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Section 1. Introduction

Aborigines have been enumerated as completely as possible at all Population Censuses since the establishment of the Commonwealth (see Section 3 below). However, Section 127 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia provided that, "in reckoning the numbers of the people of the Commonwealth or of a State or other part of the Commonwealth Aboriginal natives shall not be counted". For this reason Aboriginal natives enumerated at the Census (interpreted as persons who are more than 50 per cent Aboriginal) were excluded from published Census results. Section 127 has now been repealed by Section 3 of the Constitution Alteration (Aborigines) 1967 and official population statistics relating to dates or periods subsequent to the 1966 Census include Aborigines.

Section 2. Definition of "Aboriginal" in this Bulletin

The figures in this bulletin relate to those persons who described themselves in the 1966 Census as being 50 per cent or more Aboriginal or simply as "Aboriginal". For reasons stated below, it has not been possible to differentiate persons who are 50 per cent Aboriginal from those who are more than 50 per cent Aboriginal.

Section 3. Coverage

Coverage of Aborigines in the Census has improved progressively from Census to Census as the number of Aborigines in contact with population centres has increased and as improved methods of overcoming the collection problems have been developed.

At the 1966 Census extensive arrangements were made to obtain as full a coverage of Aborigines as possible and to enumerate fully those Aborigines "out of contact". Throughout Australia the assistance of Aboriginal welfare bodies, mission superintendents, station owners, patrol officers and police was sought. In particular, in the Northern Territory, information was obtained from missions and settlements concerning Aborigines normally resident at such locations but absent at the time of the Census, and of Aborigines resident at such locations but who normally reside elsewhere. The two sets of information were then reconciled and, together with the normal enumeration in other areas, resulted in what is considered to be a fairly complete and accurate coverage of Aborigines in the Territory. However, the quality of the data obtained still requires substantial improvement, as discussed below.

Section 4. Form of the Inquiry

At censuses prior to the 1966 Census, the instructions relating to race were insufficient to enable respondents to classify themselves according to degree of race mixture. For example, from 1933 to 1961 persons were asked to state:

"For persons of European Race, wherever born, write "European". For non-Europeans state the race to which they belong for example, "Aboriginal", "Chinese", "Negro", "Afghan", etc. If the person is half-caste with one parent of European race, write also "H.C.", for example "H.C. Aboriginal", "H.C. Chinese", etc."

At the 1966 Census the instructions were redesigned as follows in an endeavour to obtain precise data on race mixture and also to avoid the opprobrium attaching to the term "half-caste":

"State each person's race. For persons of European race wherever born, write "European". Otherwise state whether Aboriginal, Chinese, Indian, Japanese, etc., as the case may be. If of more than one race give particulars, for example, $\frac{1}{2}$ European - $\frac{1}{2}$ Aboriginal, $\frac{2}{3}$ Aboriginal - $\frac{1}{4}$ Chinese, $\frac{1}{2}$ European - $\frac{1}{2}$ Chinese."

Investigations made by matching the replies of individuals at the 1961 and 1966 Censuses and by comparing overall Census results with data available from the State instrumentalities responsible for Aboriginal welfare suggest that considerable doubt attaches to the validity of the replies given to the question on race at the 1966 and previous Censuses.

It has now been concluded:

- (a) That reporting by Aborigines in the 1966 Census was insufficiently precise to differentiate persons who are 50 per cent Aboriginal from those who are more than 50 per cent Aboriginal.
- (b) That similar dissections obtained at Censuses prior to the 1966 Census were similarly imprecise.
- (c) That even a total of all persons who are 50 per cent or more Aboriginal may be suspect, primarily because of the inclusion of persons who are less than 50 per cent Aboriginal and described themselves simply as "Aboriginal", but also because of persons who are 50 per cent Aboriginal stating their race as "European".

Nevertheless, the statistics in this Bulletin, which relate to persons who have described themselves as 50 per cent or more Aboriginal or simply as "Aboriginal", are presented subject to these limitations in the hope that comments and suggestions will lead in future Censuses to the compilation of more reliable data.

- (a) Prior to the 1966 Census, Aborigines "out of contact" were not enumerated and estimates of these were made by authorities responsible for native welfare. It is estimated that at the 1954 Census 12,956 Aborigines (of which 2,311 were estimated to be in Queensland, 1,760 in South Australia, 3,516 in Western Australia, and 5,369 in the Northern Territory) were not contacted by Census collectors and were not included in the Census. Increasing numbers however, were coming into contact and at the 1961 Census it is estimated that 2,000 Aborigines in Western Australia and 1,944 in the Northern Territory were not contacted by Census collectors. At the 1966 Census, efforts were made to obtain complete coverage (see Section 3 above).

NOTE. - New criteria were adopted at the 1966 Census for the delimitation of urban centres, a full description of which is contained in Field Count Statement No.4. In this bulletin, totals for each section of State only are published, namely:

- (a) Metropolitan Areas. These areas are the "urban" centres of each of the six State capital cities and of Canberra in the Australian Capital Territory. Briefly, "urban" includes all that area with a population density of 500 or more persons per square mile, together with some other areas (e.g. industrial areas) classified as "urban" on other grounds. The urban boundary is a moving boundary, which from Census to Census, as urbanisation proceeds, will move outwards to encompass peripheral development. Statistics for this area are comparable with statistics for other urban centres which have been delimited according to the same criteria.
- (b) Other Urban. Includes all urban centres other than the Metropolitan Areas.
- (c) Rural. Includes all areas not included in (a) or (b) above.
- (d) Migratory. Refers to persons who, at midnight between 30 June 1966 and 1 July 1966, were enumerated on board ships in Australian ports, or ships which had left an Australian port prior to Census night with a next port of call in Australia. It also includes persons who, at Census time, were enumerated on long-distance trains, motor coaches or aircraft.

Section 6. Age

At the 1966 Census persons were asked to state age in accordance with the following instructions.

"State age in years and completed months. If aged under one year, state age in completed months (for example, a child of eleven months should be shown as "0" years "11" months). If aged under one month, write "0" years "0" months."

The instructions for the age inquiry were so worded in an attempt to reduce the incidence of respondents rounding their ages to digits ending in "0" or "5" and also to reduce the degree of mis-statement of the ages of young children. In general the response to the inquiry was satisfactory although a substantial degree of age mis-statement is apparent for the Aboriginal population in some parts of Australia. In particular, much of the information supplied for Aborigines on the fringe of contact with developed areas, notably groups of Aborigines centred on missions, is of doubtful validity and such areas account also for a substantial proportion of ages "not stated". In order to reduce the significance of age mis-statement, age data are published in this bulletin for five-yearly groups only.

Section 7. Marital Status

At the 1966 Census, persons were asked to state marital status in accordance with the following instructions.

"If never married, write "N.M.;" at present married, write "M"; married but permanently separated (legally or otherwise), write "P.S.;" divorced and not remarried, write "D"; widowed and not remarried, write "W"."

A proportion of persons omitted to state any marital status. In such cases, marital status was assessed as follows.

Males under 20 years of age and females under 18 years of age were classified "never married" unless there was definite evidence of marriage given in the Schedule, in which case they were classified "married". All other persons were classified "married" if there was any evidence of marriage given in the Schedule. Otherwise a marital status was allocated from a random list according to the age and sex of the person concerned. The random list for the allocation of "not stated" marital status had been compiled previously using the latest available statistics of the distribution of both the Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal population.

A small number of persons aged less than 15 years stated themselves to be married. For the purposes of this table they have been classified as never married.

Section 8. Birthplace

At the 1966 Census, persons were asked to state birthplace in accordance with the following instructions.

"For persons born in Australia write the name of the State or Territory where born. For persons born outside Australia write the name of the country where born (not town or locality)".

Section 9. Religion

At the 1966 Census persons were asked to state their religion in accordance with the following instructions.

"State the full name of the religious denomination. (There is no penalty for failure to answer this question)."

Section 21 of the Census and Statistics Act, 1905-1966 provides that "No person shall be liable to any penalty for omitting or refusing to state the religious denomination or sect to which he belongs or adheres."

Section 10. Education

At the 1966 Census persons were asked to state their highest level of schooling completed. The specific wording of the question differed in each State to cater for the nomenclature and examination systems of each State Education department.

In addition to levels of shooling, persons with qualifications received after completion of formal schooling were required to supply information in accordance with the following instruction.

"Qualifications. State the person's qualifications, trade training or other qualifications and the institution at which obtained, e.g., Bachelor of Engineering, University of Sydney; Diploma of Architecture, South Australian Institute of Technology; A.A.S.A.; Certificate of Management, Hobart Technical College; Five years' Apprenticeship."

Section 11. Work Force

At the 1961 and previous Censuses the work force was determined as:

"Those who are engaged in an industry, business, profession, trade or service at the time of the Census (including those on long service leave, etc.)"; and

"..... those out of a job at time of the Census but who are usually engaged in an industry, business, profession, trade or service"

At the 1966 Census an additional set of four questions was asked in order to obtain information on the basis of which the work force could be determined more precisely. The questions were as follows.

"Did the person have a job or business of any kind last week (even though he may have been temporarily absent from it)? ANSWER "YES" or "NO"."

"Did the person do any work at all last week for payment or profit? ANSWER "YES" or "NO". Persons working without pay as a helper in a "family business" or farm and members of the clergy and of religious orders (other than purely contemplative orders) should answer "YES" to this question. Persons doing only unpaid housework should answer "NO"."

"Was the person temporarily laid off by his employer without pay for the whole of last week? ANSWER "YES" or "NO"."

"Did the person look for work last week? ANSWER "YES" or "NO".

(Note. "Looking for work" means (i) being registered with Commonwealth Employment Service, or (ii) approaching prospective employers, or (iii) placing or answering advertisements, or (iv) writing letters of application, or (v) awaiting the result of recent applications)."

The work force includes all persons for whom the answer "yes" was given to any one of these four questions. Except that persons helping but not receiving wages or a salary who usually worked less than 15 hours a week were excluded from the work force.

This approach conforms closely to the recommendations of the Eighth International Conference of Labour Statisticians held in Geneva in 1954 and the information so obtained has been used in determining the work force for the purposes of the 1966 Census.

Section 12. Occupational Status

Persons in the work force were asked to state occupational status in accordance with the following instructions.

"If working for wages or salary (including apprentices), write "W".

If conducting own business or profession and not at present employing others, write "O".

If conducting own business or profession and at present employing others, write "E".

If helping but not receiving wages or salary, write "H".

If looking for first job, write "F".

Where it was determined that persons were not in the work force they were generally allocated a status in accordance with the following instructions.

Persons not engaged in an industry, business, profession, trade or service. For - Children not attending school, write 'C'. Full-time students or children attending school, write 'S'. Mainly dependent on pension or superannuation, write 'P'. Of independent means, write 'M'. Engaged in unpaid home duties, write 'H.D.'. Inmates of institutions (e.g., for invalids and the aged, gaols, reformatories, etc.), write 'I'. Others not engaged in industry, etc., write 'N.A.'. (Young persons seeking work but not previously employed, write 'O' in answer to this question).

Section 13. Occupation

Persons in the work force were asked to state occupation in accordance with the following instructions.

"State in precise (or award) terms the person's main occupation last week, using where possible two or more words. For example "Builder's Labourer", "Dairy Farm Hand", "Clothing Machinist", "Wood Machinist", "Motor Mechanic", "Electrical Fitter", "Coal Wheeler", "Dairy Farmer", etc. Employees of Government Departments or Authorities should be described by their official designation, such as "District Employment Officer", "Shire Clerk", etc., and not by such terms as "Public Servant", etc."

The precise classification of persons in the work force according to occupation and industry is extremely difficult but subject to continuing efforts to improve the quality of the data from census to census. Consequently the comparison of data compiled at the 1966 Census with that obtained at previous censuses is not only influenced by changes in the definition and content of the work force (see Section 11) but by the different responses which may have been evoked by efforts to improve the questions on the Census Schedule, and by some changes in coding rules designed to rectify known deficiencies in the data. Classification according to occupation and industry is difficult mainly because of the problem of conveying through a printed form the exact nature of the information required (e.g. the conceptual difference between 'occupation' and 'industry') and the consequential inadequacy of many replies. Further minor errors arise in processing but are virtually all detected and rectified. However, because of the complexity and magnitude of the Census, a very small number remain uncorrected. These do not affect the general validity of the results although care should be taken in the interpretation of industry and occupation categories to which only 1 or 2 persons have been classified.

Classification according to occupation is particularly difficult because: (a) the range of occupations is so extensive; (b) there is lack of uniformity in occupational terms, which vary between industries, locations and States; and (c) respondents fail to give precise descriptions, especially of other members of the family, either through carelessness or ignorance of occupational designations. Similarly, classification according to industry is complicated by the development of new fields of industrial enterprise and the splitting and overlapping of previously identifiable fields.

Section 14. Industry

Persons in the work force were asked to state industry in accordance with the following instructions.

"State the exact branch of industry, business or service in which mainly engaged last week, using two or more words where possible. For example "Dairy Farming", "Coal Mining", "Woollen Mills", "Retail Grocery", "Road Construction", etc. Employees should state the industry of their employer. For example, a carpenter employed by a coal mining company should state "Coal Mining". If employed by a Government Department or other public body, state also its name. For paid housekeepers and domestic servants in private households, write "P.H."."

From the answers to this question, persons were classified according to the Bureau's "Classification of Industries" which provides for each person to be classified according to the nature of the business in which mainly engaged, regardless of whether operated by a government authority, corporation or individual.

The precise classification of persons in the work force according to industry is subject to the difficulties outlined on page 14.
