INTRODUCTION

This publication presents monthly information on persons in custody, and the statistics are derived from information collected by the ABS from administrative records held by corrective services agencies in each State and Territory. Details are provided for each State and Territory, together with numbers and imprisonment rates by type of custody (i.e. open or secure prison custody or periodic detention). Information is also presented on prisoner numbers by legal status (sentenced or unsentenced) and by sentence type, for all prisoners and for Indigenous prisoners, together with the number of sentenced receptions into custody and the number of federal prisoners.

The ABS has been producing quarterly prisoner statistics since 1995, based on a methodology established by the Australian Institute of Criminology. These statistics were released as reports to the Corrective Services Minister's Council. Following a review of this collection in 1997, the scope of the collection was expanded from January 1998 to include all persons in custody in Australia. Thus, periodic detainees in New South Wales and the Australian Capital Territory are now included, as are persons in Work Outreach Camps (WORC) and Community Custody Centres (CCC) in Queensland. The collection also now includes a greater range of data items in relation to the total prisoner population and the Indigenous prisoner population.

The statistics in this publication are sourced from this expanded collection. Most series in this publication commence from March 1998, with the exception of series in table 1. Table 1 covers periods from January 1997 and has been compiled from data obtained in the old and new collections, together with data on the numbers of persons in WORCs and CCCs in Queensland in 1997.

The ABS is continuing work on the development of corrective service statistics, particularly in relation to community based corrections statistics and information on the flows of persons through the corrective service system. It is intended that, in future, some statistical series will be analysed for seasonal variation, and that trend analysis will also be undertaken

The valuable contribution of the Board of Management and the Advisory Group of the National Corrective Services Statistics Unit (NCSSU) to the production of this publication is acknowledged.


NUMBER OF PRISONERS

In the June quarter 1998, the average number of prisoners in Australia was 18,692, an increase of 457 (2.5%) on the March quarter 1998. Queensland, New South Wales and Victoria were the major contributors to this increase, rising by 179 (3.8%), 121 (1.9%) and 106 (3.9%) respectively. There was a decrease in South Australia of 32 prisoners (-2.2%).

Of all prisoners in the June quarter 1998, 6,401 (34.2%) were in New South Wales. Queensland accounted for another 4,888 (26.2%) prisoners. Victoria and Western Australia contributed 2,794 (14.9%) and 2,292 (12.3%) respectively.

The average number of prisoners in Australia increased by 1,070 (6.1%) over the year from the June quarter 1997. Queensland and Victoria accounted for nearly all of this increase, with smaller increases in New South Wales, Western Australia, Tasmania and the Northern Territory. These increases were partly offset by decreases in South Australia, down by 100 (-6.7%) and the Australian Capital Territory (including Australian Capital Territory prisoners held in New South Wales prisons), down by 9 (-6.6%).

PERSONS IN PRISON CUSTODY, Australia




RATES PER 100,000 ADULTS

Nationally, the daily average imprisonment rate was 133.0 prisoners per 100,000 adult population during the June quarter 1998 compared to 130.2 in the March quarter 1998, and 126.3 in the June quarter 1997. The Northern Territory had the highest rate of 451.6 prisoners per 100,000 adult population, substantially greater than the next highest, Queensland and Western Australia with rates of 189.1 and 171.5 prisoners per 100,000 adult population respectively.

RATES PER 100,000 ADULTS continued

From the March quarter 1998 to the June quarter 1998, the national rate increased by 2.2%. The greatest increases were in Tasmania (8.7%), Victoria (3.6%) and Queensland (3.3%). The rate for South Australia decreased by 2.4% over the same period.

Of the average number of prisoners in Australia during the June quarter 1998, 17,664 (94.5%) were males and 1,028 (5.5%) were females. The proportion of prisoners who were female ranged from 6.8% in Western Australia and 6.6% in the Australian Capital Territory (including Australian Capital Territory in New South Wales) to 3.9% in Tasmania.

TYPE OF CUSTODY

There was an average of 13,200 prisoners (70.6%) in secure prison custody in Australia during the June quarter 1998, with the remaining 5,491 prisoners (29.4%) held in open prison custody. The highest proportion of prisoners held in secure prisons was recorded in Victoria (87.6%), followed by South Australia (86.4%). The State or Territory with the lowest proportion of prisoners in secure prison custody was the Australian Capital Territory, with 45.0%. All female prisoners in South Australia, Tasmania and the Northern Territory were held in secure prison custody.

LEGAL STATUS AND SENTENCE TYPE

On 1 June 1998, there were 18,722 prisoners in Australia. Of these, 15,978 (85.3%) were sentenced and 2,744 (14.8%) were unsentenced. The Australian Capital Territory, including Australian Capital Territory prisoners held in New South Wales prisons, had the highest proportion of unsentenced persons in prison custody (24.7%), followed by Tasmania (19.4%). Queensland and Western Australia recorded the lowest proportions of unsentenced persons in prison custody (10.5% and 12.9% respectively).

SENTENCED RECEPTIONS

Information on sentenced receptions is not currently available for New South Wales (see Explanatory Note 10). Of the other States and Territories, Queensland recorded the highest number of sentenced receptions during the June quarter 1998 with 2,746 prisoners followed by 790 in South Australia and 725 in Western Australia. The highest sentenced reception rates were recorded in the Northern Territory, followed by Queensland (348.1 and 106.2 persons per 100,000 adult population respectively). Their rates were substantially higher than those for the other jurisdictions, particularly the Australian Capital Territory prisoners held in New South Wales prisons where there were 11.6 sentenced receptions per 100,000 adult population.

INDIGENOUS PRISONERS

Information on Indigenous prisoners is not currently available for New South Wales (see Explanatory Note 10). Of the other States and Territories, on 1 June 1998 the highest number of Indigenous persons in prison custody was recorded in Queensland (1,075), followed by Western Australia (747) and the Northern Territory (426). The highest proportion of the persons in prison custody who were Indigenous was recorded in the Northern Territory, where 71.7% of all prisoners were Indigenous, followed by Western Australia (32.7%) and Queensland (22.0%). The highest rates of Indigenous imprisonment were recorded in Western Australia (2,356.8 Indigenous persons per 100,000 adult Indigenous population), South Australia (1,934.5) and Queensland (1,762.7). The highest ratio of Indigenous to non-Indigenous rates of imprisonment was also recorded in Western Australia, which had an Indigenous rate of imprisonment 20.0 times the non-Indigenous rate.

PERIODIC DETENTION

In addition to persons in full-time prison custody, there was an average of 1,463 persons in New South Wales and 77 persons in the Australian Capital Territory during the June quarter 1998 held in periodic detention.

FEDERAL PRISONERS

On 1 June 1998, there were 528 federal prisoners in Australia, of whom approximately half (49.1%) were sentenced in New South Wales courts.

INTRODUCTION

- **1** This publication presents monthly and quarterly statistical series on persons held in adult corrective services custody in Australia. It contains data on the number of persons in prison custody by their legal status and sentence type, the number of sentenced persons received into prison each month, the number of Indigenous persons in prison custody by their legal status and sentence type, and the number of federal prisoners each month.
- **2** Statistics presented in this publication are compiled in three ways:
- Average daily prisoner population: Counts taken on each day of the month are summed and divided by the number of days in that month to determine the average daily prisoner population for that month. The average daily periodic detainee population is a count of persons on periodic detention on each day a centre is open, divided by the number of days a centre is open.
- Sentenced prisoner reception figures: Counts are taken of the number of receptions where a prisoner is received as a sentenced prisoner plus the number of changes of legal status from unsentenced to sentenced.
- First day of the month prisoner population: Counts of prisoner populations, taken on or near the first day of the month (see Explanatory Note 4).
- **3** Statistics in this publication are derived from administrative systems maintained by State and Territory corrective services agencies. Although national standards and classifications are used in the compilation of these statistics, some discrepancies remain between the States and Territories. These are due to legislative and procedural differences between jurisdictions. As part of its development strategy, the ABS is working with corrective services agencies to minimise the effect of these differences.

REFERENCE PERIOD/DATE

- **4** For the average daily prisoner population and the sentenced prisoner receptions counts, the reference period is the complete reference month. For all other information in the publication, the reference date is the first day of the month. However, not all States and Territories report strictly according to this 'first day of the month' rule:
- The Western Australian and Victorian prison population and Australian Capital Territory prisoners in New South Wales prisons are counted as at midnight on the last day of the month. In these cases the figures provided are taken to represent the prison population at the beginning of the following month to align with practices in other States and Territories.
- The New South Wales prison population is counted on the first Sunday of the month.
- **5** Calculation of figures for the entire quarter varies depending on the counting unit and method of counting prisoners:
- Average daily figures: Quarterly figures are calculated by weighting the average according to the number of days in each month.
- First day of the month: Quarterly figures are simple averages, i.e. the figures for each month are added and the total is divided by three.
- Sentenced receptions: Quarterly figures are totals of each month.

SCOPE

- **6** The scope of the statistics in this publication includes all persons remanded or sentenced to adult custodial corrective services agencies in each State and Territory in Australia.
- **7** In all States and Territories except New South Wales, South Australia and Western Australia, persons remanded or sentenced to adult custody are aged 17 years and over. Persons under 17 years are treated as juveniles in most Australian courts and are not remanded or sentenced to custody in adult prisons, other than in exceptional circumstances. However, in New South Wales, South Australia and Western Australia 'adult' refers to persons aged 18 years and over.
- **8** The statistics include persons in WORCs and CCCs in Queensland. In Table 1 these persons have been counted on a first day of the month basis from April to December 1997. However the figures in the rest of the table, and the rest of persons in prison custody in Queensland, were counted on a daily average basis.

DATA SOURCE

- **9** Statistics in this publication are derived from information collected by the ABS from administrative records held by corrective services agencies within each State and Territory. Statistics on federal prisoners are derived from records kept by the Criminal Law Division of the Commonwealth Attorney-General's Department.
- **10** Statistics marked 'n.a.' in tables 3, 4, 5 and 6 are not available for inclusion in this publication. New South Wales Department of Corrective Services recently purchased a new computer system, and will undertake programming work to enable provision of counts of sentenced receptions and Indigenous persons in custody at some stage in the future. Staff in the Victorian Office of the Correctional Services Commissioner are currently updating their computer system to enable counting of sentenced persons in custody by whether fine default only or other sentenced. The Victorian computer system was modified to produce counts of Indigenous persons in February 1998, enabling the numbers for the first day of March to be provided. The January figures were counted manually.

INDIGENOUS IDENTIFICATION

- **11** In all States and Territories persons are asked whether they are Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islanders during entry into custody. It is uncommon for corrective services agencies to collect Indigenous status information from sources other than the person's own identification.
- **12** Some persons in custody are recorded as of unknown Indigenous status on corrective services agencies' information systems, but unknown Indigenous status has not been provided for this collection. It is intended that unknown Indigenous status will be collected from these systems in future.
- **13** Table 5 shows the ratio of Indigenous to non-Indigenous rates of imprisonment. To derive these figures the rates per 100,000 adult non-Indigenous population were calculated as if all those persons not identified as Indigenous are non-Indigenous.

AUSTRALIAN CAPITAL TERRITORY PRISONERS

14 The Australian Capital Territory has a detention centre for unsentenced prisoners and a periodic detention centre, but does not have a facility to hold persons sentenced to full-time custody. Persons sentenced to full-time custody in Australian Capital Territory criminal courts are held in New South Wales prisons. To provide greater understanding of the number of prisoners attributed to the Australian Capital Territory while presenting an accurate picture of the New South Wales prisoner population, statistics relating to Australian Capital Territory prisoners in New South Wales prisons are presented as a subset of the New South Wales figures.

RATES AND RATIOS

- **15** Imprisonment rates enable comparison of prisoner numbers across States and Territories. Prisoner rates are expressed per 100,000 adult population, which is in accord with international and State and Territory practice.
- **16** For the purpose of this publication the population figures used in the calculation of rates are for persons aged 17 years and over for all States and Territories except New South Wales, South Australia and Western Australia where the population used is persons aged 18 and over (see Explanatory Note 6).
- **17** Rates for the Indigenous adult population in this publication are based on revised projections for 30 June 1998 (refer *Experimental Projections of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Population* (Cat. no. 3231.0)) These projections are in turn based on the results of the 1996 Census of Population and Housing.
- **18** Two series of these projections have been published. The so-called "higher series" takes into account a possible change in propensity for people to identify themselves as Indigenous since the last Population Census and estimates this from the last inter-censal period. The lower series assumes no such change has taken place since 1996. The lower of the two series was used in calculating rates for the Indigenous adult population in this publication. This is because, in discussions with representatives of Corrective Services agencies, it was felt that the propensity to identify as Indigenous has not increased to the same extent in the prison environment as might have occurred in the wider community.
- **19** Rates for the total prisoner population are calculated using the Estimated Resident Population (ERP) for each of the States and Territories (refer ABS *Estimated Resident Population by Sex and Age, States and Territories of Australia* (Cat. no. 3201.0)). As the population changes over time the denominator used for the calculation of rates will vary, depending on the reference period. The following shows the reference periods and the related ERP data for this issue:

RATES AND RATIOS continued

- **20** The ratio of imprisonment rates of Indigenous persons to non-Indigenous persons is calculated by dividing the Indigenous imprisonment rate for each period and State or Territory by the corresponding non-Indigenous imprisonment rate.
- **21** The ratio indicates the extent to which the imprisonment rates of Indigenous persons exceed the imprisonment rates of non-Indigenous persons. A ratio of 20:1 indicates that, for the given State or Territory, the imprisonment rate of Indigenous persons per 100,000 adult population is 20 times that of the imprisonment rate of non-Indigenous persons.
- **22** In some instances Indigenous rates and ratios have not been published. Where this occurs, the cell concerned contains the symbol 'n.p.'. This happens where, firstly, the number of persons in custody is less than 10, and secondly, where the population on which the rate is calculated is less than 5000. This has been done because such rates and ratios vary widely from month to month with small variations in numbers of persons. They therefore give an inaccurate reflection of the relative involvement of Indigenous persons in custody.

Where figures have been rounded discrepancies may occur between the sum of component items and the total.

Custody Confinement in a place intended primarily for the purpose of confining prisoners, such as

a prison, prison farm, Periodic Detention Centre or CCC.

Federal sentenced prisoner Persons charged and sentenced under a Commonwealth statute. For the purposes of this

publication federal sentenced prisoners are those persons who are recognised by the Criminal Law Division of the Commonwealth Attorney-General's Department as having been charged and sentenced under a Commonwealth statute. Federal sentenced prisoners are counted by the State or Territory in which they were sentenced, not where

they were held in custody.

Fine default only A sentence type indicating that, at the time, the prisoner is serving a sentence for default

of a fine and nothing else.

Indigenous prisoner A prisoner who identifies as either Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander.

Legal status The legal status of an offender reflects the warrant(s) or court order(s) which provide the

legal basis for the detention in custody of the offender.

Open prison custody A custodial regime for managing prisoners which does not require them to be confined

by a secure perimeter physical barrier, irrespective of whether a physical barrier exists.

Other sentenced A sentence type indicating that, at the time, a person is serving a sentence other than, or

in addition to, a fine default sentence.

Periodic detention A type of custody where a sentenced prisoner is required to be held in custody for two

consecutive days in a one-week period.

Prison custody A type of custody where a prisoner is required to be held in custody on a full-time basis.

Prisoner A person held in custody. For the purposes of this collection, prisoners are those whose

confinement is the responsibility of a corrective services agency.

Secure prison custody A custodial regime for managing prisoners that requires them to be confined by a secure

physical barrier.

Sentenced A legal status indicating that a person has received a custodial order from a court in

response to a conviction for a criminal offence.

Sentenced prisoner reception Includes persons who enter prison from the community, having received a sentence of

imprisonment as an outcome of a court proceeding. It also includes persons who are sentenced to prison while in custody on remand (i.e. change status from a remand to a sentenced prisoner). Sentenced prisoners in custody who receive a further sentence of

imprisonment are not counted as sentenced receptions.

• A *fine default only* reception is a sentenced reception where a person enters custody as a result of defaulting on the payment of a fine.

 An other sentenced reception is a sentenced reception (including changes of status from unsentenced to sentenced) for anything other than a fine default only reception.

Note that Victorian reception figures do not include prisoners who change status from

unsentenced to sentenced in the period.

Unsentenced A legal status indicating that a person is confined to custody while awaiting the outcome of their trial. Some sentenced prisoners are also remanded in custody, i.e. are

unsentenced, in relation to other offences pending a court hearing. In such cases, these

prisoners are counted as sentenced.
