surveys has been restricted to no more than seven-eighths of the LFS sample.
- **10** The LFS sample size in November 2008 was approximately one-third smaller than the sample size in November 2005. This is due to an 11% sample reduction that was implemented from November 2007 to June 2008 based on the 2006 sample design, and an additional 24% sample reduction implemented in July 2008. Detailed information about the sample reduction is provided in Information Paper: *Labour Force Survey Sample Design, Nov 2007 (Second edition)* (cat.no.6269.0).
- **11** The reduced sample will still be representative, with selections made across all parts of Australia.

12 The initial sample for the November 2008 LFS consisted of 27,480 private dwelling households and special dwelling units. Of the 22,165 private dwelling households and special dwelling units that remained in the survey after sample loss (e.g. households selected in the survey which had no residents in scope for the LFS, vacant or derelict dwellings and dwellings under construction), approximately 21,005 or 94.8% were fully responding to the Locations of Work survey. The number of completed interviews obtained from these private dwellings and special dwelling units (after taking into account scope, coverage and subsampling exclusions) was 20,885.

RELIABILITY OF THE ESTIMATES

- **13** Estimates in this publication are subject to sampling and non-sampling errors:
 - Sampling error is the difference between the published estimate and the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. For further information refer to the Technical Note.
- Non-sampling errors are inaccuracies that occur because of imperfections in reporting by respondents and interviewers, and errors made in coding and processing data. These inaccuracies may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient processing procedures.

SEASONAL FACTORS

14 The estimates are based on information collected in the survey month and, due to seasonal factors, may not be representative of other months of the year.

CLASSIFICATIONS USED

- **15** Country of birth data are classified according to the *Standard Australian Classification of Countries (SACC)*, *1998* (cat. no. 1269.0).
- **16** From 2006, occupation data are classified according to *ANZSCO—Australian and New Zealand Standard Classification of Occupations, First Edition, 2006* (cat. no.1220.0). This new classification replaces *ASCO—Australian Standard Classification of Occupations, Second Edition, 1997* (cat. no. 1220.0). Data classified according to ASCO can be obtained on request.
- **17** Also from 2006, industry data are classified according to the *Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC), 2006* (cat. no. 1292.0). This new classification replaces the *Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC), 1993* (cat. no. 1292.0). Data classified according to ANZSIC 1993 can be obtained on request.

COMPARABILITY OF TIME SERIES

- **18** The data item 'Whether had children under 15 years' presented in the 2005 publication has been renamed 'Number of children in family aged under 15 years' to more accurately describe the data item.
- **19** From 2008, changes have been made to the data items 'All locations of work' and 'Main location of work': The categories 'Employer's or client's workplace', 'Own workplace' and 'Other workplace' presented in the 2005 publication have been removed as this information was not collected. The category 'Employer's or client's home' has been split into 'Employer's home' and 'Client's home'. The category 'Business premises' presented in the 2005 publication has been renamed 'Workplace'.
- 20 The November 2008 Locations of Work survey included changes to the way in which hours usually worked at home in main or second job were collected. From 2008, people did not have to work in their main job, however had to work in a job in the reference week to have their usual hours worked at home in their main job collected. In 2005, only people who actually worked at home in the reference week had their usual hours worked at home in their main job collected. For multiple jobholders in 2008, people had to work in their second job in the reference week to have their usual hours worked at home in second job collected. In 2005, only people who actually worked at

home in their second job in the reference week had their usual hours worked at home in their second job collected. Users should exercise care when comparing hours usually worked at home in main and/or second job in this publication with previous releases.

21 Revisions are made to population benchmarks for the LFS after each five-yearly Census of Population and Housing. The last such revision was made in February 2004 to take account of the results of the 2001 Census of Population and Housing. Estimates from supplementary surveys conducted from and including February 2004 are therefore based on revised population benchmarks.

COMPARABILITY WITH
MONTHLY LFS STATISTICS

- **22** Due to differences in the scope and sample size of this supplementary survey and that of the LFS, the estimation procedure may lead to some small variations between labour force estimates from this survey and those from the LFS.
- 23 The LFS measures all employed persons, including people who were away from their job during the reference week. In November 2008 there were approximately 10.8 million employed people aged 15 years and over. The Locations of Work Survey specifically measures employed people who were at work during the reference week. In November 2008 there were approximately 10.1 million employed people which represents a 6% decrease on the LFS measure.

PREVIOUS SURVEYS

- **24** Results of similar surveys, conducted in April 1989, March 1992 and September 1995 were published in *Persons Employed at Home, Australia* (cat. no. 6275.0).
- 25 This survey was redesigned and renamed Locations of Work for June 2000. Conceptual changes were made to better align the survey with the guidelines and recommendations of the International Labour Organisation Home Work Convention, 1996. The June 2000 survey defined people who were 'employed at home in their main or second job in the reference week', as those who worked:
 - all or most hours at their own home;
 - all or most hours at the home of another person (excluding the home of their employer or client); or
 - less hours at their own home than elsewhere but had an arrangement with their employer to work at home.

NEXT SURVEY

26 The ABS plans to conduct this survey again in November 2014.

TECHNICAL NOTE DATA QUALITY

INTRODUCTION

- **1** Estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they are subject to sampling variability. That is, they may differ from those estimates that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error (SE), which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about two chances in three (67%) that a sample estimate will differ by less than one SE from the number that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about 19 chances in 20 (95%) that the difference will be less than two SEs. Another measure of the likely difference is the relative standard error (RSE), which is obtained by expressing the SE as a percentage of the estimate.
- **2** Due to space limitations, it is impractical to print the SE of each estimate in the publication. Instead, a table of SEs is provided to enable readers to determine the SE for an estimate from the size of that estimate (see table T1). The SE table is derived from a mathematical model, referred to as the 'SE model', which is created using data from a number of past Labour Force Surveys. It should be noted that the SE model only gives an approximate value for the SE for any particular estimate, since there is some minor variation between SEs for different estimates of the same size.
- **3** The LFS sample size in September 2008 was approximately one-third smaller than the sample size in September 2007. This is due to an 11% sample reduction that was implemented from November 2007 to June 2008 based on the 2006 sample design, and an additional 24% sample reduction implemented in July 2008. In combination, the two sample reductions are expected to increase the standard errors for estimates from the supplementary surveys by approximately 22% at the broad aggregate level, relative to the 2001 sample design (standard errors will vary at lower aggregate levels). Detailed information about the sample reduction is provided in *Information Paper: Labour Force Survey Sample Design, Nov 2007 (Second edition)* (cat. no. 6269.0).

CALCULATION OF STANDARD ERROR

4 An example of the calculation and the use of SEs in relation to estimates of people is as follows. Table 6 shows the estimated number of employed men at work in the reference week in Australia, whose main location of work in their main job was at their own home, to be 290,200. Since this estimate is between 200,000 and 300,000, table T1 shows that the SE for Australia will lie between 6,400 and 7,600 and can be approximated by interpolation using the following general formula:


=7,500 (rounded to the nearest 100)

$$= lower SE + \left(\left(\frac{size\ of\ estimate - lower\ estimate}{upper\ estimate - lower\ estimate} \right) \times (upper\ SE - lower\ SE) \right)$$

$$= 6.400 + \left(\left(\frac{290,200 - 200,000}{300,000 - 200,000} \right) \times (7,600 - 6,400) \right)$$

5 Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey will fall within the range 282,700 to 297,700 and about 19 chances in 20 that the value will fall within the range 275,200 to 305,200. This example is illustrated in the diagram below.



- **6** In general, the size of the SE increases as the size of the estimate increases. Conversely, the RSE decreases as the size of the estimate increases. Very small estimates are thus subject to such high RSEs that their value for most practical purposes is unreliable. In the tables in this publication, only estimates with RSEs of 25% or less are considered reliable for most purposes. Estimates with RSEs greater than 25% but less than or equal to 50% are preceded by an asterisk (e.g. *3.4) to indicate they are subject to high SEs and should be used with caution. Estimates with RSEs of greater than 50%, preceded by a double asterisk (e.g. **0.3), are considered too unreliable for general use and should only be used to aggregate with other estimates to provide derived estimates with RSEs of less than 25%. Table T2 presents the levels at which estimates have RSEs of 25% and 50%.
- **7** The RSEs of estimates of mean actual hours worked at home in main or second job is obtained by first finding the RSE of the estimate of the total number of people contributing to the mean (see table T1) and then multiplying the resulting number by the following factors:
- mean hours (actually/usually) worked: 0.8
- **8** The following is an example of the calculation of SEs where the use of a factor is required. Table 15 shows that the estimated mean actual hours worked at home in second job for men in Australia, who did some work at home, was 8.1 hours, and shows that the number of men at work in the reference week who did some work at home in their second job was estimated as 98,000. The SE of 98,000 can be calculated from table T1 (by interpolation) as 4,900. To convert this to an RSE we express the SE as a percentage of the estimate or 4,900/98,000 = 5.0%.
- **9** The RSE of the estimate of mean actual hours worked at home in second job for men, who did some work at home, is calculated by multiplying this number (5.0%) by the appropriate factor shown in paragraph 7 (in this case 0.8): $5.0 \times 0.8 = 4.0\%$. The SE of this estimate of mean actual hours worked at home in second job for men, who did some work at home, is therefore 4.0% of 8.0, i.e. 0.3 of one hour. Therefore, there are two chances in three that the mean actual hours worked at home in second job for men, who did some work at home, that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included in the survey would have been within the range 7.7 hours to 8.3 hours, and about 19 chances in 20 that it would have been within the range 7.4 hours to 8.6 hours.
- **10** Proportions and percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling errors. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and the denominator. A formula to approximate the RSE of a proportion is given below. This formula is only valid when x is a subset of y.

$$RSE\left(\frac{x}{y}\right) = \sqrt{\left[RSE(x)\right]^2 - \left[RSE(y)\right]^2}$$

11 Considering the example from the previous page, of the 290,200 employed men at work in the reference week whose main location of work was at their own home, 71,200 or 25% were born overseas. The SE of 71,200 may be calculated by interpolation as 4,300. To convert this to an RSE we express the SE as a percentage of the estimate, or 4,300/71,200 = 6.0%. The SE for 290,200 was calculated previously as 7,500, which converted to an RSE is 7,500/290,200 = 2.6%. Applying the above formula, the RSE of the proportion is:

$$RSE = \sqrt{(6.0)^2 - (2.6)^2} = 5.4\%$$

- **12** Therefore, the SE for the proportion of employed men at work in the reference week whose main location of work was at their own home who were born overseas is 1.3 percentage points (=(24.5/100)x5.4). Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the proportion of employed men at work in the reference week, whose main location of work was at their own home and were born overseas is between 23.2% and 25.8%, and 19 chances in 20 that the proportion is within the range 21.9% to 27.1%.
- **13** Published estimates may also be used to calculate the difference between two survey estimates (of numbers or percentages). Such an estimate is subject to sampling error. The sampling error of the difference between two estimates depends on their SEs and the relationship (correlation) between them. An approximate SE of the difference between two estimates (x-y) may be calculated by the following formula: $SE(x-y) = \sqrt{[SE(x)]^2 + [SE(y)]^2}$
- **14** While this formula will only be exact for differences between separate and uncorrelated characteristics or subpopulations, it is expected to provide a good approximation for all differences likely to be of interest in this publication.

GLOSSARY

Another home

Includes employer's home, client's home and other home.

Arrangement to work at home

A mutual agreement (whether formal or informal) between the employee and employer for people to work from their home. The agreement may be verbal, in writing or implicit in the employee's working arrangements. Owner managers and contributing family workers, who worked any hours at home, were defined as having an arrangement to work at home.

Contributing family workers

A person who works without pay, in an economic enterprise operated by a relative.

Employed

People aged 15 years and over who, in the reference week:

- worked for one hour or more for pay, profit, commission or payment in kind, in a job or business or on a farm (comprising employees, employers and own account workers): or
- worked for one hour or more without pay in a family business or on a farm (i.e. contributing family workers); or
- were employees who had a job but were not at work and were:
 - away from work for less than four weeks up to the end of the reference week; or
 - away from work for more than four weeks up to the end of the reference week and received pay for some or all of the four week period to the end of the reference week; or
 - away from work as a standard work or shift arrangement; or
 - on strike or locked out; or
 - on workers' compensation and expected to return to their job; or
- were employers or own account workers who had a job, business or farm, but were not at work.

Employed people at work

People who were employed, and worked one hour or more in their main or second job in the reference week.

Employees

People who:

- worked for a public or private employer; and
- received remuneration in wages, salary, or are paid a retainer fee by their employer and worked on a commission basis, or for tips or piece-rates or payment in kind; or
- operated their own incorporated enterprise with or without hiring employees.

Employees at work

In this publication, employees at work in the reference week, refer to people who were employees in their main and/or second job. For example, a person may be an own account worker in their main job and an employee in their second job and are therefore included in any 'Employee' population/s.

Employers

People who operate their own unincorporated economic enterprise or engage independently in a profession or trade, and hire one or more employees.

Employment type

Classifies employed people according to the following employment type categories on the basis of their main job (that is, the job in which the most hours were usually worked):

- Employees (excluding OMIEs)
 - With paid leave entitlements
 - Without paid leave entitlements
- Owner managers of incorporated enterprises
- Owner managers of unincorporated enterprises
- Contributing family workers.

Full-time workers

Employed people who usually worked 35 hours or more a week (in all jobs) and others who, although usually working less than 35 hours a week, worked 35 hours or more in the reference week.

Hours usually worked at home in main job

The hours that people usually worked at home in their main job. People did not have to

work in their main job, however had to work in a job in the reference week, to have their usual hours worked at home in their main job collected.

Hours usually worked at home

in second job

The hours that people usually worked at home in their second job. People had to work in their second job in the reference week to have their usual hours worked at home in their second job collected.

Incorporated enterprise

An enterprise which is registered as a separate legal entity to its members or owners (also known as a limited liability company).

Industry

In this publication, industry refers to ANZSIC Division, as classified according to the *Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC)*, 2006 (cat. no. 1292.0).

Job at home

Refers to the job in which people work at home, which may be either their main or second job.

Locations of work

The different types of places where people work. These include traditional workplaces, such as offices and factories and other workplace premises; homes, including both own home and other homes; non-fixed locations for people who travel for work; other locations of work including public places like parks, streets or beaches.

Main English-speaking countries

ies

The list of main English-speaking countries provided here is not an attempt to classify countries on the basis of whether or not English is the predominant or official language of each country. It is a list of the main countries from which Australia receives, or has received, significant numbers of overseas settlers who are likely to speak English. These countries comprise the United Kingdom, the Republic of Ireland, New Zealand, Canada, South Africa and the United States of America.

Main job

The job in which most hours are usually worked.

Main location of work

The location where the most hours were worked in the survey reference week.

Multiple jobholder

Employed people who, in the reference week worked in a second job. Multiple jobholders exclude those who changed employer and those who held a second job from which they were absent in the reference week because of holidays, sickness or any other reason.

Occupation

An occupation is a collection of jobs that are sufficiently similar in their title and tasks, skill level and skill specialisation which are grouped together for the purposes of classification. In this publication occupation refers to Major Group as defined by *ANZSCO—Australian Standard Classification of Occupations, First Edition, 2006* (cat. no. 1220.0).

Other home

Any other place of usual residence, other than the person's own home or their employer's or client's home. Examples include a co-worker's, friend's or relative's home.

GLOSSARY continued

Own-account worker People who operate his or her own unincorporated economic enterprise or engage

independently in a profession or trade, and hires no employees.

Own home Home in which the respondent lives, excluding home of employer or client or other

home.

Owner managers People who work in their own business, with or without employees, whether or not the

business is an incorporated enterprise. Comprises owner managers of incorporated

enterprises and owner managers of unincorporated enterprises.

Owner managers of incorporated enterprises

People who work in their own incorporated enterprise, that is, a business entity which is registered as a separate legal entity to its members or owners (also known as a limited

liability company).

Owner managers of unincorporated enterprises

People who operate their own unincorporated enterprise, that is, a business entity in which the owner and the business are legally inseparable, so that the owner is liable for any business debts that are incurred. Includes those engaged independently in a trade or profession. These people are classified as employers under 'status in employment' if their

business has employees, or own account workers if they do not.

leave (or both) in their current job. People employed in their own business or who were contributing family workers were not asked questions about paid leave entitlements.

Part-time workers Employed people who usually worked less than 35 hours a week (in all jobs) and who

did so during the reference week.

Reference week The week preceding the week in which the interview was conducted.

Second job Refers to a job other than the main job.

Single jobholders People who worked in one job or business in the reference week, including those who

changed jobs during the week but only had one job at a time.

Status in employment Employed people classified by whether they were employees, employers, own account

workers or contributing family workers.

Travelling Any journey made as part of a person's work, whether on land, air, water, by vehicle or

on foot. This includes: travelling by road on behalf of employer or business, trips between different client's premises for work purposes, travel to other towns, cities or countries and trips to collect supplies. Commuting to and from work is excluded.

Worked any hours at home Refers to people who, in the reference week, worked at least some hours, or did any

work at home in their main or second job.

Worked only or mainly at Employed people who, in the reference week, worked more hours at their own home

than any other single location in their main or second job.

Workplace Any non-residential location or premises where the main purpose is the conduct of a

business, producing goods or providing a service. Examples include shops, factories, offices, warehouses, building sites, farms (other than a respondent's home property).
