

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#### PREFACE

Since the introduction of monthly population surveys in February 1978, a considerable amount of information on unemployment, underemployment and related statistics has become available from the labour force and supplementary surveys. However, this information is contained in a number of separate ABS publications, which are included in the lists on pages 4 and 5.

In order to assist users, some of the main elements of these data have been brought together in a single publication. Users are invited to comment on the range of statistics shown and on the desirability of compiling further issues of this publication.

#### EXPLANATORY NOTES

#### Introduction

This publication contains estimates of unemployment, underemployment and related statistics available from the population survey from February 1978 onwards. Section 1 contains estimates obtained from the labour force survey and Section 2 estimates from supplementary and special surveys. Because of limitations of space it has not been possible to include all information available on these topics; however the statistics included will give some indication of the range of information available. More detailed statistics are included in the publications listed in paragraph 5 and reference should be made to these publications for explanations and definitions.

#### The population survey

2. The population survey is the general title given to the household sample survey carried out monthly in all States and Territories. Emphasis in the survey is placed on the collection of data on demographic and labour force characteristics, the principal survey component being referred to as the labour force survey. The remaining part of the population survey consists of supplementary collections which are carried out either in conjunction with the labour force survey or, where the topics require personal interview or are too complex to be treated within the processing timetable of the monthly survey, by means of special surveys, generally conducted once a year.

3. The survey is based on a multi-stage area sample of private dwellings (about 30,000 houses, flats, etc.) and non-private dwellings (hotels, motels, etc.), and covers about two-thirds of one per cent of the population of Australia. The information is obtained from the occupants of selected dwellings by carefully chosen and specially trained interviewers. The interviews are generally conducted during the two weeks beginning on the Monday between the 6th and 12th of each month. The information obtained relates to the week before the interview (i.e. the survey week). Because of operational problems arising from the Christmas and New Year holidays the December surveys commence a week earlier than usual (with most interviews being conducted during the second week) and the January surveys commence a week later than usual.

#### Population benchmarks

4. The population survey estimates are calculated in such a way as to conform to the independently

estimated distribution of the population aged 15 years and over by age and sex. These independent estimates (benchmarks) are necessarily derived from incomplete information about population changes (deaths, internal and overseas migration) and can differ from estimates of the population subsequently published by the ABS. For estimates of the population and other demographic statistics reference should be made to the quarterly publications, *Population and Vital Statistics* (3212.0) and *Australian Demographic Statistics Quarterly* (3101.0)

#### 1. LABOUR FORCE SURVEY ESTIMATES

#### EXPLANATORY NOTES

#### Introduction

Statistics in this section have been obtained from the labour force survey. Tables have been included to show the range of survey information regularly available on unemployed persons, persons employed part-time who would like to work more hours, persons who, although not in the labour force, would like a job, and full-time workers who worked less than 35 hours in the survey week. Because of limitations of space the tables generally do not show cross-classification of variables. More details are shown in the regular labour force publications listed in paragraph 5, page 4. In addition, other unpublished data may be available on request.

#### Scope

2. The survey includes all persons aged fifteen years and over except members of the permanent defence forces, certain diplomatic personnel of overseas governments, customarily excluded from census and estimated populations, overseas visitors holidaying in Australia, and members of non-Australian defence forces (and their dependants) stationed in Australia.

#### Definitions

3. The labour force category to which a person is assigned depends on his *actual activity* (i.e. whether working, looking for work, etc.) during the survey week. The following definitions, which conform closely to the international standard definitions specified by the ILO, relate only to those persons within the scope of the survey.

4. Unemployed persons are those aged 15 years and over who were not employed during the survey week, and

- (a) had actively looked for full-time or part-time work at any time in the four weeks up to the end of the survey week and :
  - (i) were available for work in the survey week, or would have been available except for temporary illness (i.e. lasting for less than four weeks to the end of the survey week); or
  - (ii) were waiting to start a new job within four weeks from the end of the survey week and would have started in the survey week if the job had been available then;
- or (b) were waiting to be called back to a full-time or part-time job from which they had been stood down without pay for less than four weeks up to the end of the survey week (including the whole of the survey week) for reasons other than bad weather or plant breakdown.

5. Unemployed persons looking for first job are those who had never worked for two weeks or more in a full-time job.

6. The *unemployment rate* for any group is the number unemployed expressed as a percentage of the labour force (i.e. employed plus unemployed) in the same group.

7. Duration of unemployment is the period from the time the person began looking for work or was laid off to the end of the survey week. Periods of unemployment are recorded in complete weeks and this results in a slight understatement of duration. Average (mean) duration is the duration obtained by dividing the aggregate number of weeks a group has been unemployed by the number of persons in that group. Median duration is the duration which divides unemployed persons into two equal groups, one comprising persons whose duration of unemployment is above the median and the other persons whose duration is below it. Medians are calculated from group data, linear interpolation being used within the group which contains the median.

8. Active steps to find work. See paragraph 5, page 34.

9. Full-time workers are those who usually work 35 hours a week or more and others who, although usually part-time workers, worked 35 hours or more during the survey week. Part-time workers are those who usually work less than 35 hours a week and who did so during the survey week. When recording hours of work, fractions of an hour are disregarded.

Hours of work. The figures of aggregate hours 10. and of average hours refer to actual hours worked during the survey week, not hours paid for. The figures may be affected by public holidays, leave, absenteeism; temporary absence from work due to sickness, injury, accident and industrial disputes; and stoppages of work due to bad weather, plant breakdown etc. When hours of work are recorded fractions of an hour are disregarded and this results in slightly lower figures than would be the case if actual time worked was recorded. Persons stood down for the whole of the survey week without pay because of bad weather or plant breakdown at their place of employment are regarded as employed and therefore are included (working no hours) in the calculation of average hours worked. Persons stood down in the survey week for reasons other than bad weather and plant breakdown and waiting to be called back to their job are regarded as unemployed and are therefore excluded from the calculation.

11. Persons attending school comprise those who,

during the survey week, were enrolled full-time at secondary or high schools. Excluded are persons who were enrolled at universities, colleges of advanced education, technical colleges, other tertiary education institutions, and coaching and business schools. Persons attending school are classified as unemployed if they satisfy the definition in paragraph 4 above.

12. Persons not in the labour force are those who, during the survey week, were not in the categories 'employed' or 'unemployed'. This category includes persons who were keeping house (unpaid), attending an educational institution (school, university, etc.), retired, voluntarily inactive, permanently unable to work, inmates of institutions, trainee teachers, members of contemplative religious orders, and persons whose only activity during the survey week was jury service or unpaid voluntary work for a charitable organisation, provided they had not actively looked for work in the four weeks up to the end of the survey week, and

- (a) in the survey week:
  - (i) were without a job, business or farm; or
  - (ii) had worked for less than one hour for pay, profit, commission or payment in kind; or
  - (iii) had worked for less than 15 hours without pay in a family business or farm;
- or (b) had been stood down without pay for four weeks or more up to the end of the survey week.

#### Classification of industry and occupation

13. Industry is classified according to the Australian Standard Industrial Classification (ASIC) and occupation according to the Classification and Classified List of Occupations, Revised June 1976.

14. From September 1979, industry estimates in labour force survey publications have been classified according to the 1978 version of the Australian Standard Industrial Classification (ASIC). The estimates are therefore not strictly comparable with those for periods prior to September 1979, which were classified according to the 1969 version of ASIC.

#### Reliability of the estimates

15. Since the estimates in this section are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings they are subject to sampling variability; that is, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the surveys. One measure of the likely difference is given by the *standard error*, which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the figure that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors.

16. Space does not allow for the separate indication of the standard errors of all estimates in this section. Standard errors of estimates and of estimates of monthly movements should be determined by using Tables A and B below.

17. The size of the standard error increases with the level of the estimate, so that the larger the estimate the larger the standard error. However, it should be noted that the larger the sample estimate the smaller will be the standard error in percentage terms. Thus, larger sample estimates will be relatively more reliable than smaller estimates.

18. Very small estimates are subject to such high standard errors (relative to the size of the estimate) as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. In the tables in this section, estimates below the levels shown in Table A, and percentages based on such estimates, have not been included. Although figures for these small components can in some cases be derived by subtraction, they should not be regarded as reliable.

19. The movement in the level of an estimate is also subject to sampling variability. The standard error of the movement depends on the levels of the estimates from which the movement is obtained rather than the size of the movement. An indication of the magnitude of standard errors of monthly movements is given in Table B. The estimates of standard error of monthly movements apply only to estimates of movements between two consecutive months. Movements between corresponding months of consecutive years, or between two other non-consecutive months, will generally be subject to somewhat greater sampling variability than is indicated in Table B. A guide to the standard errors of *quarterly* movements can be obtained by multiplying the figures in the table of standard errors of monthly movements (Table B) by 1.4. A guide to the standard errors of annual movements can be obtained by multiplying the figures in the table of standard errors of estimates (Table A) by 1.4.

20. Examples of the calculation and use of standard errors are given below :

- (a) From Table A it will be seen that the estimate of 215,200 unemployed males looking for full-time work in February 1980 has a standard error of about 5,300. Therefore there are about two chances in three that the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey will fall within the range 209,900 to 220,500 and about nineteen chances in twenty that the value will fall within the range 204,600 to 225,800.
- (b) The estimate of movement in the number of unemployed males looking for full-time work from January to February 1980 is a decrease of 11,700. Table B relates the standard error of the monthly movement to the size of the larger of the two estimates from which the movement is derived. In this case the January 1980

estimate (226,900) is the larger. From Table Bit will be seen that the standard error of the monthly movement is about 4,500. Therefore there are about two chances in three that if all dwellings had been included in the surveys the movement would have been within the range -16,200 to -7,200 and about nineteen chances in twenty that it would have been within the range -20,700 to -2,700.

21. The reliability of an estimated percentage, computed by using sample data for both numerator and denominator, depends upon both the size of the numerator and the size of the denominator. However, the per cent standard error of the estimated percentage will generally be lower than the per cent standard error of the estimate of the numerator. The per cent standard errors of the numerators can be obtained from Table A.

22. The imprecision due to sampling variability, which is measured by the standard error, should not be confused with inaccuracies that may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as the *non-sampling error*, and they may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or only a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient operating procedures.

### 2. DATA FROM SUPPLEMENTARY AND SPECIAL SURVEYS

The information in this section has been obtained from surveys conducted from time to time as supplements to the monthly population survey or from special surveys. They are not available on a regular monthly or quarterly basis. The statistics which have been included serve to illustrate the range of information that is available from these surveys, and more details can be obtained by reference to the population survey reports in which the statistics were originally published. Each group of tables is preceded by explanatory notes on survey definitions, etc. and the title of the report from which the statistics were obtained. A list of population survey reports on labour force topics is shown on page 5. A complete list of population survey reports is published in *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0).

### PERSONS NOT IN THE LABOUR FORCE (INCLUDING DISCOURAGED JOBSEEKERS)

### EXPLANATORY NOTES

### Introduction

In September 1979 a supplementary survey was conducted to obtain information about persons aged 15 to 64 years who were not in the labour force; in particular, whether they wanted a job and, if they did, why they were not looking for work.

2. Results of the survey were published in *Persons* Not in the Labour Force, Australia, September 1979 (6220.0). Results of similar surveys conducted in November 1975, May 1977 and March 1979 were published in previous issues of 6220.0. The following tables (Tables 26 to 28) were compiled from the results of the September 1979 survey.

### Definitions

3. Persons not in the labour force, see paragraph 12, page 7.

4. *Persons who wanted a job* are defined for this survey, as those persons who were not employed at the time of the survey, and:

(a) in the four weeks before the interview week had not looked for work but in the survey answered 'yes' or 'maybe' to the question 'Even though you have not been looking for work would you like a full-time or part-time job now', or (b) although claiming to have looked for work in the four weeks before the interview week, had not taken active steps (as defined below) to find employment.

5. Active steps to find work include checking or registering with the Commonwealth Employment Service or other employment agencies, writing, telephoning or applying in person to an employer, answering a newspaper advertisement for a job, advertising or tendering for work, contacting friends or relatives, and looking on factory or employment service notice boards.

6. Discouraged job seekers are persons who wanted a job but were not actively looking for work because they believed they would not be able to find a job for any of the following reasons: they were considered by employers to be too young or too old; they had language or racial difficulties; they lacked the necessary training, skills or experience; or there were no jobs in their locality or line of work.

### Reliability of the estimates

7. The standard errors given in Table A on page 8 and, in general, the comments on the reliability of estimates on pages 7 and 8 are also applicable to this survey.

### PERSONS LOOKING FOR WORK

### EXPLANATORY NOTES

### Introduction

In July 1979 a supplementary survey was conducted to obtain information about unemployed persons who had recently been looking for work, including particulars of their last job, difficulties experienced in finding a job, educational attainment, family status, steps taken to find work, whether or not they had had offers of employment, and whether or not they would move interstate or intrastate if offered a suitable job. In addition to estimates of unemployed persons looking for work, the survey publication (6222.0) also includes estimates of the number of families in which some members were unemployed, families in which the husband or head was unemployed, and the family status of individuals looking for work.

2. Results of the survey were published in *Persons* Looking for Work, Australia, July 1979 (6222.0). Results of similar surveys conducted in May and November 1976, May 1977 and July 1978 were published in previous issues of 6222.0.

3. The following tables (Tables 29–48) were compiled from the results of the July 1979 survey.

### Definitions

4. Persons looking for work were defined, for this survey, as all civilians aged 15 years and over within the scope of the survey who were not employed during the survey week (i.e. the week immediately preceding that in which the interview took place), had actively looked for full-time or part-time work at any time in the four weeks up to the end of the survey week, and:

- (a) were available for work in the survey week, or would have been available except for temporary illness (i.e. lasting for less than four weeks to the end of the survey week); or
- (b) were waiting to start a new job within four weeks from the end of the survey week and would have started in the survey week if the job had been available then.

5. Persons waiting to be called back to a full-time or part-time job from which they had been stood down without pay for less than four weeks up to the end of the survey week (including the whole of the survey week) for reasons other than bad weather or plant breakdown are included in Tables 29 to 33 which relate to *families* but not in Tables 34 to 48, which relate to *persons* looking for work. In July 1979 there were an estimated 9,600 persons in this category. As such persons are classified as unemployed in the labour force survey, the number of persons looking for work in the following tables does not agree with the number of unemployed persons shown in the tables in Section 1. 6. *Educational attainment*. For definitions see paragraphs 6-8, page 51.

7. A family was generally defined to consist of two or more persons living in the same household at the time of the survey, comprising the head of the family and spouse (if any) and any persons having any of the following relationships to them:

- (a) sons or daughters of any age, if not married and not accompanied by children of their own.
- (b) brothers or sisters, if not married and not accompanied by parents or children of their own.
- (c) grandchildren, if not married and not accompanied by either of their parents, nor by children of their own.
- (d) ancestors, if not married and not accompanied by children under 15 years of age of their own; or
- (e) any children under 15 years of age not accompanied by a parent, unless the children were related to some person in a second family in the household.

8. The following points should be noted in relation to the definition of a family in the previous paragraph:

- (a) family status was determined at the time of the survey. Thus, if members of the family were absent (e.g. children at boarding schools) the family status of the head and other family members could have been affected.
- (b) the term 'relationship' includes relationships by blood, marriage or adoption.
- (c) the marriage relationship includes legal and de facto relationships.
- (d) the term 'not married' comprises never married, widowed, divorced and permanently separated persons.
- (e) a family, as defined, can contain no more than two married persons, and can contain two married persons only if these persons are husband and wife.

9. Dependent children comprise all family members under 15 years of age and all family members aged 15 to 20 years who are full-time students.

### Reliability of the estimates

10. The standard errors given in Table A page 8 in general and the comments on the reliability of estimates on pages 7 and 8 are applicable to the survey.

### THE LABOUR FORCE : EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT

### **EXPLANATORY NOTES**

### Introduction

In February 1979 a supplementary survey was conducted to obtain information about the highest educational qualifications attained by persons in the labour force. For persons with post-school qualifications the information included the field of study, and for those who did not complete their schooling it included the age at which they left school.

2. Results of the survey were published in *The* Labour Force : Educational Attainment, Australia, February 1979 (6235.0).

3. The following tables (Tables 49 and 50) were compiled from the results of this survey.

4. Tables 38, 39 and 44, compiled from the survey *Persons Looking for Work, July 1979*, also contain statistics classified by educational attainment.

### Definitions

5. Definitions of the principal labour force categories shown in the following tables are given on page 6, but it should be noted that there are slight differences in the estimates for labour force categories shown in the following tables. This is due to (a) the different sizes of the samples used (the labour force survey was approximately twice the size of the educational qualifications survey) and (b) the inability to obtain, from a small number of persons, the additional information required for the educational qualifications survey; although the estimation procedures take account of this, estimates for some characteristics will be affected. 6. Persons with a post-school qualification are those who had left school and answered 'Yes' to the question 'Since leaving school have you obtained a certificate, diploma, degree or any other qualification?'

7. Classification of post-school qualifications. Respondents indicated which one of the following groups best described their highest qualification:

- (a) Degree or equivalent: a bachelor degree (including honours), a graduate or post-graduate diploma, a masters degree or a doctorate.
- (b) *Trade, technical:* completion of an approved trade/technician, apprenticeship or training course, other certificate or diploma in secretarial or business studies, administration, teaching, nursing, etc.
- (c) Other: completion of other post-secondary education e.g. adult education, preparatory/bridging course or hobby course.

8. Highest level of secondary school available refers to the highest level of secondary schooling (or equivalent) offered by the education system at the time the respondent left school.

### Reliability of the estimates

9. The comments on the reliability of the estimates on pages 7 and 8 are also, in general, applicable to this survey. However, because the sample used for this survey was approximately half the size of the labour force survey sample, the standard errors shown in the following table differ from those shown in Table A on page 8.

### LABOUR FORCE EXPERIENCE DURING 1978

### EXPLANATORY NOTES

### Introduction

In February 1979 a supplementary survey was conducted to obtain statistics about the labour force experience during 1978 of civilians aged 15 years and over. Information obtained included the length of time (in 1978) during which persons were employed, looking for work or not in the labour force; the number of periods during which they were looking for work; and other aspects of labour force experience.

2. Results of the survey were published in *Labour* Force Experience During 1978 (6206.0). Results of similar surveys relating to the years 1968, 1972, 1974, 1975 and 1976 were published in previous issues of 6206.0.

3. The following tables (Tables 51 to 56) refer to persons who looked for work during 1978 and were compiled from the results of the February 1979 survey.

### Definitions

4. It is impracticable to obtain information relating to a calendar year, which is strictly comparable with that obtained in the monthly labour force survey (for which the reference period is one week). For this reason the definitions used in this survey differ slightly from those shown on pages 6 to 7. In particular it should be noted that whereas the monthly survey seeks information on job search during the four weeks prior to the interview week, and does not classify a person as unemployed unless active steps to obtain work were taken during those four weeks and the person was available to start work in the survey week, no such constraints applied in the labour force experience survey.

5. For this survey, each person was assigned to a labour force category for each week in 1978 on the basis of his actual activity (i.e. whether working, looking for work, etc.) during that week. The principal categories are:

- (a) Persons in the labour force.
- (b) Employed persons.
- (c) Persons looking for work. A person was classified as looking for work during a week if, in that week, he did no work at all, did not have a job or business, and was looking for work. No constraints concerning the taking of active steps to find work, or availability to start work, applied.
- (d) Persons out of the labour force.

### Reliability of the estimates

6. The comments on the reliability of the estimates on pages 7 and 8 are also, in general, applicable to this survey. However, because the sample used for this survey was approximately half the size of the labour force survey sample, the standard errors relating to this survey, are shown on page 51.

### WORKING CONDITIONS

### EXPLANATORY NOTES

### Introduction

During the period February to May 1979 a special survey was conducted in order to obtain information on a number of topics including working conditions. For the purposes of the survey, working conditions were those aspects of the working situation which directly affected wage and salary earners (employees) and had an influence on their overall satisfaction with their jobs.

2. Some results of the survey were published in *Working Conditions, Australia, February to May 1979* (*Preliminary*) (6333.0). Further results will be published shortly. The following table includes information concerning the utilisation and the underutilisation of skills and abilities.

### Definitions

3. The attitudes of employees to individual aspects of work were assessed by classifying their responses on the basis of frequency of occurrence or degree of satisfaction. The following aspects (included in Table 57) were assessed on a frequency of occurrence basis:

Able to develop job skills and abilities.

Able to use existing skills and abilities.

4. Questions concerning working conditions were asked only of persons who, at the time of the survey, were employees and who usually worked at least 20 hours a week. Approximately 4,320,300 employees were represented by the survey. Respondents were interviewed personally.

5. Since the attitude of respondents to aspects of working conditions shown in Table 57 was necessarily subjective, the figures may not represent the actual frequency of occurrence of particular conditions, but rather the respondents perception of them.

### Reliability of the estimates

6. The comments on the reliability of the estimates on pages 7 and 8 are also, in general, applicable to this survey. However because the sample used for this survey was approximately one half the size of the labour force survey, the standard errors relating to this survey differ from those applicable to that survey. Details on the reliability of the estimates for the Working Conditions survey are set out in the survey publication (6333.0) mentioned above. Percentage estimates with numerators less than 7,000 (which has a relative standard error of 27.3 per cent) have not been included in Table 57. Although figures for these small components can, in some cases, be derived by subtraction, they should not be regarded as reliable.
