



PREFACE

South Australian Economic Indicators is a monthly publication which contains the latest available data at the time of preparation for a range of statistical series that have been identified as indicators of economic activity in this State.

Written and graphic commentary have been included for many of the selected series and analysis has been augmented with the calculation of the percentage change from the previous reference period together with the presentation of comparative Australian data. Time series information has been included to provide a historical perspective on many of the selected indicators. Future issues may be expanded to include further historical data in response to expressed user needs. This product is under continuous review and any suggestions for enhancement will be welcomed.

More detailed information on each series (including explanatory and technical notes) can be obtained from other Australian Bureau of Statistics publications or alternative data sources. To assist those seeking further information a source publication for each of the series has been documented in the statistical summary.

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REVIEW

Overview


- The March quarter growth in Gross State Product (trend estimates expressed in current prices) was 0.2%, the second lowest of all States.
- The underlying trend estimate for employed persons in South Australia
 has shown little change in the last four months and currently stands at
 the same level as 12 months ago while the trend unemployment rate has
 moved downward since January 1994.
- The value of overseas exports of South Australian produced commodities during the three months to April 1994 were 15.0% lower than for the same period twelve months previously.
- Following a period of relatively strong growth in the latter part of 1993 the estimated trend in monthly retail turnover for South Australia has been downward from March 1994.
- The trend series for dwellings approved in South Australia has remained flat over the five month period since December 1993.
- Over the twelve month period to April 1994 the weekly award rates of pay index for full-time adult employees in South Australia increased by 1.2%.
- Secured housing finance commitments in South Australia for April 1994 were 23.3% below the record level of March.

State Accounts

Gross State Product

The March quarter growth in GSP (trend estimates expressed in current prices) was 0.2%, the second lowest of all States and Territories. Growth in GSP continues to decline from the relatively strong growth experienced in most of 1992-93. Growth in GDP for Australia rose 1.5% for the corresponding period.

Growth over the year to March quarter 1994 was 3.1%, approximately one-half of the Australian average (6.0%).




Falls in wages, salaries and supplements (-0.7%) and indirect taxes less subsidies (-0.5%) have contributed to the low growth in GSP for the March quarter 1994. The gross operating surplus component of GSP has maintained steady growth with the March quarter increasing by 1.6%.

State Final Demand

State Final Demand (trend estimates in 1989-90 prices) increased 0.9% during March quarter 1994 to be 2.8% higher than the March quarter 1993. Although below the Australian average of 1.3%, SFD has steadily increased since the March quarter 1993.

Increases in private final consumption expenditure (1.4%) and public final demand (1.4%) were tempered by a fall in private capital expenditure (-2.9%). The fall in private capital expenditure was broad-based, with all major components (except real estate transfer expenses) declining by between 3.0% and 3.6%.

Both public final consumption expenditure and capital expenditure contributed to the increase in public final demand, increasing by 1.0% and 3.6% respectively.

International Accounts

Exports

Overseas exports of South Australian produced commodities during the three months to April 1994 were valued at \$1.038.2 million which was 15.0% lower than the level for the same period twelve months previously. In the latest three-month period cereals and cereal preparations constituted 13.5%; metals and metal manufactures, 10.7%; road vehicles, 8.5%; meat and meat preparations, 8.0%; and petroleum and petroleum products. 7.5% of total exports.

Exports to ASEAN countries accounted for 14.9% of the total during the period, followed by Japan (14.3%) and the United States (10.2%).

Imports


Overseas imports into South Australia during the three months to April 1994 (compiled from import documents lodged in South Australia) were valued at \$652.8 million, 12.9% below the level for the same period twelve months previously. In the latest three-month period road vehicles, parts and accessories constituted 24.5%; machinery 21.5%; and petroleum and petroleum products, 10.4% of total imports.

Consumption and Investment

Retail Turnover

Trend estimates indicate that retail sales for South Australia have shown a decline of 0.4% in April 1994 compared with a national rise of 0.3%. Following a period of relatively strong growth in the latter part of 1993 the estimated trend in monthly retail turnover for South Australia has been downward from March 1994. The April retail turnover estimate in original terms for South Australia was \$617.8 million, a decrease of 6.0% from the March level of \$657.0 million.


RETAIL TURNOVER

New Motor Vehicle Registrations.

The provisional trend estimate for new motor vehicle registrations in May 1994 was 0.2% below the April figure following an upward movement in the trend over the previous six months. The seasonally adjusted estimate for May 1994 was 9.3% above April 1994 but 1.7% lower than May 1993. In original terms there were 3,235 new motor vehicles registered in May 1994, 22.0% higher than April 1994 and 2.1% higher than May 1993. For new passenger vehicles only, the leading makes registered in May 1994 were Holden (660 vehicles), Ford (532), Mitsubishi (491), Toyota (373) and Nissan (90).


NEW MOTOR VEHICLE REGISTRATIONS



Tourist Accommodation

When the March quarter 1994 is compared with the March quarter 1993, rooms available in hotels, motels and guesthouses in South Australia decreased by 1.1%. However, the overall room occupancy rate rose from 47% to 50% with rises ranging from 1.2 percentage points for two star rated establishments to 11.1 percentage points for five star rated establishments. Regional variations ranged from a rise of 5.8 percentage points for the Adelaide Statistical Division to a fall of 3.3 percentage points for the South East Statistical Division. This variation is attributable largely to the holding of the biennial Adelaide Festival of Arts during March 1994. Takings increased by 8.7% to \$35m with average takings per room night occupied rising 3.1% from \$71 to \$73.

Private New Capital Expenditure :


Private new capital expenditure in South Australia for the December quarter 1993 was \$329 million, a decrease of 3.4% from the previous quarter. New buildings and structures accounted for \$70 million white equipment, plant and machinery amounted to \$259 million. In the December quarter 1993 survey businesses provided expectations of new capital expenditure for the six months to June 1994. By adding the estimate to actual expenditure incurred in the September and December quarters of 1993, estimates for the 1993-94 financial year have been compiled. These estimates provide a good indication of the likely outcome for the year. The expected new capital expenditure for 1993-94 is \$1,529 million, compared with actual expenditure in 1992-93 of \$1,513 million.

Production

Dwelling Approvals

The trend estimate for dwellings approved in April in South Australia was 931 dwellings, compared with the (revised) estimate for March of 932. This indicator has displayed very little change in the four month period since December 1993. However, it will require a decline of more than 6.3% in the May seasonally adjusted number of total dwellings to cause the trend to move downward in May. The Australian trend estimate for total dwellings approved fell marginally (by 0.2%) in April to 15,264 following a similar fall in March. However, an increase of about 2% in the seasonally adjusted number of total dwellings approved in May 1994 would see the trend revised to show continued growth from May 1993.

Dwelling Commencements

The preliminary estimates of the number of dwellings commenced in the three months ended March 1994 based on data from the Building Activity Survey for the March quarter 1994 were 2,556 for South Australia and 40,808 throughout Australia. Both figures were down by slightly more than 8% from the previous quarter. During the March quarter most States experienced reductions in the number of houses commenced and while there were increases in the number of other residential units commenced in some States, they were insufficient to prevent an overall decline in the number of commencements being registered.

Value of Non-residential Building Approvals Authorities approved \$36.1 million of non-residential building work in South Australia in April 1994. This represents an increase of 22% from the previous month. However, this statistic can vary widely each month because of the approval of small numbers of jobs valued at relatively large amounts. In April several approved jobs were valued at more than \$5 million. The Australian level of non-residential building approvals increased by 7.6% in April, making South Australia's share of the national total equal to 5.6%.

Value of Total Building Activity

The total value of building work commenced (at current prices) during the December quarter 1993 was \$345.5 million. Of this \$205.3 million was for new residential building, resulting in 2,793 dwelling units. The total value of work done (at current prices) during the December quarter was \$376.5 million while the value of work yet to be done on jobs under construction at the end of the quarter was \$349.2 million.

Value of Engineering Construction


The December 1993 quarter estimate for the value of engineering work done in South Australia was \$184.3 million, an increase of 10.4% on the (revised) September estimate. The Australian estimate was also greater than in the previous quarter, up \$137.5 million (or 4.8%), resulting in the proportion of engineering work done in South Australia increasing marginally to 6.1% of the national total.


Prices

Consumer Price Index

In the March quarter 1994 the all groups Consumer Price Index (CPI) for Adelaide rose 0.7%, resulting in an annual increase of 1.8%. Nationally prices rose 0.4% for the quarter and 1.4% on an annual basis.

In Adelaide the price of potatoes in the March quarter was 59c per kg, 13% lower than the price twelve months ago and the lowest since the September quarter 1991. Prices for other fresh vegetables rose 15.7% from March 1993. While mortgage interest charges have fallen 7.4% over the last twelve months, house insurance has risen 8.2% and home and contents insurance, 9.9%. Education fees in 1994 are 6.6% higher than in 1993 while child care fees are 10.4% higher than one year ago.






House Building Materials

Prices of house building materials in Adelaide increased by 0.3% over the three months to April 1994, compared with a rise of 0.9% nationally. On an annual basis, Adelaide prices rose 9.5% compared with 4.1% nationally.


MATERIALS USED IN HOUSE BUILDING Change from Previous Month



Non-house Building Materials

Over the three months to April 1994 prices of materials used in building other than house building rose by 0.8% in Adelaide, compared with 0.9% for the weighted average of the six state capital cities. In Adelaide the items with the greatest price movement over the three months were ready mixed concrete, for which prices rose 6.8%, and paint and other coatings, for which prices rose 4.5%, returning this series to the same level as twelve months previously.


MATERIALS USED IN BUILDING OTHER THAN HOUSE BUILDING



House Prices

In the March quarter 1994 prices of established houses rose 2.0%, while nationally prices rose 1.1% in the quarter. Prices for project homes rose 1.5% in Adelaide, while nationally prices rose 0.4%. For the year ended March, established house prices in Adelaide fell 0.5% (Canberra was the only other capital to experience a fall), while prices of project homes rose 7.2%, (Darwin being the only capital to have a larger rise).

Labour Force and Demography

Population


The estimated resident population of South Australia increased by 1,444 persons during the December quarter 1993 to 1,466,523. South Australia experienced a natural increase of 2,008 persons, a gain partially offset by a net interstate migration outflow of 689 persons.

The net gain from overseas migration of 125 persons in the December quarter was 869 higher than in the previous quarter.

Employment

The underlying trend estimate for employed persons in South Australia has shown little change in the last four months and currently stands at 634,600, the same level as 12 months ago.

The underlying trend estimate of employed persons in Australia has been increasing since February 1993 and currently stands at 7,850,100. The full-time employment estimate has increased by 1.8% in the last twelve months.



Unemployment

The trend unemployment rate for South Australia decreased to 10.6% in May 1994. This continued the downward movement evident since January 1994. The trend unemployment rate for males decreased (from 11.3% in April 1994) to 11.1%, while the rate for females remained at 9.8%.

In May 1994, the trend estimate of the unemployment rate for Australia decreased to 9.9%, continuing a downward movement evident since October 1993.



Overtime

Industrial Disputes

The percentage of employees who worked overtime in South Australia in February 1994 was 16.8% compared with 17.0% in February 1993.

There were 1,100 working days lost through industrial disputes in South Australia in March 1994. At only 1.8% of the national total, South Australia has experienced a relatively low level of industrial disputation over this period.

In the twelve month period to March 1994, 17,100 working days were lost through industrial disputation in South Australia.



Short-term Overseas Visitors Arrivals Short-term visitor arrivals to South Australia in February 1994 rose 27.5% from January 1994 to a total of 7,359. This figure was 26.7% higher than in February 1993.

Total short-term visitor arrivals to Australia in February 1994 numbered 304,300. This was 21.5% higher than the previous month and 24.0% higher than in February 1993. The trend estimate for arrivals of overseas visitors in February 1994 was 0.8% higher than in January 1994.

The State or Territory of stay of overseas visitors is determined from the intended address reported on arrival in Australian ports and airports. A short-term visit is any intended length of stay less than 12 months.

Short-term Resident Departures

Short-term departures of South Australian residents decreased to 6,571 in February 1994 which was 13.6% less than in January 1994 and 9.6% lower than in February 1993.

Departures of Australian residents in February 1994 rose to 150,300 a increase of 0.3% from January 1994 and 6.7% higher than the February 1993 figure. The trend estimate for February 1994 was 1.3% higher than the estimate for January 1994.

Incomes

Average Weekly Earnings

Average weekly ordinary time earnings of full-time employees in South Australia decreased slightly to \$597.30 in February 1994, down from \$599.40 in November 1993. Male ordinary time earnings decreased to \$619.90, compared with \$626.50 for the previous quarter. Female earnings increased from \$543.20 in the previous quarter to \$548.80.

Average weekly total earnings for all employees amounted to \$512.80 in February 1994, up from \$492.50 in November 1993.

Since it is an average of earnings across all employees, changes in average weekly earnings may occur through changes in employment as well as changes in pay levels.

Award Rates of Pay

Over the twelve months to April 1994 the weekly award rates of pay index for full-time adult employees in South Australia increased by 1.2%.

The largest annual movement of the index for full-time adult male employees has occurred in wholesale and retail trade, with a 3.1% increase since April 1993. For adult females employed full-time, the wholesale and retail trade industry was most prominent, with a 2.1% rise between April 1993 and 1994.


Financial Markets

Housing Finance

Secured housing finance commitments in South Australia fell \$94.2 million (23.3%) from the record level of \$405.3 million in March 1994 to \$311.1 million in April 1994.

This decrease was evident across the board with financing commitments for the construction of dwellings, purchase of newly erected dwellings and purchase of established dwellings falling \$2.1 million (4.1%), \$6.8 million (26.5%) and \$69.0 million (26.6%) respectively.

Personal Finance

In April 1994 the total value of personal finance commitments was \$139.1 million. This was \$38.9 million (21.9%) less than that recorded for March.

Personal finance commitments decreased for both fixed and revolving credit facilities, down \$30.9 million (23.3%) and \$8.0 million (17.6%) respectively.

Under fixed loan facilities the most significant decrease occurred in the category new and used motor vehicles and station wagons, down \$10.8 million (20.3%) to \$42.4 million in April 1994.

Commercial Finance


Total commercial finance commitments made by significant lenders fell from \$709.5 million in March 1994 to \$466.1 million in April 1994.

Commercial finance commitments decreased under both fixed loan and revolving credit facilities.

Fixed loan facilities fell \$75.3 million (23.7%) in April 1994, with the most significant fall occurring within the property and business services industry, down \$31.5 million (51.6%).

Revolving credit facilities fell \$168.3 million (43.0%) with the most significant fall occurring within the manufacturing industry, down \$127.2 million (64.4%).

Lease Finance

The value of goods under new lease finance commitments totalled \$18.2 million in April 1994, a decrease of \$7.2 million (28.0%) from March 1994.

Decreases in lease finance commitments were recorded for most categories except other transport equipment and manufacturing equipment, up \$1.5 million and \$0.1 million respectively. The most significant decrease occurred in the category total motor vehicles, down \$2.7 million (16.2%).
