

CATEGORY OF EMPLOYEES

This publication presents information on the composition and distribution of the earnings of wage and salary employees in Australia at May 1995 derived from the Employee Earnings and Hours (EEH) survey.

PERCENTAGE CONTRIBUTION TO TOTAL NUMBER OF EMPLOYEES BY EACH CATEGORY OF EMPLOYEE WITHIN SCOPE OF THE EEH SURVEY, MAY 1995



Some characteristics of the major categories of employees in May 1995 were:

- Full-time adult managerial employees had the highest average weekly total earnings (\$881.30) of all employee categories. A relatively high proportion of employees in this category were male (76.6%);
- Full-time adult non-managerial employees' average weekly total earnings (\$655.50) was higher than the average for all employees (\$551.00), reflecting the exclusion of lower-earning groups such as junior and part-time employees from this category. Some 61.8% of employees in this category were male. Full-time adult non-managerial employees accounted for two-thirds (67.7%) of all male employees and almost half (47.5%) of all female employees;
- Full-time junior non-managerial employees had lower average weekly total earnings (\$308.00), compared with adult employees, and represented only 3.0% of all employees in the scope of the EEH survey; and
- Part-time employees constituted 28.4% of all employees. Their lower average weekly total earnings (\$241.00), compared with full-time employees reflected, in part, the lower average weekly hours they were paid for. Almost three-quarters of employees in this category were female (74.0%), with almost half of all female employees (44.9%) being classified as part-time.

DISTRIBUTION OF EARNINGS

Full-time adult non-managerial employees (Tables 17, 18 & 19)

- Average weekly total earnings was \$655.50, an increase of 5.2% in the year to May 1995;
- Median weekly total earnings was \$598.00, up 4.3% from \$573.10 in May last year; and
- 25% of employees recorded weekly carnings of \$484.40 or less, and 25% recorded earnings
 of \$769.50 or more, compared with \$463.30 and \$730.60, respectively, in May 1994.

Sex

- Average weekly total earnings was \$697.70 for males (up 5.7% since last year), and \$587.10 for females (up 4.3%);
- Median weekly total earnings for males was \$639.60, compared with \$548.20 for females up from \$605.20 and \$523.80, respectively, last year; and
- 25% of male employees recorded earnings of \$505.30 or less, and 25% recorded earnings of \$817.70 or more. For female employees, 25% recorded earnings of \$460.20 or less and 25% recorded earnings of \$684.30 or more.


Industry

Average weekly total earnings ranged from \$551.40 to \$799.90 for major industry groupings, with all groupings recording increases in average weekly total earnings of employees since May 1994. The largest increase was recorded for Finance and insurance; property and business services (6.7% to \$643.00). Conversely, Accommodation; cultural and personal services recorded the smallest increase (2.2% to \$609.10).

State/Territories

 Average weekly total earnings recorded an increase in all States and Territories in the year to May 1995, with the exception of the Northern Territory which recorded a decrease of 3.3%. Strongest growth occurred, for full-time adult non-managerial employees in Western Australia (7.6%), followed by New South Wales (5.7%). The Australian Capital Territory recorded lower growth (2.4%) than the national average.

Full-time adult employees (Tables 8 & 9)

- Average weekly total earnings increased by 4.8% in the year to May 1995, to \$689.70;
- Median weekly total earnings was \$613.60; compared with \$592.20 last year;
- 25% of employees recorded earnings of \$488.70 or less, compared with \$468.30 last year;
 and
- 25% of employees recorded earnings of \$805.30 or more, up from \$770.70 in May 1994.


Sex

- Average weekly total carnings was \$740.60 for males and \$599.00 for females, up 5.2% and 4.2%, respectively;
- Median weekly total earnings for males was \$666.20 (up from \$634.50), compared with \$552.40 for females (up from \$530.60); and
- 25% of male employees recorded earnings of \$510.80 or less, and 25% of female employees recorded earnings of \$458.40 or less. While 25% of male employees recorded earnings of \$864.30 or more, among females the corresponding earnings quartile was lower at \$702.10.

Occupation

- All major occupation groups recorded an increase for average weekly total earnings of employees in the year to May 1995. The greatest increase occurred among Para-professionals (up 7.4% to \$781.30) and Tradespersons (up 6.7%, to \$654.30);
- As in May 1994, highest average weekly total earnings were recorded for Managers and administrators (\$947.70) and Professionals (\$826.20), while the two major occupation groups recording the lowest average weekly total earnings were Labourers and related workers (\$547.50) and Clerks (\$562.80);
- All major occupation groups recorded an increase for median weekly total earnings of employees since May 1994. The largest absolute increase occurred among Para-professionals (up by \$49.10), while the lowest increase was recorded among Plant and machine operators, and drivers (up by \$10.60); and
- Average weekly total earnings increased for all major occupation groups in the year to May 1995, for both males and females.

Sector

- Average weekly total earnings recorded for the public sector was higher at \$732.30 than for the private sector (\$670.40), with Commonwealth general government employees having the highest recorded average weekly total earnings (\$766.60) in the public sector; and
- Public sector employees had higher recorded average weekly total earnings for both males and females (\$776.60 and \$669.90, respectively), compared with private sector employees (\$726.30 and \$559.20, respectively).

All employees (Table 1)

- Average weekly total earnings recorded for May 1995 was \$551.00, up 3.4% since last year;
- Median weekly total earnings was \$507.60 compared with \$495.70 in May 1994; and
- 25% of employees recorded weekly total earnings of \$337.50 or less and 25% recorded weekly total earnings of \$714.50 or more, compared with \$339.70 and \$688.20, respectively, last year.

Sex

- Average weekly total earnings for male employees was \$654.00 in May 1995, compared with \$434.10 for female employees, up 3.8% and 2.7%, respectively, since last year;
- Median weekly total earnings for males was \$600.70, compared with \$425.10 for females; and
- 25% of male employees recorded earnings of \$439.90 or less, while for female employees
 25% recorded earnings of \$240.60 or less.

Occupation

- Most major occupation groups recorded an increase for average weekly total earnings of employees in the year to May 1995, the exception being Labourers and related workers where a 0.3% decrease was recorded. The largest increase occurred among Para-professionals (up 7.5% to \$683.30);
- Highest average weekly total earnings were recorded for Managers and administrators
 (\$923.60) and Professionals (\$711.20), while the two major occupation groups recording the
 lowest average weekly total earnings were Salespersons and personal service workers
 (\$356.70) and Labourers and related workers (\$394.80); and
- The increase recorded in median weekly total earnings of employees since May 1994 for major occupation groups ranged from \$52.60 for Para-professionals to a decrease of \$7.10 for Salespersons and personal service workers.

Ordinary time hourly earnings (Tables 14 & 15)

Adult employees

- Average ordinary time hourly earnings for full-time adult non-managerial employees was \$16.00, up from \$15.20 last year. This was slightly higher for male employees (\$16.50) than for females employees (\$15.20); and
- 25% of full-time adult non-managerial employees had average ordinary time hourly earnings of \$12.20 or less, while 25% had average ordinary time hourly earnings of \$18.80 or more.

Junior employees

- Average ordinary time hourly earnings for full-time junior non-managerial employees was \$7.70, compared with \$7.40 in May 1994. The average ordinary time hourly earnings for part-time junior non-managerial employees was slightly higher at \$8.30;
- 25% of full-time junior non-managerial employees had average ordinary time hourly earnings of \$6.20 or less; and
- Average ordinary time hourly earnings for full-time junior non-managerial male and female employees were similar at \$7.50 and \$7.90, respectively.

COMPOSITION OF EARNINGS

Base pay (Tables 2, 20, 21, 22 & 23)

- Average weekly base pay for all employees was \$510.10, up by 3.4% since May 1994;
- In the year to May 1995, all categories of employees recorded an increase in average weekly base pay. Average weekly base pay for full-time adult non-managerial employees increased by \$28.50 (5.1%) in this period. Across employee categories increases in average weekly base pay ranged from \$2.60 (1.1%) for part-time employees to \$51.20 (6.3%) for full-time adult managerial employees; and
- For all employees, average weekly base pay constituted 92.6% of average weekly total earnings, a similar proportion to last year. Average weekly base pay constituted a higher than average proportion of average weekly total earnings among full-time adult managerial employees (98.3%) and part-time employees (97.7%), reflecting low overaward and overagreement pay and overtime.

Sex


- All employee categories for both males and females recorded increases in average weekly base pay. Recorded increases were \$21.90 (3.9%) for average weekly base pay for male employees and \$11.30 (2.8%) for female employees;
- Among male employees, increases in average weekly base pay were highest, in both proportional and absolute terms, among full-time adult managerial employees (\$56.00 or 6.5%), and lowest among full-time junior non-managerial employees (\$5.40 or 2.0%). For females, full-time adult managerial employees also had the highest recorded increase in the year to May 1995 (\$36.50 or 5.5%), while part-time employees had the lowest (\$1.40 or 0.6%); and
- Base pay constituted a lower proportion of all male employees' average weekly total earnings (90.0%) than for all female employees (96.9%). These proportions were similar to those recorded in May 1994.

Occupation

- Average weekly base pay increased across all major occupation groups for full-time adult non-managerial employees in the year to May 1995. This increase ranged from 3.9% (\$20.20) for Clerks to 6.3% (\$43.10) for Para-professionals; and
- For full-time adult non-managerial employees, the highest average weekly base pay was recorded for Professionals (\$798.20) and the lowest was recorded for Labourers and related workers (\$468.60).

industry

- Average weekly base pay increased across all major industry groups for full-time adult non-managerial employees since May last year. The highest recorded absolute increase occurred in the Mining industry group (\$56.50), while the lowest occurred in the Personal and other services industry group (\$9.80); and
- The highest average weekly base pay for full-time adult non-managerial employees was recorded for Mining (\$834.50) and the lowest was recorded for Retail trade (\$462.70).


States/Territories

- With the exception of the Northern Territory, where a 0.6% decrease was recorded, an increase was recorded in the average weekly base pay of full-time adult non-managerial employees in all States and Territories. The greatest absolute increase occurred in Western Australia (\$41.40) while Queensland experienced the strongest relative growth (7.7%);
- The Australian Capital Territory had the highest recorded average weekly base pay for full-time adult non-managerial employees (\$649.70) while Tasmania had the lowest (\$563.40); and
- Average weekly base as a proportion of average weekly total earnings ranged from 89.4% in New South Wales to 95.8% in the Australian Capital Territory.

Sector

- Average weekly base pay was higher for full-time adult non-managerial employees in the public sector (\$663.80) than for those in the private sector (\$554.50); and
- Average weekly base pay constituted 95.1% of average weekly total earnings for full-time adult non-managerial employees in the public sector and 87.5% of average weekly total earnings for the private sector.

Overtime (Tables 25, 26 & 27)

Walder St. Daniel Co.

 In May 1995, the average number of paid overtime hours recorded for full-time adult non-managerial employees who worked overtime was similar to that recorded for May 1994 (7.7 hours compared with 7.5 hours). However, the average weekly overtime earnings for these employees increased by 7.9% (\$13.40) to \$182.00.

Sex

- The average number of overtime hours recorded for full-time adult non-managerial male employees who worked overtime was 8.4 hours, compared with 4.8 hours for females. Both were similar to the hours recorded for males and females in May 1994 (8.2 hours and 4.7 hours, respectively);
- Reflecting their higher average overtime hours worked, full-time adult non-managerial male employees had higher average overtime earnings (\$201.10) than full-time adult non-managerial female employees (\$104.50); and
- The average overtime earnings recorded for full-time adult non-managerial male employees
 who worked overtime increased by 7.7% since last year, compared with a 6.2% increase for
 females.


Occupation

- Among full-time adult non-managerial employees, Salespersons and personal service workers who worked overtime had both the lowest average overtime hours (4.3 hours) and the lowest average overtime carnings (\$90.50) of all the major occupation groups. Plant and machine operators, and drivers had the highest recorded average overtime hours worked (9.9 hours), earning an average of \$222.90 in overtime. However, Professionals had the highest recorded average overtime earnings (\$234.10), for which they worked an average of 6.8 overtime hours; and
- Tradespersons had the largest absolute increase in average overtime earnings since May 1994 (\$23.60), while Salespersons and personal service workers had the lowest (\$0.90).

Industry

- Of the major industry groups, full-time adult non-managerial employees working overtime in the Construction industry had the highest average overtime hours (12.2 hours) and those in the Finance and insurance industry had the lowest (3.4 hours). However, in terms of earnings employees in the Mining industry had the highest recorded average overtime earnings (\$301.00), for which they worked an average of 10.9 hours. Employees in the Finance and insurance industry had the lowest average overtime earnings (\$78.90); and
- The largest absolute increase in average weekly overtime earnings since May 1994 occurred
 among full-time adult non-managerial employees working overtime in the Electricity, gas and
 water supply industry (\$40.00), while the largest decrease of \$35.10 was recorded in the
 Education industry.

States/Territories

Western Australia had both the highest overtime hours (9.0 hours) and the highest overtime earnings (\$205.10) for full-time adult non-managerial employees of all States and Territories.
 The Australian Capital Territory had the lowest (5.7 hours and \$138.70).

Sector

- Average overtime earnings for full-time adult non-managerial employees working overtime in the private sector (\$188.80) was higher than those for employees in the public sector (\$162.90). In keeping with this, average overtime hours worked was higher in the private sector (8.2 hours), compared with average overtime hours worked in the public sector (6.1 hours);
- Average overtime hours recorded in May 1995 for full-time adult non-managerial employees working overtime in both sectors were similar to those recorded in May 1994; and
- Average overtime earnings for the private sector increased by \$14.40 (8.3%) in the year to May 1995, compared with \$9.80 (6.4%) for the public sector.

Overaward and overagreement pay (Tables 2, 20, 21, 22 & 23)

- Average weekly overaward and overagreement pay recorded for all employees increased by 11.3% (\$0.60) to \$5.90 in the year to May 1995; and
- For full-time adult non-managerial employees this increase was stronger at 19.7% (\$1.40), taking average overaward and overagreement pay to \$8.50.

Sex

 Average overaward and overagreement pay for full-time adult non-managerial male employees was over twice that for female employees (\$10.60 and \$5.00, respectively), up by \$2.00 and \$0.30, respectively, since last year.

Occupation

 Among the major occupation groups, Tradespersons had the highest average overaward and overagreement pay for full-time adult non-managerial employees (\$16.90), while Para-professionals had the lowest (\$2.70).


Sector

 Average overaward and overagreement pay for full-time adult non-managerial employees was higher in the private sector than the public sector (\$12.40 compared with \$0.80).

Part-time employees (Table 33)

- Average weekly total carnings for part-time non-managerial employees was \$239.20, with this
 group having average hourly earnings of \$14.10; and
- Average hourly earnings was similar for male and female part-time non-managerial employees (\$14.00 and \$14.10, respectively). However, average weekly total earnings was lower (\$220.20) for males in this group than for females (\$245.80).


Sex

For full-time adult non-managerial employees, average weekly total hours paid for was 39.9
hours which was the same as in May 1994. In both years this was made up of 37.9 hours of
ordinary time, and 2 hours of overtime.

 Average weekly total hours for full-time adult non-managerial male employees (40.9 hours) were higher than those for females (38.2 hours); and

• Full-time adult non-managerial female employees had lower average weekly ordinary time hours and lower overtime hours (37.6 hours and 0.6 hours, respectively), compared with full-time adult non-managerial male employees (38.1 hours and 2.9 hours, respectively).

Occupation

- Professionals had the lowest recorded average weekly ordinary time hours paid for (37.3 hours) of all the major occupation groups. They also had the lowest average weekly total hours paid for (37.7 hours) and the lowest average weekly overtime hours (0.4 hours); and
- Salespersons and personal service workers had the highest average weekly ordinary time hours (38.6 hours). However, Plant and machine operators, and drivers had the highest average weekly total hours (43.7 hours), due in part to their high average weekly overtime hours (5.3 hours).

Industry

- Full-time adult non-managerial employees in the Education industry had the lowest recorded average weekly total hours paid for (36.7 hours) of all the major industry groups.
 This group also had the lowest average weekly ordinary time hours (36.6 hours) and the lowest average weekly overtime hours (0.1 hours); and
- Full-time adult non-managerial employees in the Mining industry had both the highest average weekly total hours (44.5 hours) and the highest average weekly ordinary time hours (40.2 hours) of all the major industry groups.

Sector

• Higher average weekly total hours were recorded for private sector full-time adult non-managerial employees (40.7 hours) than for public sector employees (38.4). This was also the case for average weekly ordinary time hours (38.2 hours and 37.2 hours, respectively).

States/Territories

• Full-time adult non-managerial employees in Western Australia had the highest recorded average weekly total hours (41.0 hours) and ordinary time hours (38.5 hours) of all States and Territories. The Australian Capital Territory had the lowest (38.1 hours and 37.2 hours, respectively).

INTRODUCTION

- **1** This publication contains estimates obtained from a sample survey of employers conducted in May 1995. The survey is designed to provide statistics on the distribution of employees according to weekly earnings and hours paid for, and on the composition of weekly earnings and hours for various categories of employees and principal occupations.
- **2** Preliminary estimates were published in *Employee Earnings and Hours, Preliminary, Australia, May 1995* (6305.0), released on the 21 December 1995.

SCOPE

- **3** All wage and salary earners who received pay for the reference period are represented in the survey, except:
 - members of the Australian permanent defence forces;
- employees of enterprises primarily engaged in agriculture, forestry and fishing;
- employees in private households employing staff;
- employees of overseas embassies, consulates, etc;
- employees based outside Australia; and
- employees on workers' compensation who are not paid through the payroll.
- **4** Also excluded are the following persons who are not regarded as employees for the purposes of this survey:
 - directors who are not paid a salary;
 - proprietors/partners of unincorporated businesses; and
- self-employed persons such as subcontractors, owner/drivers, consultants and persons paid solely by commission without a retainer.

SURVEY DESIGN

- **5** A sample of approximately 9 000 employers was selected from the ABS register of businesses to ensure adequate State and industry representation. The statistical unit for the survey comprises all activities of an employer in a particular State or Territory. Each statistical unit is classified to an industry which reflects the predominant activity of the business in the State or Territory. In a small number of cases where a business has significant employment in more than one industry, a separate statistical unit is created for each industry. The statistical units are stratified by State, public/private sector, industry and size of employment, and a simple random sample is selected from each stratum.
- **6** Employers with fewer than 10 employees are required to complete details for every employee, while those with 10 or more employees are required to select a random sample of their employees in accordance with instructions supplied by the ABS. Data for approximately 73 000 employees were obtained in the survey.
- **7** Although the sample is not designed specifically to provide estimates of numbers of employees, it is estimated that 3 078 100 male and 2 711 600 female employees are within the scope of the survey. These and other estimates of numbers of employees included in this publication should not be taken as measures of total employment in the categories indicated.

INDUSTRY CLASSIFICATION

- **8** From May 1994, industry data from the Employee Earning and Hours survey have been classified according to the Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification 1993 (ANZSIC), a detailed description of which appears in *Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification*, 1993, (1292.0). The ANZSIC replaces the Australian Standard Industrial Classification 1983 (ASIC) previously used to classify industry data.
- **9** The ANZSIC was developed by the Australian Bureau of Statistics and Statistics New Zealand for use in the production and analysis of industry statistics in both countries. ANZSIC is a classification which serves to identify groupings of businesses which carry out similar economic activities and which satisfy other conditions (like economic significance). These groups can be used to define an industry. An individual business can then be assigned to an industry on the basis of its predominant economic activity.
- **10** Employees selected in the Employee Earnings and Hours survey are classified to the industry of the business in which they are employed (see paragraph 5 above).
- 11 The ANZSIC has a structure consisting of categories at four levels:
- Division (the broadest level as used in this publication);
- Subdivision;
- · Group; and
- Class.

OCCUPATION

12 Occupation is classified according to the Australian Standard Classification of Occupations (ASCO), based on the title and description of the job.

- **13** Care should be taken when comparing survey estimates based on ASCO groups with estimates based on the managerial/non-managerial status of employees, which is determined and reported by the employer. Estimates for employees with manager status include employees classified to ASCO categories other than the ASCO major group "Managers and administrators"; e.g. employees classified as "Professionals" according to ASCO may be categorised by employers as having managerial status. Conversely, tables in this publication which contain estimates for non-managerial employees (as defined by employers) will include some employees who would be classified to the ASCO major group "Managers and administrators".
- **14** Details of ASCO can be found in ASCO: Statistical Classification First Edition (1222.0), and an Information Paper: ASCO Australian Standard Classification of Occupations, April (1221.0).

COMPARABILITY OF RESULTS

- **15** A new sample design was implemented in 1995, primarily to accommodate the full introduction of the new industry classification ANZSIC (see paragraphs 8 to 11 above). Prior to 1995, industry estimates were compiled from a sample design where the sample stratification was based on ASIC. Therefore, the industry level estimates produced on an ANZSIC basis for 1994 will not be as reliable as the 1995 ANZSIC based data and this needs to be taken into account when comparing the 1994 industry data with data for 1995.
- **16** Because of the substantially improved coverage of employers provided by the ABS register of businesses and modifications to some definitions, results from surveys conducted after 1981 are not strictly comparable with those for surveys conducted between 1974 and 1981.
- **17** Care should be taken when comparing the results of this survey with the quarterly scries *Average Weekly Earnings* (6301.0 and 6302.0), as a different sample design and survey methodology are used. The Average Weekly Earnings survey collects information relating to total employment of organisations selected in the survey, whereas results from the Employee Earnings and Hours survey are obtained in relation to a sample of employees within the organisations selected. In addition, the size of the sample for the Employee Earnings and Hours survey is much larger than that for the Average Weekly Earnings survey.
- **18** Because of the two stage sampling methodology used for this survey to arrive at a sample of employees, it is not possible to ensure that the representation of all the subgroups of interest in the sample accurately reflect their representation in the population.
- **19** Considerable care is taken in questionnaire design and in the instructions given to employers on how to select samples of their employees. All survey returns are subjected to careful editing to detect reporting errors, inconsistencies and transcription errors. Ultimately, however, the quality of survey results depends on the quality of the information provided by survey respondents and adherence to specified procedures.
- **20** From the May 1993 survey, payments resulting from workplace and enterprise bargaining agreements have been included in "Base pay". Similarly, some payments previously defined as "Overaward pay" may have been absorbed into the new "Base pay" now paid under a workplace/enterprise agreement. Identifiable "Payments by measured result" and "Overtime paid" in accordance with a workplace/enterprise agreement continue to be recorded separately.

RELIABILITY OF ESTIMATES

- **25** Estimates of earnings shown in the tables are rounded to the nearest 10 cents, and those of average weekly hours paid for are rounded to the first decimal place.
- **26** Where figures have been rounded, discrepancies may occur between sums of the component items and totals.

APPENDIX A - TECHNICAL NOTES

INTRODUCTION

1 As the estimates in this publication are based on information relating to a sample of employers and employees, rather than a full enumeration, they are subject to sampling variability. That is, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if the information had been obtained from all employers and all employees. This difference, called *sampling error*, should not be confused with inaccuracy that may occur because of the imperfections in reporting by respondents or in processing by the ABS. Such inaccuracy is referred to as *non-sampling error* and may occur in any enumeration whether it be a full count or sample. Efforts have been made to reduce non-sampling error by careful design of questionnaires, detailed checking of returns and quality control of processing.

RELIABILITY OF ESTIMATES

- **2** The sampling error associated with any estimate can be estimated from the sample results. One measure of sampling error is given by the *standard error*, which indicates the degree to which an estimate may vary from the value that would have been obtained from a full enumeration (the 'true' figure). There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate differs from the true value by less than one standard error, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors.
- **3** Another measure of the sampling error is the *relative standard error*, which is obtained by expressing the standard error as a percentage of the estimate to which it refers. The relative standard error is a useful measure in that it provides an immediate indication of the percentage errors likely to have occurred due to sampling, and thus avoids the need to refer also to the size of the estimate. As it is not practicable to include the standard errors of all estimates in this publication, the tables A to F on pages 67 to 73 have been produced to give an indication of the magnitude of relative standard errors.
- 4 The figures in Table A provide an indication of the magnitude of the standard error of estimates of numbers of employees (distribution of weekly earnings) shown in Table 1. An example of the use of Table A is as follows: the estimate for all male employees in the carnings range \$620 to \$660 is 4.6% of the total number of male employees (see Table 1). This represents approximately 141 600 males. Table A shows the relative standard error of this estimate lies between 4.9% and 4.1% (i.e. approximately 4.3%) or 6 090 employees. There are about two chances in three that a complete collection would give a figure within the range 135 510 to 147 690 and about nineteen chances in twenty that the figure would be within the range 129 420 to 153 780.
- **5** Table B indicates the relative standard error of estimates of averages (composition of average weekly carnings and hours) for full-time adult non-managerial employees. An example of the use of Table B is as follows. Table 2 shows average overtime carnings of full-time adult non-managerial males to be \$68.40. Table B shows the approximate relative standard error for this estimate to be 3.0% (i.e. approximately \$2.10). There are about two chances in three that a complete collection would give a figure within the range \$66.30 to \$70.50 and about nineteen chances in twenty that the figure would be within the range of \$64.30 to \$72.50.
- **6** Tables C, D, E and F indicate the relative standard error of estimates of average weekly total earnings for various categories of employees by occupation, industry, sector and State and Territory, respectively. The use of the relative standard error from these tables can be applied in the same way as in the example for Table B above.
- **7** An asterisk appears against estimates in the publications where the sampling variability is considered too high for most practical uses. Generally, this indicates a relative standard error equal to or greater that 25% of the estimate.

APPENDIX B - GLOSSARY

Adult employees

Adult employees are those employees who are 21 years of age or over and employees under 21 who are paid at the full adult rate for their occupation.

Average (mean) earnings or hours

Average (mean) earnings or hours refers to the amount obtained by dividing the total earnings or hours of a group (e.g. full-time employees) by the number of employees in that group.

Base pay

Base pay refers to the award pay or agreed rate of pay for ordinary time hours paid for. It includes base pay from workplace agreements and enterprise bargaining awards and agreements. For employees covered by an award or workplace/enterprise agreement it includes all allowances (dirt. height, tool, etc.) and penalty payments (e.g. shift loadings) specified in the award or agreement. It excludes overaward and overagreement pay and service increments not specified in the award or agreement. For employees not covered by an award or agreement, base pay is the agreed wage for ordinary time hours paid for.

Employees

Employees refers to all wage and salary earners (as described in paragraphs 3 and 4 of the Explanatory Notes) who received pay for any part of the reference period.

Full-time employees

Full-time employees are permanent, temporary and casual employees who normally work the agreed or award hours for a full-time employee in their occupation and received pay for any part of the reference period. If agreed or award hours do not apply, employees are regarded as full-time if they ordinarily work 35 hours or more per week.

Industry

Industry is classified according to the Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification 1993 (see paragraphs 3 and 8 to 11 of the Explanatory Notes).

Junior employees

Junior employees are those employees who are under 21 years of age and are not paid at the adult rate for their occupation.

Managerial employees

Managerial employees are managerial, executive and senior professional staff. Generally defined as those employees who are in charge of a significant number of employees or have significant responsibilities in the conduct or operations of the organisation and may not receive payment for overtime. Includes professionally qualified staff who primarily perform managerial tasks in conjunction with utilising their professional skills. Working proprietors and working directors of own incorporated businesses have been included as managerial employees.

Median earnings or hours

Median earnings or hours refers to the amount of earnings or hours which divides the distribution into two groups with equal numbers of employees, one half having earnings or hours below the median and the other half having earnings or hours above the median.

Non-managerial employees

Non-managerial employees are those who are not managerial employees as defined. Non-managerial includes supervisors, clerical staff, tradespersons, non-managerial professionals, apprentices, trainees and cadets.

Occupation

Occupation is classified according to the Australian Standard Classification of Occupations (ASCO) (see paragraphs 12 to 14 of the Explanatory Notes).

Ordinary time hours paid for

Ordinary time hours paid for refers to employees' award, standard or agreed hours of work paid for at the ordinary rate. It includes stand-by or reporting time which are part of standard hours of work, and that part of annual leave, paid sick leave and long service leave taken during the reference period. (Note: Hours paid for was not collected for managerial employees.)

Overaward and overagreement

pay

Overaward and overagreement pay refers to amounts of ordinary time pay (regular or otherwise) that are over the award or in excess of amounts specified in workplace/enterprise agreements (e.g. attendance, good time-keeping, profit-sharing, etc.). It excludes payments in the form of a reimbursement for expenses incurred whilst carrying out the employer's business (e.g. payments from petty cash).

Overtime hours paid for

Overtime hours paid for refers to hours in excess of award, standard or agreed hours of work paid for and reported as overtime hours.

Part-time employees

Part-time employees are those who are not full-time as defined.

Payment by measured result

Payment by measured result refers to earnings which vary according to measured performance (e.g. piecework, production and task bonuses and commission).

Percentiles

Percentiles refer to any of a hundred divisions of an earnings or hours distribution. For example:

- 25% of employees earn less than or equal to the 25th percentile; and,
- 75% of employees earn less than or equal to the 75th percentile.

Reference period

Reference period for the survey refers to the last pay period ending on or before 19 May 1995.

Sector

Public sector includes local government authorities and all government departments and agencies created by, or reporting to, the Commonwealth or State/Territory Parliaments. All remaining employees are classified as private sector.

Weekly ordinary time earnings

Weekly ordinary time earnings of employees refers to one week's earnings for the reference period attributable to award, standard or agreed hours of work. It is calculated before taxation and any other deductions (e.g. superannuation, board and lodging) have been made. Included in ordinary time earnings are award and workplace and enterprise bargaining payments and other agreed base rates of pay, overaward and overagreement payments, penalty payments, shift and other allowances, commissions and retainers, bonuses and similar payments related to the reference period, payments under incentive or piecework, payments under profit-sharing schemes normally paid each pay period, payments for leave taken during the reference period, all workers' compensation payments made through the payroll, and salary payments made to directors. Excluded are overtime payments, retrospective pay, pay in advance, leave loadings, severance pay, termination and redundancy payments, payments under salary packaging attracting Fringe Benefit tax and other payments not related to the reference period.

Weekly overtime earnings

Weekly overtime earnings of employees refers to payment for hours in excess of award, standard or agreed hours of work which has been reported as overtime pay.

Weekly total earnings

Weekly total earnings of employees is equal to weekly ordinary time earnings plus weekly overtime earnings.

Weekly total hours paid for

Weekly total hours paid for refers to the hours for which payment was made. It comprises ordinary time hours and paid overtime hours. For employees paid other than weekly, hours were converted to a weekly basis. For employees who began or ceased work, or were absent without pay for any reason during the reference period, only the hours actually paid for were included. (Note: Hours of work were not collected for managerial employees.)




