

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

Unemployed persons

In July 1993, the Australian labour force numbered 8,645,700 persons. There were 900,500 unemployed persons, 2.8 per cent fewer than in July 1992. The unemployment rate was 10.4 per cent which is 0.3 percentage points lower than in July 1992. The proportion of unemployed persons looking for full-time work was 92 per cent for males and 73 per cent for females (Table 1).

Duration of current period of unemployment

The average duration of current period of unemployment rose to 59 weeks in July 1993 from 55 weeks in June 1992. Over the same period, the median duration of current period of unemployment was unchanged at 29 weeks. Unemployed persons who were looking for full-time work had an average duration of unemployment of 64 weeks for males and 60 weeks for females. The average duration of unemployment for persons who were seeking part-time work was 39 weeks for males and 36 weeks for females (Tables 2 and 3).

Main difficulty in finding work

The most common main difficulty finding work reported was 'No vacancies at all' which was nominated by 216,300 persons or 25 per cent of the unemployed. This is a fall of 7 percentage points from the 287,100 persons reporting this reason as their main difficulty in July 1992.

In the two years to July 1993, the proportion of unemployed persons reporting that their main difficulty finding work was 'Considered too young or too old by employers' increased from 12 per cent to 17 per cent (147,000 persons). Over the same period, the proportion stating their main difficulty as 'No vacancies in their line of work' decreased from 18 per cent to 16 per cent (143,000 persons) in July 1993.

A further 86,900 persons (10%) gave their main difficulty as 'Lacked necessary skills or education' (Table 2 and Diagram 1).

Of those unemployed persons born outside Australia, language difficulties were reported as the main difficulty by 8 per cent, and as one of the difficulties in finding work, by 20 per cent of this group (Tables 9 and 10).

In July 1993, persons reporting 'Language difficulties' as the main difficulty in finding work experienced the longest average duration of unemployment at 105 weeks. For those reporting 'Own ill health or disability' the average duration of unemployment was 100 weeks. The shortest duration, averaging 39 weeks, related to those persons reporting 'No vacancies in line of work' as the main difficulty.

Preparedness to move if offered a suitable job

In July 1993, unemployed persons were less prepared to move interstate or intrastate, if offered a suitable job, compared with July 1992. Some 28 per cent of persons said they would move interstate if offered a suitable job, and 57 per cent reported they would not move interstate. In July 1992, the corresponding proportions were 32 per cent and 55 per cent respectively.

As in previous years, more people were prepared to move intrastate (42%) than interstate (28%) if offered a suitable job (Table 2).



Age

Difficulties in finding work relating to age, that is 'Considered too young or too old by employers', were reported as the main difficulty in finding work by 147,000 persons (17% of unemployed). Some 8 per cent of persons aged 15 to 34 reported age related reasons as their main difficulty compared with 31 per cent of the over 35 age group.

The percentage of unemployed persons whose main difficulty in finding work was 'No vacancies at all' was higher in the younger age groups — 41 per cent for those aged 15 to 24 years compared with 12 per cent of persons aged 45 years and over.

The percentage of unemployed persons reporting 'Insufficient work experience' as their main difficulty in finding work decreased with age, from 17 per cent of those aged 15 to 24 years to 3 per cent of those aged 35 years and over.

A similar trend was recorded for those who stated 'Lacked necessary skills or education' as their main difficulty — 13 per cent of persons aged 15 to 24 years falling to 6 per cent of persons aged 35 and over (Table 8 and Diagram 2).

Educational attainment

In July 1993, there were 240,100 persons (28% of total unemployed) who had post-school qualifications. Persons with post school qualifications had been unemployed for 15 weeks less on average than those without post school qualifications (50 compared to 65 weeks).

Persons without post-school qualifications who did not attend the highest level of secondary school experienced an average duration of unemployment of 71 weeks. In contrast, unemployed persons with a bachelor degree or higher had an average duration of unemployment of 47 weeks (Table 13).

Unemployed persons with post-school qualifications reported the same three most common difficulties in finding work as unemployed persons without qualifications. However, a much higher proportion of unemployed persons with post-school qualifications reported 'No vacancies in line of work' (25%), compared with those without qualifications (13%).




DIAGRAM 2. UNEMPLOYED PERSONS: MAIN DIFFICULTY IN FINDING WORK AND AGE, JULY 1993

The long term unemployed

There were 331,200 persons (38% of total unemployed) whose current period of unemployment, as at July 1993, was one year or more. For this group, the most frequently reported main difficulties in finding work were 'No vacancies at all' (26%) and 'Considered too young or too old by employers' (22%).

Of all persons reporting 'Language difficulties' as the main difficulty in finding work, 74 per cent had been unemployed for one year or more. Similarly, 50 per cent of those whose reported main difficulty was age related and 51 per cent of persons reporting 'Own ill health or disability' had been unemployed for one year or more (Table 6 and Diagram 3).

Active steps taken to find work

Most unemployed persons were registered with the Commonwealth Employment Service (CES). In July 1993 720,800 (83%) unemployed persons reported that they were registered with the CES.

Compared with July 1992, the estimated number of unemployed persons registered with the CES has fallen slightly, consistent with the 3 per cent decrease in total unemployment over the same period. The proportion of unemployed persons registered with the CES in July 1993 increased slightly to 83 per cent and is the highest recorded since the survey was first conducted in May 1976 (Table 2).

Persons looking for full-time work were more likely to be registered than those looking for part-time work with the proportion of each group registered being 90 per cent and 37 per cent respectively.

The proportion of unemployed persons registered with the CES varied with age. Of the age groups tabulated, 20-24 year olds and those aged 55 and over reported the highest level of registrations (89% and 87% respectively). The 15-19 years age group reported the lowest level of CES registrations (71%).

Of the 720,800 unemployed persons registered with the CES:

- 95 per cent had contacted prospective employers to find work.
- 94 per cent were looking for full-time work.
- Only 1 per cent reported that they took no other active steps to find work (Tables 4 and 5).



EXPLANATORY NOTES

Introduction

The monthly population survey (which is described in *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0)) comprises the monthly labour force survey and supplementary topics. This publication contains results of a supplementary survey run in association with the July 1993 labour force survey conducted throughout Australia.

2. Of the respondents to the labour force survey, those who fell within the scope of the supplementary survey were asked additional questions. They were asked about their job search experience, including their difficulties in finding work, steps taken to find work and whether they had had offers of employment, as well as their educational attainment and the particulars of their last job, if any.

Scope

3. The scope of this supplementary survey was the same as that used for the labour force survey (described in full in *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0)) except that it was restricted to unemployed persons excluding those who were waiting to be called back to a full-time or part-time job from which they had been stood down without pay for less than four weeks up to the end of the reference week for reasons other than bad weather or plant breakdown. Students at boarding school, some patients in hospitals and sanatoria and inmates of reformatories, goals etc were also excluded.

4. The number of unemployed persons published in *The Labour Force, Australia, July 1992* (6203.0) differs from that published for this survey because persons who were stood down were excluded, as it was inappropriate to ask them about their job search experience. Persons who were stood down comprised 2.8 per cent of all unemployed persons.

Coverage

5. In the population survey, coverage rules are applied which aim to ensure that each person is associated with only one dwelling, and hence has only one chance of selection. See *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0) for more details.

Definitions

6. Definitions of labour force and demographic classifications appearing in this publication are given in *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0).

7. Unless otherwise stated, all characteristics referenced in this publication relate to the week before the interview (i.e. the reference week).

Results of the survey

8. Estimates of unemployed persons are also published in *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0). However, more detailed information is contained in this publication.

9. The estimates in this publication refer to information collected in the survey month and, due to seasonal factors, may not be representative of other months of the year.

10. Results of similar surveys, conducted in May 1976, November 1976, annually from May 1977 to June 1986, July 1988, July 1990, June 1991 and annually from July 1992, have been given in previous issues of this publication.

11. This survey is scheduled to be conducted next in July 1994.

Comparability of series

12. It is impracticable to obtain information relating to the whole of the previous twelve months which is strictly comparable with that obtained in the monthly labour force survey for which the reference period is one week. The definitions used in determining duration of current period of unemployment depend on a detailed set of questions. The items *time spent looking for work* and *number of spells of looking for work during the previous twelve months* are based on a more limited set of questions. It is for this reason that the term *looking for work* is used for these items rather than the more precisely defined term *unemployed*.

Discontinuities in the series

13. The educational attainment data item in this survey has been classified according to the Australian Bureau of Statistics Classification of Qualifications (ABSCQ). The major difference between data collected according to the ABSCQ and the previous classification used is that the level of attainment and field of study in the ABSCQ are two distinct elements. Persons who received a qualification from a course of study of less than one semester full-time duration are excluded from the new classification. For a more detailed explanation of the ABSCQ, see Information paper, Australian Bureau of Statistics Classification of Qualifications — ABSCQ (1263.0).

Unpublished statistics

14. As well as the statistics included in this and related publications, the ABS may have other relevant unpublished data available. Inquiries should be made to the Labour Force Inquiries contacts given on page 23.

Estimation procedure

15. The estimates are derived from the population survey by use of a ratio estimation procedure, which ensures that the estimates conform to an independently estimated distribution of the population for each capital city and remainder of State by age, sex and labour force status rather than to the corresponding distribution within the sample itself.

Reliability of the estimates

16. Estimates in this publication are subject to sampling and non-sampling errors. For further information refer to the Technical Notes, page 15.


19. Because estimates have been rounded, discrepancies may occur between sums of the component items and totals.

TECHNICAL NOTES

Since the estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they are subject to sampling variability, that is, they may differ from those that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error, which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the number that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors. Another measure of the likely difference is the relative standard error, which is obtained by expressing the standard error as a percentage of the estimate.

2. Space does not allow for the separate indication of the standard errors of all estimates in this publication. A table of standard errors for general application is given on the following page. Since they are averages based on calculations for a limited number of past surveys over a wide range of labour force characteristics these numbers will not give a precise measure of the standard error of a particular estimate but they will provide an indication of its magnitude.

An example of the calculation and the use of stan-3. dard errors in relation to estimates of persons is as follows. Table 13 shows the estimated number of unemployed persons in Australia who had a post-school qualification was 240,100. Since this estimate is between 200,000 and 300,000, the table below shows the standard error for Australia will be between 6,200 and 7,300 and can be approximated by interpolation as 6,600 (rounded to the nearest 100). Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey will fall in the range 233,500 to 246,700 and about nineteen chances in twenty that the value will fall within the range 226,900 to 253,300. This example is illustrated in the following diagram.



4. As can be seen from the standard error table, *the* smaller the estimate the higher is the relative standard error. Very small estimates are thus subject to such high standard errors (relative to the size of the estimate) as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. In the tables in this publication, only estimates with relative standard errors of 25 per cent or less and percentages based on such estimates are considered sufficiently reliable for most purposes. However, estimates with larger relative standard errors have been included and are preceded by an asterisk (e.g. *3.4) to indicate they are subject to high standard errors and should be used with caution.

5. The relative standard errors of estimates of *average* duration of unemployment, and median duration of unemployment are obtained by first finding the relative standard error of the estimate of the total number of persons contributing to the average or median and then multiplying the number so obtained by the following relevant factors:

Average duration of unemployment: 1.3 Median duration of unemployment: 2.0

An example of the calculation of standard errors by 6. the use of those factors is as follows. If an estimate of median duration of unemployment for unemployed males is 19 weeks and the number of unemployed males is estimated as 300,000, from the table on the following page it can be calculated that this estimate (300,000) has a standard error of about 7,100 and therefore a relative standard error of about 2.4 per cent. The relative standard error of the estimate of median duration of unemployment is calculated by multiplying this number (2.4) by the appropriate factor shown in the previous paragraph (in this case 2.0): 2.4 x 2.0 = 4.8 per cent. The standard error of this estimate of median duration of unemployment is therefore 4.8 per cent of 19, i.e. about 1. Therefore there are about two chances in three that the median duration of unemployment for unemployed males that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included in the survey would have been within the range 18 to 20 weeks and about nineteen chances in twenty that it would have been within the range 17 to 21 weeks.

7. Proportions and percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling errors. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and the denominator. A formula to approximate the relative standard error (RSE) of a proportion is:

RSE $(x/y) = \sqrt{[RSE(x)]^2 - [RSE(y)]^2}$

8. Considering the example from paragraph 3 above, the 240,100 persons with post-school qualifications represent 27.6 per cent of the 871,300 unemployed persons. The standard error of 871,300 is approximately 11,100 so the relative standard error is 1.3 per cent. The relative standard error for 240,100 is 2.8 per cent. Applying the above formula, the relative standard error of the proportion is $\sqrt{(2.8)^2 - (1.3)^2}$ or 2.5 per cent, giving a standard error for the proportion (27.6%) of 0.7 percentage points. Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the proportion of unemployed persons who had a post-school qualification is between 26.9 per cent and 28.3 per cent and nineteen chances in twenty that the proportion is within the range 26.2 per cent to 29.0 per cent.

9. Published estimates may also be used to calculate the difference between two survey estimates (of numbers or percentages). Such an estimate is subject to sampling error. The sampling error of the difference between two estimates depends on their standard errors and the relationship (correlation) between them. An approximate standard error (SE) of the difference between two estimates (x-y) may be calculated by the following formula:

SE (x-y) =
$$\sqrt{[SE(x)]^2 + [SE(y)]^2}$$

While this formula will only be exact for differences between separate and uncorrelated characteristics or subpopulations it is expected to provide a good approximation for all differences likely to be of interest in this publication.

10. The imprecision due to sampling variability, which is measured by the standard error, should not be confused with inaccuracies that may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents and errors made in coding and processing data. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as the *non-sampling error*, and they may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient operating procedures.

GLOSSARY

Active steps taken to find work: steps taken during the current period of unemployment. They comprise: writing, telephoning or applying in person to an employer for work; answering a newspaper advertisement for a job; checking factory or Commonwealth Employment Service noticeboards; being registered with the Commonwealth Employment Service; checking or registering with any other employment agency; advertising or tendering for work; and contacting friends or relatives.

All difficulties in finding work: all difficulties experienced during the current period of unemployment.

All unemployed persons: those persons who were not employed during the reference week (i.e. the week immediately preceding that in which the interview took place), had actively looked for full-time or part-time work at any time in the four weeks up to the end of the reference week, and:

- (a) were available for work in the reference week, or would have been available except for temporary illness (i.e. lasting for less than four weeks to the end of the reference week); or
- (b) were waiting to start a new job within four weeks from the end of the reference week and would have started in the reference week if the job had been available then.

Average duration of current period of unemployment: the duration obtained by dividing the aggregate number of weeks a group has been unemployed by the number of persons in that group.

Ceased last full-time job: left or lost last full-time job.

CES: Commonwealth Employment Service.

Duration of current period of unemployment: the period from the time the person began looking for work to the end of the reference week. Thus this item measures the current (and continuing) period of unemployment rather than a completed spell. For persons who may have begun looking for work while still employed, the duration of current period of unemployment is defined as the period from the time the person last worked full time for two weeks or more to the end of the reference week. Periods of unemployment are recorded in complete weeks and this results in a slight understatement of duration.

Educational attainment: measures the highest qualification completed by the respondent, classified according to the Australian Bureau of Statistics Classification of Qualifications (ABSCQ). The seven categories for level of attainment are —

Higher degree: Includes doctorates and masters degrees. The minimum entry requirements are usually a masters degree or first class honours for a masters degree. The duration of study is a minimum of two to four years for a doctorate and two years full-time or equivalent for a masters degree.

Postgraduate diploma: Include Graduate Certificates. The entry requirement is usually the successful completion of a bachelor degree or an undergraduate diploma. The duration of study ranges from six months (for a Graduate Certificate) to one year full-time study or equivalent.

Bachelor degree: The entry requirement is the satisfactory completion of Year 12 or its equivalent. The duration of study ranges from three to six years fulltime study or its equivalent.

Undergraduate diploma: The entry requirement is usually the successful completion of Year 12 or its equivalent. The duration of study is three years fulltime study or its equivalent. Certain other qualifications are classified to this level on the basis that their entry requirements, duration of study and theoretical orientation are regarded as being equivalent to those of undergraduate diplomas, for example, Certificate in Psychiatric Nursing.

Associate diploma: The entry requirement is usually the completion of Year 12 or the completion of Year 10 and a pre-requisite course. The duration of study ranges from one to two years full-time or its equivalent. Advanced Certificates, Technician Certificates and Certificates of Technology are included in this level as they have broadly the same theoretical orientation as associate diplomas.

Skilled Vocational Qualifications: The entry requirement is usually the completion of Year 10 or its equivalent. In addition, some courses may require a student to be concurrently employed in that specific field. The duration of study is two to four years, and typically involves some on-the-job training.

Basic Vocational Qualifications: Often require Year 10 completion, however many course have no formal entry requirements. The duration of study ranges from one semester to one year of full-time study or equivalent.

Highest level of secondary school available: the highest level of secondary schooling (or equivalent) offered by the education system at the time the respondent left school.

Interstate: between States/Territories.

Intrastate: within the State/Territory.

Job: any paid employment, full-time or part-time, lasting two weeks or more.

Looking for part-time work: actively looking for part-time work only.

Main difficulty in finding work: the main difficulty experienced during the current period of unemployment.

Main field of study: for those persons whose highest qualification is a degree, vocational qualification, certificate or diploma, it is the main field of study for that qualification.

Main English-speaking countries: comprises the United Kingdom, Ireland, Canada, South Africa, U.S.A. and New Zealand

Median duration of current period of unemployment: the duration which divides unemployed persons into two equal groups, one comprising persons whose duration of unemployment is above the median, and the other, persons whose duration is below it.

Number of offers of employment: the number of separate offers of employment received during the current period of unemployment.

Number of spells of looking for work in the previous twelve months: the number of different periods, including the current period, during which persons reported having been out of work and looking for a job.

Persons with post-school qualifications: persons who have obtained a vocational qualification, certificate, diploma,

degree or any other qualification, since leaving school. Respondents indicated which of the following groups best described their highest qualification: Higher degree; Postgraduate diploma; Bachelor degree; Undergraduate diploma; Associate diploma; Skilled Vocational Qualification; Basic Vocational Qualification.

Persons who were stood down: persons classed as unemployed who had been stood down without pay for less than four weeks, for reasons other than bad weather or plant breakdown

Still at school: current school attendance was recorded only for persons aged fifteen to twenty years.

Time spent looking for work in the previous twelve months: the total number of weeks persons reported having been out of work and looking for a job, including the weeks in the current period.

Usual gross weekly pay: the amount of usual total weekly pay (i.e. before taxation and other deductions have been made).


