MAIN FEATURES

- In 1973 there were 2,853,411 students enrolled in schools in Australia, an increase of 12,460 over 1972.
- Primary grade enrolments fell by 9,671 to 1,808,674 while secondary enrolments increased by 21,967 to 1,042,384.
- 79% of all students were enrolled in government schools.
- The total number of schools operating in 1973 was 9,487, sixty-five less than 1972.
- The number of full-time teachers increased by 5,999 to 129,659 (54,146 males and 75,513 females).
 Full-time equivalent units of part-time teaching decreased by 308 to 6,463.
- . A table classifying teachers by level of teaching is included for the first time in this bulletin.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Introduction

This bulletin contains detailed statistics of schools, teachers and students in Australia for 1973. Additional information can be found in publications of the Deputy Commonwealth Statistician in each State, various publications of the Department of Education, and in the annual reports of the State education departments.

- 2. The statistics reported are not comparable between States nor entirely comparable between government and non-government schools in any one State because of differences in:
 - (a) school systems, especially type of school;
 - (b) the grading of students and their advancement;
 - (c) the examination systems;
 - (d) the transfer from secondary to vocational education; and
 - (e) the recruitment and employment of teachers.

Scope and Definitions

3. Schools are broadly classified as government or non-government and may provide primary, secondary, or both primary and secondary education. They include junior technical schools; correspondence schools (included in government ordinary schools); schools in institutions and hospitals; mission schools and similar

- establishments. They exclude pre-schools and kindergartens not incorporated in ordinary schools, senior technical and agricultural colleges, evening schools, continuation classes, institutions such as business colleges, and coaching colleges. Special Schools are those specifically intended for the instruction of students who are physically or mentally handicapped, or socially maladjusted. Special schools also include schools specifically set up for the education of Aboriginal children requiring other than ordinary schooling.
- 4. Teacher statistics include teaching staff, principals and head teachers, whether permanent or temporary, but exclude teachers-in-training, teachers on leave without pay, and other teachers engaged wholly in advisory, administrative or other non-teaching duties. Variations occur from State to State in:
 - (a) the treatment of special purpose and casual teachers;
 - (b) the classification of teachers who, in addition to primary or secondary teaching, are also engaged on other duties.
- 5. All teaching staff are classified as either full-time or part-time. Part-time teachers (including visiting teachers) teaching at two or more schools are shown as part-time at each school. Part-time staff have also been expressed in units of full-time equivalents. The methods used for calculating equivalent full-time units of part-time teaching vary from State to State and even between schools within States. Most schools base their calculations on hours worked, number of class periods, or proportion of full-time salary.
- 6. In Victoria, a teacher may teach both senior and junior technical students. For the purposes of this bulletin (which includes junior technical but not senior technical schools) such a teacher is counted as part-time if his teaching load in the junior school is less than 75 per cent of a full-time teaching load.
- 7. Students. Student statistics refer to the number of students enrolled at the schools included in this collection at the August schools census date. Students in pre-schools incorporated in ordinary schools are included except in Queensland where they have been excluded for 1973 as they are now included in the Queensland pre-school collection; students enrolled at correspondence schools in courses designed for adults or employed persons are excluded.
- 8. Methods of allocating classes to grades, particularly classes for students in special categories vary from State to State: students at special schools may follow the normal curriculum and students at ordinary schools may be in special classes and follow special curricula. In addition there are differences in the organisation of special Aboriginal education in the various States and the Northern Territory.

- 9. In New South Wales in 1973 there were fifteen special schools, each of which was partly staffed by State education departmental teachers, thereby forming distinct units (government and non-government) within each school. For statistical purposes each unit (including teachers and students) has been treated as a separate school.
- 10. A number of schools (other than special schools), both government and non-government, are no longer maintaining a formal grade structure. These schools allocate students to 'groups' for each subject according to their ability in that subject. States either allocate these 'groups' to grades or show them as 'Ungraded non-special'.

COMMENTS


In 1973 there were 2,853,411 students (1,471,591 males and 1,381,820 females) enrolled in schools in Australia, an increase of 12,460 (0.4 per cent) over 1972. Of these, 2,240,642 (79 per cent) were enrolled at government schools and 612,769 at non-government schools.

2. Primary grade enrolments fell by 9,671 to 1,808,674 while secondary enrolments increased by 21,967 to 1,042,384 and 2,353 were not classifiable into a primary or secondary grade. Of the primary grade students 1,450,082 (80 per cent) were at government schools and 358,592 at non-government schools. Of the

secondary grade students 788,220 (76 per cent) were at government schools and 254,164 at non-government schools.

- 3. The tendency for an increasing proportion of males aged 15 years and over to remain at school showed a reversal in 1973, expecially for the 16 and 17 years old age groups; however, the proportion of the female population aged 15 years and over remaining at school continued to increase, particularly among those aged 16 and 17 years old.
- 4. The number of full-time teachers increased by 5,999 (5 per cent) to 129,659 (54,146 males and 75,513 females). Of these, 104,816 (81 per cent) were teaching in government schools and 24,843 in non-government schools. In addition, 14,339 part-time teachers contributed to a full-time equivalent of 6,463 persons, a decrease of 308 full-time equivalents (5 per cent) over 1972. This year, for the first time in this bulletin, a table is included classifying teachers to levels of teaching. In 1973, full-time and part-time teachers (expressed in full-time equivalent units) numbered 70,029 at the primary level and 65,211 at the secondary level; a further 882 teachers were not classifiable to either the primary or secondary level.
- 5. The total number of schools operating in Australia in 1973 was 9,487 (7,311 government and 2,176 non-government), 65 less than in 1972. The decrease is largely due to the closing down of smaller schools in some States. Included in the total are 431 special schools (326 government and 105 non-government).
- 6. Over the period 1969 to 1973 there has been an increase of 5 per cent in the number of students enrolled and a 2 per cent decrease in the number of schools. Also in that period, the number of full-time teachers increased by 18 per cent and part-time teachers (expressed in full-time equivalents) increased by 51 per cent, representing an overall increase of 19 per cent.

GRADES IN GOVERNMENT SCHOOLS, STATES 1973



The above diagram shows the usual grades in government primary and secondary schools in each State and Territory. Approximate average ages (at 1 August 1973) for each grade in each State and Territory are given in order to indicate differences in age-grade patterns. The diagram should not be taken as a comparison of academic standards of grades between States. For a more detailed presentation of the systems operating in each State, reference should be made to diagrams, etc. appearing in the annual reports of State Education Departments.

In all States and Territories, the non-government school sector has an average age-grade pattern which is very similar to that for government schools. It should be noted that in some States and Territories there is a trend in both government and non-government schools not to allocate pupils into a grade structure.

Further explanatory notes: (a) In Tasmania most pupils study for the Higher School Certificate over a two year period.

- (b) Preparatory grades are attached to some schools in South Australia and the Northern Territory.
- (c) In Tasmania, many children attend two years kindergarten grade.
 (d) In N.S.W. and A.C.T., kindergarten, 1st class and 2nd class are termed "infants" grades.
