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## LABOUR MOBILITY, AUSTRALIA, DURING THE YEAR ENDING FEBRUARY 1983

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#### **EXPLANATORY NOTES**

#### Introduction

In association with the February 1983 labour force survey conducted throughout Australia, persons aged fifteen years and over who had worked at some time during the year up to the end of the week prior to interview in February 1983 were asked about their labour mobility during that period. Specific questions related to the duration of current job, whether respondents had changed jobs or not and the number of jobs held during the period.

2. During the two weeks beginning Monday 7 February 1983, specially trained interviewers asked the questions of a sub-sample of 51,000 of the 71,000 respondents in the February labour force survey.

3. A preliminary publication containing a summary of the more important results was published on 7 September 1983. Results of similar surveys, the first conducted in November 1972, have been published in *Labour Mobility*, *Australia* (6209.0).

#### Scope

4. The survey includes all civilians aged fifteen years and over except:

- (a) certain diplomatic personnel of overseas governments, customarily excluded from census and estimated populations;
- (b) overseas residents in Australia;
- (c) dependants of non-Australian defence forces personnel stationed in Australia;
- (d) students boarding at school, some patients in hospitals and sanatoria and inmates of jails, reformatories etc.

5. The estimates relate to persons covered by the survey in February 1983. Because of emigration, deaths and other exits not all persons with labour force experience during the period were covered. Labour mobility may relate to experience outside Australia.

#### Definitions

6. It is impractical to obtain information relating to a whole year which is strictly comparable with that obtained in the monthly labour force survey for which the reference period is one week. The definitions used in determining the labour force status of persons in the monthly survey depend on a detailed set of questions asked about a person's labour force activity during the reference period. For the survey of labour mobility a person is assigned to a labour force category for each of the weeks in the year on the basis of a more limited set of questions. It is for this reason that the terms *worked* and *looked for work* are used in this survey rather than the rigidly defined terms *employed* and *unemployed* used in the monthly labour force survey.

7. The *labour force* comprises all persons who, during any week, are working or looking for work as defined in paragraphs 8 and 9.

8. Persons are classified as *working* for those weeks they reported having either worked or being on paid leave. Periods of one week or more on strike or time off without pay are excluded.

9. Persons are classified as *looking for work* for those weeks they reported as being out of work and looking for a job.

10. Persons out of the labour force are those who, during any week, are neither working nor looking for work as defined in paragraphs 8 and 9.

- 11. For the purposes of the survey, a job is defined as:
  - (a) employment as a wage or salary earner (or unpaid family helper) by a particular employer, in a particular locality; or
  - (b) self-employment (with or without employees) in a particular locality.

12. Locality. In capital cities and major towns each suburb is considered to be a different locality.

13. A change of job may involve a change of employer without a change of job location; a change of location without a change of employer; or a change in both employer and location. For example, the movement of an employer's operations to premises in a different location would entail a change of job for employees who moved to the new location. Promotion or transfer of an employee which involves a move to premises in a different location would also constitute a change of job. It should be noted, however, that for a person who works at different sites for the same employer (for example, a construction worker), his base of operations (i.e. his employer's office, depot, yard, etc.) is considered to be his place of work.

- 14. (a) Whether changed usual residence to take up current job: persons who had a job at February 1983 and who had changed jobs during the year were asked whether they had changed their usual place of residence to take up their job held at February 1983.
  - (b) Whether changed usual residence during most recent period of looking for work: persons who were looking for work at some time during the year were asked whether they had changed their usual place of residence during their most recent period of looking for work. However, any persons who looked for work sometime during the year who reported a change in usual residence to take up their current job were not asked whether they had also changed usual residence while looking for work.

#### Discontinuity in the series

15. The estimates in this publication are not strictly comparable with those obtained from previous surveys. The reference period for the February 1980 and prior surveys was the previous calendar year (e.g. 1 January to 31 December 1979). The reference period for the February 1981 and 1982 surveys was from the beginning of the previous February to the end of the week prior to interview. As interviews were conducted over the second and third week of February, the reference period could extend to 54 weeks. For the February 1983 survey the reference period is the 52 weeks up to the end of the week prior to interview. Due to the change in the reference period timing, some estimates, particularly those for groups who enter the labour force during the earlier months of the year (e.g. 15 to 19 year olds) will also be affected from February 1981 survey onwards.

16. In the February 1981 survey, reason for leaving a job was only asked of persons who changed jobs. For all previous and subsequent surveys, reason for leaving a job was asked of the wider population of persons who left a job.

#### Reliability of the estimates

17. Estimates in this publication are subject to two sources of error:

- (a) sampling error: since the estimates are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings they are subject to sampling variability; that is they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error. More information about this topic will be found in the Technical note.
- (b) non-sampling error: inaccuracies may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents and errors made in the coding and processing of data. These inaccuracies may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient operating procedures.





CAMERON Australian Statistician 7,220,900 persons worked at some time during the year ending February 1983, made up of 6,342,000 who were working in February 1983 and 878,900 who were not working. 5,043,400 persons had been in the same job for the whole 12-month period. The remaining 2,177,500 (about one-third of those who had worked at some time during the year) had started or left a job during the year.

Less than half (911,100) of those who had started or left a job during the year had changed jobs, the remainder either moving into or out of a job; 365,400 had left a job and were looking for work in February 1983 and 513,600 had left the labour force. 387,600 were working in February 1983 having had no previous job during the year. 20.4 per cent of those who had left a job during the year were looking for work in February 1983 and 28.7 per cent were out of the labour force.

Job mobility may be defined as having more than one employer during a reference period or changing work location without changing employer. Of the 7,220,900 persons who worked at some time during the year ending February 1983, 14.9 per cent were job mobile by this definition, comprising 11.4 per cent who had more than one employer or business (including a small proportion who also separately changed work locality) and 3.4 per cent who changed work locality only. In the February 1976 survey these proportions were 17.2 per cent, 14.2 per cent and 3.0 per cent respectively. There was a decline in job mobility over the period 1976 to 1980, reaching a low of 15.7 per cent before increasing in 1981 and 1982. There has been a decline in job mobility between 1982 and 1983 (17.1 per cent to 14.9 per cent). This decrease was largely due to a decline in the number of persons who had had more than one employer or business during the year (14.1 per cent to 11.4 per cent). Persons aged 20-24 years, 25-34 years and 35-44 years showed the greatest decline.






#### Persons who left a job

Almost one quarter (24.2 per cent) of those persons who left a job during the year ending February 1983 did so because they were laid off. The majority of these were younger persons (15-34 years of age). About one in five (21.9 per cent) persons who left a job did so for other involuntary reasons, being business changed location, business closed, fixed-term job and own ill-health. Younger persons were the most affected by the completion of fixed-term jobs. About one in 26 (3.8 per cent) persons left a job to retire; the majority of these were persons aged 55 years and over.

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

#### Estimation procedure


The estimates are derived from the population survey by use of a ratio estimation procedure which ensures that the estimates conform to an independently estimated distribution of the population for each capital city and remainder of State by age and sex, rather than to the corresponding distribution within the sample itself.

#### Reliability of the estimates

2. Since the estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they are subject to sampling variability; that is, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error, which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the figure that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors. Another measure of the likely difference is the relative standard error, which is obtained by expressing the standard error as a percentage of the estimate.

3. Space does not allow for the separate indication of the standard errors of all estimates in this publication. A table of standard errors for general application is given on the following page. Since they are averages based on calculations for a limited number of past surveys over a wide range of labour force characteristics, these figures will not give a precise measure of the standard error of a particular estimate but they will provide an indication of its magnitude.

An example of the calculation and the use of 4. standard errors in relation to estimates of persons is as follows. From Table 17 on page 19, the estimated number of males who, in February 1983, had been in their current job for less than one year is 748,100. Since this estimate is between 500,000 and 1,000,000 in the standard error table, the standard error for Australia will be between 8,250 and 10,400 and can be approximated as 9,300 (rounded to the nearest 100). Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey will fall in the range 738,800 to 757,400 and about nineteen chances in twenty that the value will fall within the range 729,500 to 766,700. This example is illustrated in the following diagram.



5. As can be seen from the standard error table, *the* smaller the estimate the higher is the relative standard error. Very small estimates are thus subject to such high standard errors (relative to the size of the estimate) as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. In the tables in this publication, estimates less than the lowest levels shown in the standard error table have not been published. Although figures for these small components can in some cases be derived by subtraction, they should not be regarded as reliable.

6. Proportions and percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling error. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and the denominator. The formula for the relative standard error (RSE) of a proportion is given below:

RSE 
$$(x/y) = \sqrt{[RSE(x)]^2 - [RSE(y)]^2}$$

7. Considering the example from paragraph 4, the 748,100 males represent 18.8 per cent of the 3,982,200 males working at February 1983. The standard error of 3,982,200 is approximately 15,700 so the relative standard error is 0.4 per cent. The relative standard error for 748,100 is 1.2 per cent. Applying the above formula, the relative standard error of the proportion is  $\sqrt{(1.2)^2 - (0.4)^2}$  or 1.1 per cent, giving a standard error for the proportion (18.8 per cent) of 0.2 percentage points. Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the proportion of males who had been in their current job for less than one year is between 18.6 per cent and 19.0 per cent and nineteen chances in twenty the proportion is within the range 18.4 per cent to 19.2 per cent.

8. Published figures may also be used to estimate the difference between two survey estimates (of numbers or percentages). Such a figure is itself an estimate and is therefore subject to sampling error. The sampling error of the difference between two estimates depends on their standard errors and the relationship (correlation) between them. An approximate standard error (SE) of the difference between two estimates (x-y) may be calculated by the following formula:

$$SE(x-y) = \sqrt{[SE(x)]^2 + [SE(y)]^2}$$

While this formula will only be exact for differences between separate and uncorrelated characteristics or subpopulations it is expected to provide a good approximation for all differences likely to be of interest in this publication.

9. The imprecision due to sampling variability, which is measured by the standard error, should not be confused with inaccuracies that may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents and errors made in the coding and processing of data. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as the *non-sampling error*, and they may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or only a sample.
