

PREFACE

ABOUT THIS PUBLICATION

This publication presents information about the job search experience of unemployed persons. Data from this survey provide information about the characteristics of unemployed persons, the steps taken to find work by unemployed persons and the difficulties encountered in finding work.

For this publication, labour force activity was determined from a more limited set of questions than is used in the monthly Labour Force Survey (LFS). For this reason, the terms worked and looked for work are used, rather than the more precisely defined terms employed and unemployed, as used in the LFS.

Statistics in this publication were obtained from the annual Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) survey, Job Search Experience of Unemployed Persons.

ABOUT THIS SURVEY

The Job Search Experience of Unemployed Persons Survey was conducted throughout Australia in July 1997 as a supplement to the ABS monthly Labour Force Survey.

Data from the survey relate to persons who were unemployed in July 1997, except for those unemployed persons who were waiting to be called back to a job from which they had been stood down. All tables in this publication, with the exception of table 1, exclude this group of unemployed persons.

Questions asked in this survey covered the two key aspects of the experience of persons looking for work — the steps being taken to find work and barriers to obtaining work that are encountered.

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SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

THE LABOUR FORCE

In July 1997, the Australian labour force was estimated at 9,203,000 persons. In original terms, there were 750,900 unemployed persons, an increase of 2.6% since July 1996. The unemployment rate was 8.2%, which was 0.2 percentage points higher than in July 1996. Some 83% of unemployed persons were looking for full-time work, of whom nearly two-thirds were males. In contrast, females represented two-thirds of unemployed persons looking for part-time work.

Two key aspects of the job search experience are the steps taken to find work and the barriers to obtaining work that are encountered. Characteristics such as age, sex and education of the persons looking for work often influence the job search experience and outcomes. Examples of steps taken to find work in July 1997 are registering with the then Commonwealth Employment Service (CES) and contacting prospective employers. Common difficulties in finding work are: 'considered too young or too old by employers', 'too many applicants for available jobs', and there being 'no vacancies at all'.

ACTIVE STEPS TAKEN TO FIND WORK

Active steps taken to find work included:

- registering with the CES or other employment agencies;
- writing, telephoning or applying in person to an employer;
- answering a newspaper advertisement;
- checking factory/CES noticeboards;
- advertising or tendering; and
- contacting relatives/friends.

In July 1997, almost three-quarters (74%) of unemployed persons were registered with the CES and also contacted prospective employers. A further 22% contacted prospective employers but were not registered with the CES.


Of those looking for full-time work, the vast majority (83%) indicated they were registered with the CES and had contacted prospective employers. In contrast, the most common active step taken by those looking for part-time work was contacting prospective employers without registering with the CES (60%).

PERSONS REGISTERED WITH THE CES

The proportion of unemployed persons registered with the CES fell slightly for the fourth consecutive year, to 77% in July 1997 (from a high of 83% in 1993). The proportion of full-time job seekers registered with the CES (85%) was higher than that for part-time job seekers (35%), with a higher proportion of unemployed males registering (83%) than females (66%).

PERSONS REGISTERED WITH THE CES continued

Males looking for full-time work had higher CES registration rates in all age groups, with the greatest differences being for those aged between 35 and 44, and for those aged 55 and over.

Of all unemployed 15-19 year olds, only 60% were registered with the CES. This reflects the relatively high proportion of 15-19 year olds searching for part-time work (36%, compared with 11% to 14% in other age groups). In fact, unemployed 15-19 year olds represented 38% of all persons seeking part-time work and 13% of all persons seeking full-time work. Of unemployed 15-19 year olds, the CES registration rate was 84% for those seeking full-time work, and 18% for those seeking part-time work.

MAIN DIFFICULTY IN FINDING WORK

The main difficulties in finding work most commonly reported were:

- 'considered too young or too old by employers' (15%);
- 'too many applicants for available jobs' (15%);
- 'no vacancies at all' (13%); and
- 'lacked necessary skills/education' (12%).

Of unemployed males, 16% reported 'considered too young or too old by employers' as the main difficulty in finding work. The main difficulty reported by unemployed females was 'too many applicants for available jobs' (14%).

In the younger age groups, males aged 15-24 years most commonly reported 'insufficient work experience' as the main difficulty (18%). For females aged 15-24 years the most commonly reported main difficulties were 'insufficient work experience' (16%) and 'lacked necessary skills/education' (16%).

MAIN DIFFICULTY IN FINDING WORK continued

Too many applicants for available jobs' was the most common main difficulty for males aged 25–44 years (19%), and females aged 25–34 years (16%). For females aged 35–44 years, 'no vacancies at all' was the difficulty most commonly reported (14%).

'Considered too young or too old by employers' was the main difficulty most commonly reported by both males and females aged 45 years and over (50% of males and 33% of females).


Average duration of unemployment

In July 1997, the average duration of unemployment was 56 weeks. However, the median duration of unemployment (the point at which half of unemployed persons are below and half are above) was only 26 weeks, reflecting the marked effect of the long-term unemployed (persons unemployed for a period of 52 weeks or more) on the average duration of unemployment.

The average duration of unemployment for males was 63 weeks for those seeking full-time work and 32 weeks for those seeking part-time work. The average duration of unemployment for females was lower, at 55 weeks for those seeking full-time work and 36 weeks for those seeking part-time work.

Those reporting 'considered too young or too old-by employers' as their main difficulty finding work had the longest average duration of unemployment (78 weeks). This was followed by 'own ill health or disability' (71 weeks) and 'language difficulties' (69 weeks).

Although the overall average duration of unemployment was shorter for females than for males (50 weeks compared to 60 weeks), females who reported 'considered too young or too old by employers', 'language difficulties', 'too many applicants for available jobs' and 'unsuitable hours' as their main difficulty finding work had a longer average duration of unemployment than males reporting those same main difficulties.

The long-term unemployed

In July 1997, there were 238,000 long-term unemployed persons, representing one-third of all unemployed persons. This was slightly higher than in July 1996 when 30% were long-term unemployed.

The main difficulties in finding work most commonly reported by the long-term unemployed were 'considered too young or too old by employers' (20%), 'lacked necessary skills/education' (14%) and 'no vacancies at all' (13%).

The majority (87%) of long-term unemployed persons in July 1997 had not received any offers of employment in the previous 12 months, slightly lower than in July 1996 when 90% had not received any offers of employment.

Educational attainment

In July 1997, 30% of unemployed persons had post-school qualifications.

The most common main difficulty in finding work reported by those with post-school qualifications was 'considered too young or too old by employers' (16%). For those without post-school qualifications, the response 'lacked necessary skills/education' was the most commonly reported main difficulty in finding work (15%).


The proportion of persons who reported 'too many_applicants for available jobs' as the main difficulty in finding work was almost the same, for those with post-school qualifications and for those without (15% compared to 14%, respectively). Similarly, 'insufficient work experience' (12% and 10%) and 'no vacancies at all' (11% and 13%) were other main difficulties reported by persons with and without post-school qualifications.

The average duration of unemployment for persons with post-school qualifications (males 54 weeks, females 43 weeks) was lower than that for those without post-school qualifications (males 65 weeks, females 55 weeks).

For persons who had not completed the highest level of secondary school the average duration of unemployment was 67 weeks, compared with 45 weeks for those who had completed the highest level (but do not have a post-school qualification). Unemployed persons with a Basic or Skilled vocational qualification recorded an average duration of 62 weeks and 52 weeks respectively. Those with a Bachelor degree or higher qualification had a lower average duration of unemployment, of 36 weeks.

Males generally had a higher average duration of unemployment than females, 60 weeks compared to 50 weeks. The largest difference in average duration of unemployment between males and females was for those with Basic vocational qualifications, of 79 weeks and 47 weeks respectively.

REASON FOR CEASING LAST FULL-TIME JOB

In July 1997, almost half (49%) of unemployed persons had been employees in their last full-time job and had ceased that job in the last two years.

Of these, more than two-thirds (68%) had left their last job involuntarily, representing 241,300 persons, including 157,600 who had been laid off or retrenched. The proportion who left involuntarily increased according to age group. While 59% of those aged 15-24 years left their last job involuntarily, 69% of those aged 25-44 years and 82% of those aged 45 years and over had left their last job involuntarily.

The proportion of employees who had left their last job involuntarily was highest among those who had worked in Wholesale trade (83%), Education (83%), Government administration and defence (82%) and Construction (82%). The industry with the lowest proportion of job losers was Accommodation, cafes and restaurants (41%).

By occupation, the highest proportion of job losers was recorded for Tradespersons and related workers (76%) and for Intermediate production and transport workers (also 76%). The lowest proportion was recorded for those whose last occupation was in Advanced clerical and service workers (47%).

EXPLANATORY NOTES

INTRODUCTION

- 1 This survey was conducted as a supplement to the Labour Force Survey (LFS). Respondents to the LFS who fell within the scope of the supplementary survey were asked further questions.
- 2 For further information about the LFS, see *Labour Force*, *Australia* (Cat. no. 6203.0). This monthly publication contains information about survey design, sample redesign, scope, coverage and population benchmarks relevant to the monthly LFS, which also apply to supplementary surveys. It also contains definitions of demographic and labour force characteristics which are relevant to both the LFS and supplementary surveys.

SCOPE

- 3 In addition to those already excluded from the monthly LFS, this survey was restricted to unemployed persons excluding those who were waiting to be called back to a full-time or part-time job from which they had been stood down without pay for less than four weeks up to the end of the reference week (for reasons other than bad weather or plant breakdown). Students at boarding school, patients in hospitals, residents of homes (e.g. retirement homes, homes for the handicapped), and inmates of prisons are further excluded from all supplementary surveys.
- 4 The number of unemployed persons published in *Labour Force*, *Australia*, *July 1997* (Cat. no. 6203.0) differs from that published in this publication because persons who were stood down were excluded from this survey, as it was inappropriate to ask them about their job search experience. Persons who were stood down comprised 4% of all unemployed persons in July 1997.
- **5** Also out of scope were some 2,000 persons living in remote and sparsely settled parts of Australia. The exclusion of these persons will have only a minor impact on any aggregate estimates that are produced for individual States and Territories.

RELIABILITY OF THE ESTIMATES

- **6** Estimates in this publication are subject to sampling and non-sampling errors:
- Sampling error is the difference between the published estimate and the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. For further information on sampling error, refer to Technical Notes on page 30.
- Non-sampling errors are inaccuracies that occur because of imperfections in reporting by respondents and interviewers, and errors made in coding and processing data. These inaccuracies may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient processing procedures.

SEASONAL FACTORS

7 The estimates are based on information collected in the survey month and, due to seasonal factors, may not be representative of other months of the year.

CHANGES IN CLASSIFICATIONS

8 From August 1996, occupation data are classified according to the second edition of the Australian Standard Classification of Occupations (ASCO SE). For more detailed information see the *Information Paper:* ASCO — Australian Standard Classifications of Occupations (Cat. no. 1221.0). A concordance between the new and the old versions of ASCO is not yet available.

COMPARABILITY OF TIME SERIES

- **9** Revisions are made to population benchmarks for the LFS after each five-yearly Census of Population and Housing. The last such revision was made in February 1994 to take account of the results of the 1991 Census of Population and Housing. Estimates from supplementary surveys conducted after February 1994 are therefore based on revised population benchmarks.
- 10 Supplementary surveys are not always conducted on the full LFS sample. Further, since August 1994, the sample available for supplementary surveys has been restricted to seven-eighths of the LFS sample. As a result, the standard errors for surveys conducted from August 1994 on, differ from those applicable to previous surveys.

COMPARABILITY WITH MONTHLY LABOUR FORCE SURVEY STATISTICS

- 11 Due to differences in the scope and sample size of this supplementary survey and that of the LFS, the estimation procedure may lead to some small variations between labour force estimates from this survey and those from the LFS.
- 12 It is impracticable to obtain information relating to the current period of unemployment which is strictly comparable with that obtained in the monthly LFS for which the reference period is one week. The definitions used in determining labour force status of persons in the monthly survey depend on a detailed set of questions asked about a person's labour force activity during the reference week. The items time spent looking for work and number of spells of looking for work during the previous 12 months are based on a more limited set of questions. It is for this reason that the terms working, looking for work and not working or looking for work are used for these items rather than the more precisely defined terms employed, unemployed, and not in the labour force.

SURVEY COVERAGE

13 The estimates relate to persons covered by the survey in July 1997. In the monthly population survey, coverage rules are applied which aim to ensure that each person is associated with only one dwelling, and hence has only one chance of selection in the survey. See *Labour Force*, *Australia* (Cat. no. 6203.0).

PREVIOUS SURVEYS

14 Results of similar surveys on the job search experience of unemployed persons conducted in July 1984, July 1985, June 1986, July 1988, July 1990, June 1991, July 1992, July 1993, July 1994, July 1995 and July 1996 were given in the publication *Job Search Experience of Unemployed Persons, Australia* (Cat. no. 6222.0).



TECHNICAL NOTES

INTRODUCTION

- 1 Since the estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they are subject to sampling variability, that is, they may differ from those estimates that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error (SE), which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one SE from the number that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about 19 chances in 20 that the difference will be less than two SEs. Another measure of the likely difference is the relative standard error (RSE), which is obtained by expressing the SE as a percentage of the estimate.
- 2 Space does not allow for the separate indication of the SEs of all estimates in this publication. A table of SEs for general application is given in T1. Since they are averages based on calculations for a limited number of past surveys over a wide range of labour force characteristics these numbers will not give a precise measure of the SE of a particular estimate but they will provide an indication of its magnitude.
- 3 An example of the calculation and the use of SE in relation to estimates of persons is as follows. Table 3 shows the estimated number of unemployed persons in Australia who registered with the CES was 549,900. Since this estimate is between 500,000 and 1,000,000, T1 shows that the SE for Australia will lie between 10,500 and 13,750 and can be approximated by interpolation as 10,800 (rounded to the nearest 100). Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey will fall in the range 539,100 to 560,700 and about 19 chances in 20 that the value will fall within the range 528,300 to 571,500. This example is illustrated in the diagram below.

CALCULATION OF STANDARD ERROR continued 4 As can be seen from the SE table, the smaller the estimate, the higher is the RSE. Very small estimates are thus subject to such high SEs (relative to the size of the estimate) as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. In these tables, only estimates with RSEs less than 25% are considered sufficiently reliable for most purposes. However, estimates with larger RSEs have been included and are preceded by an asterisk (e.g. *3.4) to indicate they are subject to high SEs and should be used with caution.

Averages and medians

5 The RSEs of estimates of average duration of unemployment, and median duration of unemployment are obtained by first finding the RSE of the estimate of the total number of persons contributing to the average or median (see T1) and then multiplying the relevant number so obtained by the following relevant factors:

average duration of unemployment: 1.3 median duration of unemployment: 2.0

The following is an example of the calculation of SEs where the use of a factor is required. Table 3 shows that the estimated median duration of unemployment for unemployed males in Australia was 28 weeks and the number of males was estimated as 431,800. From T1 it can be calculated that the estimate (431,800) has a standard error of about 9,800 and therefore a RSE of about 2.3%. The RSE of the estimate of median duration of unemployment is calculated by multiplying this number (2.3%) by the appropriate factor shown in the previous paragraph (in this case 2.0): 2.3 x 2.0 = 4.6%. The SE of this estimate of median duration of unemployment is therefore 4.6% of 28, i.e. about 1 week. Therefore there are two chances in three that the median duration of unemployment for males that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included in the survey would have been within the range 27–29 weeks and about 19 chances in 20 that it would have been within the range 25–31 weeks.

Proportions and percentages

7 Proportions and percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling errors. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and the denominator. A formula to approximate the RSE of a proportion is given below:

RSE
$$(x/y) = \sqrt{[RSE(x)]^2 - [RSE(y)]^2}$$

8 Considering the example from the previous page, the 549,900 persons who were registered with the CES represents 76.6% of the 717,500 unemployed persons. The SE of 717,500 is approximately 11,900 so the RSE is 1.7%. The RSE for 549,900 is 2.0%. Applying the above formula, the RSE of the proportion is $\sqrt{(2.0)^2 - (1.7)^2}$ or 1.1%, giving a SE for the proportion (76.6%) of 0.9 percentage points. Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the proportion of unemployed persons registered with the CES is between 75.7% and 77.5% and 19 chances in 20 that the proportion is within the range 74.8% to 78.4%.

DIFFERENCES

9 Published estimates may also be used to calculate the difference between two survey estimates (of numbers or percentages). Such an estimate is subject to sampling error. The sampling error of the difference between two estimates depends on their SEs and the relationship (correlation) between them. An approximate SE of the difference between two estimates (x-y) may be calculated by the following formula:

$$SE(x-y) = \sqrt{[SE(x)]^2 + [SE(y)]^2}$$

- **10** While this formula will only be exact for differences between separate and uncorrelated characteristics or subpopulations, it is expected to provide a good approximation for all differences likely to be of interest in this publication.
- 11 The imprecision due to sampling variability, which is measured by the SE, should not be confused with inaccuracies that may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents and errors made in coding and processing data. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as the non-sampling error, and they may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient operating procedures.

GLOSSARY

Active steps taken to find work

Steps taken during the current period of unemployment. They comprise: writing, telephoning or applying in person to an employer for work; answering a newspaper advertisement for a job; checking factory or CES noticeboards; being registered with any other employment agency; advertising or tendering for work; and contacting friends or relatives.

All difficulties in finding work

All difficulties experienced during the current period of unemployment.

All unemployed persons

Those persons who were not employed during the reference week (i.e. the week immediately preceding that in which the interview took place), had actively looked for full-time or part-time work at any time in the four weeks up to the end of the reference week, and:

- were available for work in the reference week, or would have been available except for temporary illness (i.e. lasting for less than four weeks up to the end of the reference week); or
- were waiting to start a new job within four weeks from the end of the reference week and would have started in the reference week if the job had been available then.

Average duration (of current period of unemployment)

The duration obtained by dividing the aggregate number of weeks a group has been unemployed by the number of persons in that group.

Ceased last full-time job

Left or lost last full-time job.

CES

Commonwealth Employment Service is a referral service for jobseekers and employers, which also attempts to redress skill shortages through labour market programs.

Duration of current period of unemployment

The period from the time the person began looking for work to the end of the reference week. Thus this item measures the current (and continuing) period of unemployment rather than a completed spell. For persons who may have begun looking for work while still employed, the duration of current period of unemployment is defined as the period from the time the person last worked full time for two weeks or more to the end of the reference period.

Educational attainment

Measures the highest qualification completed by the respondent, classified according to the Australian Bureau of Statistics Classification of Qualifications. The seven categories for level of attainment are as follows:

Higher degree

Comprises primarily Doctorates and Master's degrees. The minimum entry requirements are usually a Master's degree or a first class honours degree for a Doctorate and completion of an honours degree for a Master's degree. The duration of study is a minimum of two to four years for a Doctorate and two years full-time or equivalent for a Master's degree. This level of qualification is designed to recognise significant contributions to original research or the application of knowledge within a given field of study.

Postgraduate diploma

Includes Graduate Certificates. The entry requirement is usually the successful completion of a Bachelor degree or an Undergraduate diploma. The duration of study ranges from six months (for a Graduate Certificate) to one year full-time study or equivalent. Courses usually build on undergraduate studies, and are designed to broaden or develop professional knowledge and skills in a related or new area of studies.

Bachelor degree

The entry requirement is the satisfactory completion of Year 12 or its equivalent. The duration of study ranges from three to six years full-time study or its equivalent. Courses are designed to provide students with a systematic and coherent introduction to a broad body of knowledge. The emphasis is on the underlying principles and concepts of that body of knowledge.

Undergraduate diploma

The entry requirement is usually the successful completion of Year 12 or its equivalent. The duration of study is three years full-time study or its equivalent. Certain other qualifications are classified to this level on the basis that their entry requirements, duration of study and theoretical orientation are regarded as being equivalent to those of undergraduate diplomas, for example, Certificate in Psychiatric Nursing. Courses are designed to provide individuals with the knowledge and skills necessary for practice in a professional or associate professional occupation.

Associate diploma

The entry requirement is usually the completion of Year 12 or the completion of Year 10 and a prerequisite certificate course. The duration of study ranges from one to two years full-time or its equivalent. Courses provide individuals with the knowledge and skill necessary to give support to professionals, and for positions in advanced trade, technical or associate professional occupations. Advanced Certificates, Technician's Certificates and Certificates of Technology are included in this level as they have broadly the same theoretical orientation as associate diplomas.

Skilled Vocational Qualification The entry requirement is usually the completion of Year 10 or its equivalent. In addition, some courses may require a student to be concurrently employed in that specific field. The duration of study is two to four years, and typically involves some on-the-job training. Courses provide individuals with the knowledge and skills necessary to work in a specific vocation, recognised trade or craft that requires a high degree of skill in a range of related activities.

Basic Vocational Qualification Often requires Year 10 completion, however many courses have no formal entry requirements. The duration of study ranges from one semester to one year of full-time study or equivalent. Courses provide individuals with the practical skills and background knowledge necessary for employment at the operative level in many different fields.

Highest level of secondary school available The highest level of secondary school available to the respondent, as determined by the respondent, at the time he or she left school (i.e. Year 12 or equivalent).

Interstate

Between States and Territories.

Intrastate

Within the State or Territory.

Job Any paid employment, full-time or part-time, lasting two weeks or more.

Job leavers

Persons who have ceased their last job voluntarily, that is, because:

- of unsatisfactory work arrangements/pay/hours;
- the job was seasonal, temporary or a holiday job and they left that job to return to studies;
- they retired, started a new business, got a better job, left for family or other reasons; or
- changed locality but not employer/business for employment, personal or other reasons.

Job losers

Persons who ceased their last job involuntarily, that is:

- they were retrenched or their business closed down because of financial difficulties;
- their job was seasonal, temporary or a holiday job and they did not leave that job to return to studies; or
- they left their job because of their own ill health or injury.

Looking for part-time work

Actively looking for part-time work only.

Main difficulty in finding work

The main difficulty experienced during the current period of unemployment.

Main English speaking countries

Comprises the United Kingdom, Ireland, Canada, South Africa, the United States of America and New Zealand.

Median duration (of current period of unemployment) The duration which divides unemployed persons into two equal size groups, one comprising persons whose duration of unemployment is above the median, and the other, persons whose duration is below it.

Number of offers of employment The number of separate offers of employment received during the current period of unemployment.

Number of spells of looking for work in the previous 12 months The number of different periods, including the current period, during which persons reported having been out of work and looking for a job, in the 12 months prior to the reference week.

Persons with post-school qualifications Persons who have obtained a vocational qualification, certificate, diploma, degree or any other qualification, since leaving school. Respondents indicated which of the following groups best described their highest qualification: Higher degree; Postgraduate diploma; Bachelor degree; Undergraduate diploma; Associate diploma; Skilled Vocational Qualification; Basic Vocational Qualification.

Persons who were stood down

Persons classed as unemployed who had been stood down without pay for less than four weeks, for reasons other than bad weather or plant breakdown.

Still at school

Current school attendance was recorded only for persons aged 15-20 years.

Time spent looking for work in the previous 12 months

The total number of weeks persons reported having been out of work and looking for a job, including the weeks in the current period of unemployment, in the 12 months prior to the reference week.

Usual gross weekly pay

The amount of usual total weekly pay (i.e. before taxation and other deductions have been made).
