

A profile of people with communication disability in Australia

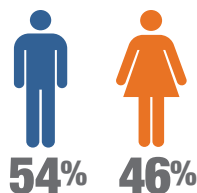


Communication disability affects a person's ability to understand and be understood by others. Levels of limitation range from mild to profound and can be temporary or last a lifetime.

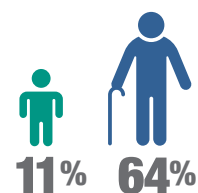
Results from the 2015 Survey of Disability, Ageing and Carers provide insight into the prevalence of communication disability in Australia and the impact on the lives of those who are affected by it.



There were **1.2 million** Australians with **communication disability**¹ in 2015



More than **half** of people with communication disability were **male**



Children² and **older people**³ made up the majority of people with communication disability



Children² were **more likely** to have **profound/severe** communication disability than older people³



People with communication disability were **less likely** to have a **non-school qualification**⁴ (**42%**) than people without communication disability (61%)



38% of people with communication disability were **participating in the labour force**⁵ compared with 80% of people without communication disability



1 in 7 people with communication disability⁶ **needed formal assistance**⁷ with communication



1/2 of all people⁶ who needed formal assistance⁷ with communication **had an unmet need** for this assistance



3 in 5 people⁶ who had an **unmet need** for formal assistance⁷ with communication were **children**²
