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PREFACE

This report brings together different sets of demographic indicators in a uniform format for all State Offices of the Australian Bureau of Statistics.

The bulletin is presented in sections, the first of which shows a summary of vital events throughout the year (including comparisons with other States and Territories), followed by details on population, births, deaths, marriages and divorces.

All tables from the previous edition of Demography have been retained for consistency of comparison except for Table 5, Projected Population by Scx, Western Australia, which has been replaced by a 1991 Census table compiled from the Basic Community Profile (2722.5). The Population Projection table will reappear in the next edition. Readers interested in Population Projections should refer to Projections of the Populations of Australia, States and Territories, 1992 to 2041, (3222.0).

The statistics are based on the usual residence of the person experiencing the event. Within that framework, figures are presented according to year of registration, with the exception of a set of tables at the end of both the Births and Deaths sections where data are shown by year of occurrence. It should be noted that occurrence tables are subject to revision as events are registered in subsequent periods.

With the exception of Section 1, each section is preceded by a Summary of Findings. A set of Explanatory Notes and a Glossary of Terms are to be found immediately after the tables. The Notes and Glossary are necessary aids to interpretation of the data and should be read in conjunction with the tables.

Although this bulletin covers several areas of demographic statistics it does not provide all available data. Further information may be found in the bulletins listed in the Explanatory Notes under 'Related publications', obtained through ABS Information Services, Level 1 Hyatt Centre, 30 Terrace Road, East Perth, Telephone (09) 323 5140, or by contacting Mike Joske on (09) 323 5276.

SECTION 2 : POPULATION

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS


Increase in Population

The estimated resident population of Western Australia at 30 June 1992 was 1,657,081 persons, an increase of 21,014 persons (1.3 per cent) over the 30 June 1991 total of 1,636,067 persons.

The estimated resident population of Western Australia at 31 December 1992 was 1,666,658 persons, comprising 837,353 males (50.2 per cent) and 829,305 females (49.8 per cent). On a calendar year basis, Western Australia's population increased by 19,648 in 1992, mainly due to a natural increase of 15,113 excess births over deaths and a gain of 5,161 persons from net overseas migration. There was a net loss of 626 persons from interstate migration.

Population Growth

Western Australia's population growth rate has more than halved since 1988, when the population increased by 3.0 per cent or 45,559 persons. In 1992 Western Australia's population increased by 1.2 per cent or 19,648 persons. Western Australia's rate of growth was third overall following Queensland (2.5 per cent) and the Australian Capital Territory (1.5 per cent).



Settler Arrivals

There were 9,821 permanent settler arrivals in Western Australia in calendar year 1992, 4,113 (29.5 per cent) fewer than the 13,934 recorded in 1991. The countries that contributed most settlers were England 2,191 (22.3 per cent), the United Kingdom and Ireland, not further defined, 1,179 (12.0 per cent), New Zealand 767 (7.8 per cent), Malaysia 567 (5.8 per cent), Viet Nam 487 (5.0 per cent) and India 421 (4.3 per cent).

Long Term Movement

Long term arrivals increased by 4.4 per cent (573 persons) from 13,097 in 1991 to 13,670 in 1992, while long term departures decreased by 3.8 per cent (450 persons) from 11,898 in 1991 to 11,448 in 1992.

Short Term Movement

Total short term arrivals of Western Australian residents and overseas visitors increased by 33.4 per cent (115,599 persons) between 1987 and 1992. Total short term departures have increased by 37.7 per cent (131,329 persons) between 1987 and 1992.

There were 211,986 short term overseas visitor arrivals in calendar year 1992, an increase of 9.7 per cent over the 1991 total of 193,312. The countries of origin with the highest number of visitors were the United Kingdom and Ireland with 49,966 (23.6 per cent), Singapore 36,380 (17.2 per cent), New Zealand 20,578 (9.7 per cent), Japan 19,509 (9.2 per cent), Malaysia 19,019 (9.0 per cent), Indonesia 8,728 (4.1 per cent), the United States of America 7,134 (3.4 per cent) and South Africa 3,070 (1.4 per cent).

There were 268,171 short term Western Australian resident departures in 1992, an increase of 10.7 per cent over the 1991 total of 242,348. The most popular destinations were Indonesia (including Bali) 56,262 (21.0 per cent), the United Kingdom and Ireland 38,753 (14.5 per cent), Singapore 31,278 (11.7 per cent), Malaysia 23,054 (8.6 per cent), New Zealand 22,766 (8.5 per cent), the United States of America 17,563 (6.6 per cent), Hong Kong 14,860 (5.5 per cent) and Thailand 10,903 (4.1 per cent).

SECTION 3: BIRTHS AND CONFINEMENTS

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

Number of Births

In 1992 there were 25,073 births recorded to mothers usually resident in Western Australia, a decrease of 344 (1.4 per cent) from the 25,417 births registered in 1991.

Crude Birth Rate

In 1992 the crude birth rate was 15.1 births per 1,000 of the mean estimated resident population. The rate has decreased gradually since 1988 when the crude birth rate was 16.4.

Childbirth Postponed


Analysis of the age specific birth rates between 1987 and 1992 shows that increasing numbers of women are postponing childbirth or not having children. This is evident in the 20 to 24 year age group where the birth rate decreased from 89.0 to 77.3, and in the 25 to 29 year age group where the birth rate decreased from 143.2 to 132.7. Simultaneously there has been an increase in the number of women in their thirties having children. In the 30 to 34 year age group and the 35 to 39 year age group birth rates rose from 87.5 to 100.8 and from 26.7 to 33.7 respectively.

Median Age of Mother

The median age of mother for all 1992 confinements was 28.5 years. The median age of mother for nuptial first confinements was 27.8 years, 29.4 years for all nuptial confinements and 24.1 years for ex-nuptial confinements. Since 1987, the median age of mother for nuptial first confinements, all nuptial confinements and all confinements has risen each year. The median age of the mother for ex-nuptial confinements increased slightly from 23.7 in 1987 to 24.1 in 1992. The median age of father for nuptial confinements in 1992 was 31.7 years.

Ex-nuptial Births

Ex-nuptial births reached a peak of 6,673 in 1992, a steady rise from 4,623 in 1987, whereas nuptial births fell to their lowest level in 5 years, from 18,709 in 1987 to 18,400 in 1992. From 1987 to 1992 ex-nuptial births, as a percentage of all live births, increased each year from 19.8 per cent in 1987 to 26.6 per cent in 1992. A comparison of ex-nuptial confinements to nuptial confinements reveals that 87.1 per cent of confinements under 20 years of age are ex-nuptial.



Home Births

Of the 25,073 births of Western Australian residents in 1992, 24,740 (98.7 per cent) occurred in a hospital and 140 (0.6 per cent) occurred at home. The remaining 193 births occurred at another private residence, en route to hospital, outside any private residence, in an interstate hospital or where the address was unknown.

SECTION 4 : DEATHS

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

Number of Deaths

There were 9,898 deaths of Western Australian residents registered in 1992, 370 (3.9 per cent) more than the 1991 total of 9,528. Male deaths for 1992 increased by 126 (2.4 per cent) while female deaths increased by 244 (5.7 per cent).

The total of 9,902 deaths registered in Western Australia in 1992 was the highest number of deaths recorded in a calendar year and corresponds to a 4.1 per cent increase in the population aged 70 years and over, the age group with the highest death rate.

The majority of deaths, 84.4 per cent, were in the over 54 year age group which accounted for 81.4 per cent of male deaths and 87.5 per cent of female deaths.

Sex Ratio

The sex ratio of male deaths per 100 female deaths reached its lowest ratio ever, declining from 132 in 1987 to 118 in 1992.

Median Age

The median age at death for males has risen from 71.4 years in 1987 to 72.5 in 1992 and for females from 77.3 years in 1987 to 79.0 in 1992.

Crude Death Rate

The crude death rate for both males and females has fluctuated since 1987. For males the rate has varied between 6.3 and 6.9 deaths per 1,000 of the mean estimated resident population, and for females the rate has varied between 5.2 and 5.5.

Infant Mortality Rate


The infant mortality rate for 1992 was 7.0 deaths per 1,000 live births, the lowest rate ever recorded. The rate for males was 7.6 and for females the rate was 6.3. The percentage of infant deaths under 1 year of age was much higher among Aboriginal people (10.7 per cent) than for the total population (1.8 per cent).

Expectation of Life

The expectation of life has increased steadily for males and marginally for females. Male life expectancy increased 1.9 per cent from 73.8 years in 1987 to 75.2 years in 1992. Female life expectancy increased 0.4 per cent from 80.6 years in 1987 to 80.9 years in 1992.

Causes of Death

There were 6 principal causes of death which accounted for 83.6 per cent of all deaths of Western Australian residents in 1992. They were heart disease, 29.0 per cent; malignant neoplasms (cancers), 26.7 per cent; cerebrovascular disease, 9.7 per cent; diseases of the respiratory system, 7.6 per cent; external causes (accidents, poisoning, violence and suicide), 7.0 per cent; and diseases of the digestive system, 3.6 per cent. The graph below outlines the principal causes of death for males and females as a percentage of total deaths for each sex.

SECTION 5: MARRIAGES

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

Number of Marriages

In 1992 there were 10,118 marriages of Western Australian residents, a decrease of 541 marriages (5.1 per cent) from 1991. Of all the marriages registered 6,555 (64.8 per cent) couples were married for the first time, 1,919 (19.0 per cent) marriages occurred in which one party had been married before and 1,644 (16.2 per cent) marriages were registered in which both parties had previously been married.

Marrying later in Life

Analysis of the ages of bridegrooms and brides in 1987 and 1992 reveals a decline in the number and proportion of marriages in the under 20 and 20 to 24 year age groups. In the 30 and over age groups there has been an increase in the number and proportions, both male and female, of those choosing to marry later in life.

Crude Marriage Rate

The crude marriage rate has declined from 6.8 per 1,000 of the mean estimated resident population in 1987 to 6.1 in 1992.

Median Age

The median age of bridegroom and bride for first marriages has risen since 1987. In 1987 the median age of bridegroom was 26.0 years and has risen to 27.0 in 1992. For brides the median age for first marriages has risen from 23.7 years in 1987 to 24.7 in 1992.

Marriage Rates

First marriage rates and remarriage rates for both bride and bridegroom have shown considerable fluctuation amongst the six census years represented in Table 27. Comparison between the 1966 and 1991 censuses of first marriage rates for both bride and bridegroom show a decline in all age groups since the 1966 census but noticeably in the under 30 year age groups. A comparison of the remarriage rates reveal a similar downward trend, especially in the 20 to 24 year age group.

Marriage Rites

In Western Australia in 1992, 5,151 or 50.9 per cent of all marriages were performed by civil celebrants, and 4,967 or 49.1 per cent were performed by ministers of religion. Of marriages performed by ministers of religion 1,819 (36.6 per cent) were Catholic, 1,213 (24.4 per cent) were Anglican and 720 (14.5 per cent) were Uniting Church.

Registry Offices

The table below provides the location of the Registry office where the marriage was registered. It does not necessarily mean that the marriage ceremony was conducted in that precise location, so that care should be exercised when examining the distribution of marriages throughout Western Australia.



SECTION 6 : DIVORCES

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

Number of Divorces

There were 4,540 divorces granted in Western Australia in 1992, an increase of 94 or 2.1 per cent on 1991.



Crude Divorce Rate

In 1992 the crude divorce rate remained at 2.7 per 1,000 of the mean estimated resident population, unchanged from 1991.

Duration of marriages

The median duration of marriage for divorces granted in 1992 was 11.0 years, an increase of 0.3 years on the 1991 figure of 10.7. The median interval between marriage and final separation in 1992 increased to 7.8 years from 7.5 years in 1991.

Children in divorce

There were 2,549 divorces involving children in 1992, an increase of 43 or 1.7 per cent on 1991. However, the percentage of divorces involving children decreased from 56.4 per cent in 1991 to 56.1 per cent in 1992.

Divorce rate

Age specific divorce rates are consistently lower for husbands than for wives in the 24 and under age group (husbands 0.9, wives 2.2) and the 25 to 29 year age group (husbands 8.2, wives 12.4). The lower divorce rates for husbands in these age groups parallel lower marriage rates for males than for females who are aged 29 years or younger.

Median Ages

The median ages of the husband and wife at marriage, final separation and divorce have risen steadily since 1987. The trend suggests that both males and females are leaving marriage until later in life with the median age of males and females at final separation slightly higher. Although the median age of marriage and divorce has increased, the median duration of the marriage has remained relatively consistent.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Introduction

- 1. This publication brings together a number of closely related series of statistics on demography, including births, deaths, marriages and divorces. It also includes some information on numbers of persons counted at the 1991 Census, estimated resident population and migration. For details of publication of other data related to demography, readers should refer to paragraph 30 of these Notes.
- 2. A Glossary of Terms follows the Explanatory Notes. More detailed definitions are to be found in more specialised publications.

Population

- 3. This Section provides estimates of the resident population with information on overseas arrivals and departures and net interstate migration. Numbers of births and deaths counted in statistical local areas in Western Australia as at 31 December 1992 are shown in Table 2. Birth and Death rates for statistical local areas in Western Australia as at 30 June 1992 will be available after April 1994.
- 4. Estimates of the Western Australian population are made to varying degrees of detail throughout the year, and this publication has used the most up to date estimates available for each particular table.
- 5. The figures for natural increase in Tables 1 and 3 are those used in the preliminary estimate of the population as at 31 December 1992. The final estimate of population, using final Census and vital statistics data, was published in the June quarter 1993 issue of Australian Demographic Statistics (3101.0).
- 6. All information collected in the Population Census is confidential. In Population Census tables (Table 5), automatic adjustments are made to some tables to protect the confidentiality of information about individual persons and families. For this reason the sum of the components of a table will not always equal the total of the table nor will the totals of similar tables be the same. For further information contact the Census Liaison Officer on (09) 323 5218.

Migration

- 7. Data on overseas arrivals and departures relate to the number of movements of travellers rather than to the number of travellers. The statistics exclude the movements of operational air crew and ships' crew, transit passengers who pass through Australia but are not cleared for entry, and passengers on pleasure cruises commencing and finishing in Australia aboard ships not engaged on regular voyages. Estimates of transit sea passengers are no longer available.
- 8. Estimates of interstate migration have been derived front unidentified information on interstate changes of address advised to the Health Insurance Commission in the process of administering Medicare. The ABS adjusts the Health Insurance Commission data to make allowance for persons who do not inform the Commission of their change of address. Further details are shown in the Explanatory Notes to Australian Demographic Statistics (3101.0).

Births

- 9. Birth statistics are presented on the basis of the State or Territory of usual residence of the mother, regardless of where in Australia the birth occurred or was registered.
- 10. Births to mothers usually resident in Australia which took place overseas are excluded. Births to mothers usually resident overseas which occurred in Australia are included in the State or Territory where the birth occurred.
- 11. Except for Tables 13 to 16, the statistics in this publication refer to births registered during the calendar year shown. Tables 13 to 16 refer to births which occurred in the years shown, the data being drawn from registrations up to 30 June 1993. There is usually an interval between the occurrence and registration of a birth, and some births occurring in one year are not registered until the following year, or even later. However, most births are registered shortly after they occur and more than 99 per cent of births occurring in one year are registered by 30 June of the following year.
- 12. Data on stillbirths (fetal deaths) are available in Deaths, Western Australia, 1992 (3312.5).
- 13. The live birth statistics used to calculate the fetal and neonatal death rates have been adjusted (in accordance with the WHO definition of perinatal death) to exclude cases where the birthweight was known to be less than 500 grams. However, infant death rates are calculated using all live births registered because figures are not available for infants who weigh less than 500 grams at birth, and who live for 28 days, but die before they are one year old.

Deaths

- 14. In this publication death statistics are presented on the basis of the State or Territory of usual residence of the deceased, regardless of where in Australia the death occurred and was registered.
- 15. Except for Tables 23 to 25, the death statistics in this publication refer to deaths registered during the year shown. Tables 23 to 25 refer to deaths occurring in the years shown, with data drawn from registrations up to 30 June 1993. There is usually an interval between the occurrence and registration of a death and some deaths occurring in one year are not registered until the following year or even later. However, most deaths are registered shortly after they occur and more than 99 per cent of deaths occurring in one year are registered by 30 June of the following year.
- .16. The Deaths and Perinatal Deaths collections are published in more detail in *Deaths*, *Western Australia*, 1992 (3312.5).

Marriages

17. The statistics in this publication refer to marriages registered by the Western Australian Registrar during the years shown. There is usually an interval of at least some days between the celebration and the registration of a marriage. As a result of the delay in registration, some marriages celebrated in one year are not registered until the following year. Under the Australian Marriage Act 1961, marriages may be celebrated by a minister of religion registered as an authorised celebrant, by a district registrar or by other persons authorised by the

Attorney-General. Notice of the intended marriage must be given to the celebrant at least one calendar month, and within 6 calendar months, before the marriage. A celebrant must transmit an official certificate of the marriage for registration to a District Registrar in the State in which the marriage took place.

- 18. From 20 June 1973, the minimum age at which a person may marry without the written consent of each person whose consent is required under the Act has been 18 years. A male aged between 16 and 18 years may marry with such consent, combined with a judicial order, but the marriage of a female within the same age range requires the consent of her parents or guardians only. A judge or magistrate may, in exceptional circumstances, make an order authorising a male who has attained 16 years of age, or a female who has attained 14 years, to marry a person of marriageable age.
- 19. Figures for years from 1966 include registered marriages identified as those of full-blood Aboriginals. Tribal marriages are excluded from the statistics.

Divorces

- 20. Under the Family Law Act 1975, the only ground on which a divorce may be granted is that of irretrievable breakdown of the marriage. This ground is established by the husband and wife having lived apart for 12 months or more, with there being no reasonable likelihood of reconciliation. Application for nullity of marriage under Family Law legislation must be on the ground that there was a failure to meet a legal requirement, such as that neither party be already lawfully married to another person. There is no provision for judicial separation under Family Law legislation.
- 21. Successful applicants for a divorce are initially granted a *decree nisi*. This becomes absolute after one month, unless it is rescinded or appealed against, or the Court is not satisfied that proper arrangements have been made for the welfare of any children involved.
- 22. The statistics shown in this publication are compiled by the ABS from Statistical Reports completed by the Family Court in respect of each application which resulted in the granting of a *decree absolute*. These reports are forwarded to the ABS on finalisation of proceedings.
- 23. In the interpretation of data, it is important to bear in mind that the availability of judges and complexity of the cases brought before them can affect the number of decrees granted or made absolute in any one year. A rise in numbers may reflect only the clearing of a backlog of cases from an earlier period.
- 24. The number of divorces shown for Western Australia is dependent on the number of cases heard by Family Law Courts in Western Australia. As there is no residential requirement under Family Law, applicants may be resident anywhere in Australia. Caution should therefore be exercised in interpreting the rates shown in this bulletin.

Geographic Boundaries

25. The geographic boundaries for small area data are defined in the Australian Standard Geographical Classification, Edition 8 (1216.0), except for the cities of Perth, Fremantle and Stirling, each of which is comprised of a number of Statistical Local Areas (SLAs).

- 26. The boundaries of SLAs used in determining the population are those in existence at 30 June 1991. The boundaries used for Births and Deaths statistics are the SLA boundaries at January 1991.
- 27. The country of birth tables use the Australian Standard Classification of Countries for Social Statistics (ASCCSS) which was developed for Australian users. In this classification, neighbouring countries are grouped into progressively broader geographic areas on the basis of social, cultural, political and economic similarities. The base units of ASCCSS are broadly compatible with those of the United Nations birthplace classification. ASCCSS has been applied to demographic statistics since January 1990.
- 28. For more detailed information on the classification of countries, refer to the ABS publication Australian Standard Classification of Countries for Social Statistics (1269.0).

Related Publications

29. The format of this publication of demographic statistics is repeated, with minor amendments, across all States and Territories. Each State Demography bulletin has a catalogue number of 3311 and a suffixed number appropriate to the State of publication.

Additional statistics and services available

31. In most cases, the ABS can also make available information which is not published. This information may be made available in one or more of the following forms: microfiche, photocopy, data tape, floppy disk, computer printout, or clerically extracted tabulation.

- 32. Current publications produced by the ABS are listed in the *Catalogue of Publications and Products, Australia* (1101.0). The ABS also issues, on Tuesdays and Fridays, a *Publications Advice* (1105.0) which lists publications to be released in the next few days. These publications are available from any ABS office.
- 33. Information from Life Tables prepared by the Australian Bureau of Statistics as contained in Table 20, Mortality Expectations, relate to the number of deaths registered at five yearly intervals 1971 to 1991. These tables are not constructed according to strict actuarial principles. Readers wishing to use life tables for actuarial purposes are advised to refer to the Official Australian Life Tables 1985-87, prepared by the Australian Government Actuary. These were released in 1991, and copies are available from the AGPS Bookshop in each State capital city.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

- 1. Aboriginal persons, for the purposes of the tables in this publication, are those identified as being Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander.
- 2. Age-specific birth rates are the live births registered during the calendar year, according to age of mother, per 1,000 of the estimated mid-year female resident population of the same age. For the purposes of calculating these rates, births to mothers under 15 are included in the 15-19 year age group, and births to mothers aged 50 and over are included in the 45-49 year age group.
- 3. Age and marital status specific rates distinguish first marriages and remarriages, and use as the denominator the appropriate population estimates by age and marital status. Thus, first marriage rates are the numbers of males and females of a certain age marrying for the first time per 1,000 (mid-year) population of never married males and females of the same age. Remarriage rates are based on the number of remarrying males and females per 1,000 widowed or divorced males and females respectively of the same age. These rates for Western Australia are calculated from the 1991 population census count, as the estimated resident population by marital status by age and sex is calculated only for Australia.
- 4. The age-specific death rate is the number of deaths at a specified age per 1,000 of the population of that age.
- 5. The age-specific divorce rate (per 1,000 population) relates the number of divorced parties by age to the estimated mid-year resident population in specific age groups. Males under 18 and females under 16 are excluded from the population.
- 6. A birth, unless otherwise stated, is a live birth, i.e. the delivery, irrespective of the duration of pregnancy, of a child who, after being born, breathes or shows any other evidence of life such as a heartbeat. A multiple birth is a confinement (see below), which results in two or more births, at least one of which is live born.
- 7. Category of movement in overseas arrivals and departures is primarily determined by the traveller's own selection of his or her category on the passenger card. This selection is accepted if it is consistent with other information on the card.
- 8. The definition of children in the Divorces collection encompasses unmarried children who are under the age of 18 years at the time of application for divorce, as defined by the Family Law Act 1975. These may include (in certain cases) adopted, ex-nuptial, foster or step-children. Children who are married or aged 18 years or more are not subject to custody and guardianship orders, and are therefore excluded. Children in the Marriages collection are children (whether now living and under the age of 16, or deceased), who were born alive to previous marriages. The term children must not be confused with previous issue, used in the Births collection (see paragraph 37).
- 9. A confinement is a pregnancy which results in at least one live birth. Nuptial first confinements are the first confinements in the current marriage and do not

- necessarily represent the woman's first ever confinement resulting in a live birth.
- 10. The crude birth rate is the number of registered live births per 1,000 of the mean estimated resident population, except for Table 2 in which the crude birth rate is measured as the number of registered live births per 1,000 of the mid-year estimated resident population for each statistical local area.
- 11. The crude death rate is the number of registered deaths per 1,000 of the mean estimated resident population, except for Table 2 in which it is measured as the number of registered deaths per 1,000 of the mid-year estimated resident population for each Statistical Local Area.
- 12. The crude divorce rate is the number of decrees absolute granted per 1,000 of the mean estimated resident population. (In the interpretation of this rate, it must be kept in mind that a large and varying proportion of the population used in the denominator is unmarried or below the minimum age of marriage.)
- 13. The *crude marriage rate* is the number of marriages per 1,000 mean estimated resident population.
- 14. Date of final separation is the date, given on the application for divorce, from which the period of living apart is calculated for the purpose of establishing the grounds for divorce. In determining the date of final separation, a single period of resumed cohabitation of less than 3 months may be ignored, provided the periods of living apart before and after resumed cohabitation amount to a total of 12 months or more.
- 15. The term *divorce*, as used in this publication, refers to decrees absolute of dissolution of marriage.
- 16. Duration of marriage is the interval measured in completed years between the date of marriage and:
 (a) In the Births collection, the date of the current birth,
 (b) In the Marriages and Divorces collections, the date a marriage ended by decree made absolute.
- 17. The estimated resident population (ERP) is the official ABS estimate of the Australian population. The Estimated Resident Population of Western Australia is based on the final results of the 1991 population census, and is updated for subsequent births, deaths, and overseas and interstate migration.
- 18. The female net reproduction rate represents the number of daughters a woman would bear if she were subject to the female age-specific fertility and mortality rates of the year shown. It is obtained by multiplying the female age-specific birth rates by the proportion of survivors at corresponding ages in a life table, adding the products and dividing by 1,000.
- 19. Under Western Australian legislation, Fetal and Neonatal deaths relate to the delivery of a child weighing at least 400 grams (Australia 500 grams) at delivery or 20 weeks duration of gestation (Australia 22 weeks). These deaths can still be registered if the birthweight is under 400 grams provided the duration of gestation is 20 weeks

or more, or if the duration of gestation is under 20 weeks provided the birthweight is 400 grams or more. This definition is used in Table 21.

- 20. Fetal deaths in Western Australia relate to the delivery of a child, weighing at least 400 grams at delivery (or, when birthweight is unavailable, of at least 20 weeks gestation), who did not at any time after delivery, breathe or show any other evidence of life such as a heartbeat.
- 21. The fetal death rate in Western Australia is the number of fetal deaths per 1,000 live births of babies who weighed at least 400 grams at birth (or, when birthweight is unavailable, of at least 20 weeks gestation), plus fetal deaths.
- 22. The growth rate expresses population change over a period as a proportion (per cent) of the population at the beginning of that period. In this bulletin, population growth rate is measured over the twelve months to 31 December of the recording year.
- 23. An infant death is the death of a live-born child who died when less than one year old.
- 24. The *infant mortality rate* is the number of deaths of children under one year of age per 1,000 live births.
- 25. Net estimated *interstate migration* is derived from unidentified information on interstate changes of address advised to the Health Insurance Commission.
- 26. Life expectancy refers to the average number of additional years a person of a given age and sex might expect to live if the age-specific death rates of the given year continued throughout his or her lifetime.
- 27. Long-term movements relate to movements of travellers (other than those who, on arrival, hold migrant visas) whose intended or actual length of stay is 12 months or more.
- 28. The median value (age, duration or interval) is that value which divides the relevant population into two equal parts, half falling below this value, and half exceeding it. Where the value for a particular record has not been stated, that record is excluded from the calculation.
- 29. Natural increase is the excess of births over deaths registered in the recording year.
- 30. Neonatal deaths in Western Australia are deaths of live born babies who weighed at least 400 grams at birth (or, when birthweight is unavailable, of at least 20 weeks gestation), and who died within 28 days of birth.

- 31. The neonatal death rate in Western Australia is the number of neonatal deaths per 1,000 live births of babies who weighed at least 400 grams at birth (or, when birthweight is unavailable, of at least 20 weeks gestation).
- 32. Never married refers to those persons who have never been validly married.
- 33. Nuptiality relates to the relative marital status of parents in the Births collection. Confinements and births are identified as being nuptial where the father registered was married to the mother at the time of the birth, or where the husband died during the pregnancy. Other confinements, and the children resulting from them, are classified as ex-nuptial whether or not the parents were living together at the time of the birth, and whether or not the child may subsequently have been legitimised or adopted.
- 34. A perinatal death is either a fetal or a neonatal death, as elsewhere defined.
- 35. The *perinatal death rate* is the number of perinatal deaths per 1,000 live births and fetal deaths combined. (See paragraph 13 of the Explanatory Notes.)
- 36. Permanent movement is comprised of arrivals of settlers, and permanent departures of Australian residents (i.e. those who, on departure, state that they do not intend to return to Australia).
- 37. Previous issue in the Births collection refers to previous live-born issue of a mother to the current marriage only, and excludes foster, step, or adopted children.
- 38. The sex ratio is the number of males per 100 females,
- 39. Short-term movements relate to movements of travellers (other than those who, on arrival, hold migrant visas), whose intended or actual length of stay is up to 12 months.
- 40. The standardised death rate is the overall death rate that would have prevailed in a standard population if it had experienced at each age the death rates of the population being studied. The standard population used in these calculations is all persons in the 1986 Australian population.
- 41. The total fertility rate is obtained by summing the five year age-specific birth rates and multiplying by five. It represents the number of children 1,000 women would bear during their lifetimes if they experienced the rates of the year shown.








